SPORTING NEWS

WASHINGTON COACH WOULD BET ON U. O.

A frantic wall in the Seattle Times yesterday, emanating from Coach Gilmore Doble of the University of Washington, and his susceptible press agents, gives the long-faced man from the North—the man who is sadder of all men—the tide clear and undisputed, of the greatest prevaricator in the northwest. "I never bet on football myself, but if I were a betting man, I would take Oregon at even money. I would not bet on Washington at all; certainly I would not think of giving odds on the team," said the silent watcher of the sidelines to a Seattle man last Saturday. It seems that Doble had it heard, it rumored that Washington supporters were giving 2 to 1 odds on the big game next Saturday, and this news only added more gloomy glooms to Gilmore's sorrowful outlook. He brands such wagers as rank foolishness on part of the Seattle men. That Oregon outweighs Washington 12 pounds to the man is a statement that Doble impressed in his reports; also that the Oregon men are faster than the Washington men; combining the two Oregon has both speed and weight. "And when a team has both these essentials, it is hard to beat," he avers. Bailey, according to Doble's system of weights and measures tips the beam at 235 pounds; and is dubbed "giant" by the Seattle press agent. Kellogg weighs 194, says the Washington man, weighing 22 pounds more than his opponent. Captain Main is a bigger man by six pounds than Muckelstone, and the dope writer almost admits he is a superior man in every way. He gives Latourette an even break with Coyle in hints that he is superior in running back yards. If anything, the odds should be in favor of Oregon, the article concludes. "For Coach Warner has the men right where he wants them now, and he will send them into that game feeling brave enough to whip their weight in wildcats."

Gov. West will probably blow the whistle that starts the big game in the first half, and though the governor from the north has not yet given his consent, it is safe to predict that he will be more than willing to start the ball rolling in the second period.
