

ACTRESSES SOL

SMITH RUSSELL
HAS DEVELOPED

One of Them in the Cast of
"The Third Degree," To
Be Seen Here Soon

The late Sol Smith Russell was considered by many in his day the foremost actor of the types he portrayed. He was an expert technician, and made famous a type of rural play, that has been immensely popular, among many others, "Peaceful Valley" and "A Poor Relation." His services to the American stage did not end with this, however. Many of the most efficient actors and actresses now on the stage owe their careers to his encouragement and training. At the time "Peaceful Valley" was first produced including the Pacific coast tour, there was but three women in his support who had any sort of a reputation. These were old Mrs. Sol Smith, Marion Abbott and Minnie Radcliffe. The rest were "unknowns" who had selected with infinite care from the ranks of the struggling beginners and their performance, in every case, reflected great credit upon the judgment of the actor-manager.

Among the "unknowns" were names now prominent in the theatrical world, including Minnie Soliman, Catherine Counties, Sarah Truax, Blanche Walsh and others now equally prominent. And now Minnie Radcliffe, who fourteen years ago appeared as Sol Smith Russell's ingenue leading woman, has lately added greatly to her reputation as Mrs. Howard Jeffries, Sr., in Chas. Klein's famous play, "The Third Degree." Miss Radcliffe's characterization scored so heavily that on the opening night of the present season, she signed an indefinite contract with the United Play Co., by which she is to receive a salary automatically increasing with each additional year that she consents to play the part.

David Belasco, author of "The Girl of the Golden West," knows better than any other playwright the exact value of a dramatic situation. That is, he knows the precise trick with which to give it emphasis. He accentuates with the paint brush and switch board. And as for dialogue he does not sacrifice naturalness to fine phrasing. For example, the schoolroom scene of the "Girl of the Golden West," discloses the educational standard of Cloudy Mountain, a mining camp. To put correct English in the speech of such folk would be incongruous, because they had never learned it, so the author substitutes perfection of detail for beauty of language or force of theme. That schoolroom scene, by the by, is one of the most amusing and most affecting chapters of incidents ever staged.

"The Girl of the Golden West" will be presented here at popular prices, the evening of November 15, under the personal direction of Frederick Blasco, brother of the author.

One of the brightest offerings of the theatrical season of 1911 at the Eugene theatre will be that of Billy "Single" Clifford in this excellent company, including the Girlie Girls Beauty chorus in the merriest musical feast, "The Girl, The Man and The Game?" which will serve to delight the patrons of this popular playhouse for one night, on Tuesday, Nov. 19.

The play is a very clever, sparkling, musical farce, such as is very seldom seen far away from Times Square and the bright lights on Broadway, N. Y. Next in importance to Billy Clifford in the cast, is that clever prima donna of international reputation, Ida May, and the daintiest little sourette of the past year on Broadway, Miss Mae Collins. Jack Trainor will take care of the opposite side of the comedy, while Bud Bra-mant and a host of others will assist

in the fun-making.

There are sixteen songs of the kind that linger in your memory for a long time, and one of the prettiest pieces of stage dancing seen in late days, "The Clifford Dreamy Waltz." Taken as a whole, it will afford two hours of solid fun and enjoyment that is good for one's tired feeling.
