SPORTING NEWS

McCREDIE GOES EAST AFTER NEW PLAYERS

Portland, Nov. 21.—In accordance with his annual custom, Manager Walter McCredie, of the Portland Beavers, departed last night for a trip to the east, which will keep him away from Portland for the next three weeks. While gone he hopes to land some good players for next season's team.

McCredie's first stop will be in St. Paul, where he will confer with Owner Lennon, of the St. Paul club, about the purchase or trading of players. He will likewise stop at Milwaukee to try for a deal with Hugh Duffy for a certain player now with the Brewers. McCredie will also have a short conference there with Eddie Giacoma, the stonky left-handed pitcher, whom he almost landed for the Northwestern team last season.

McCredie will then go to Chicago and Cleveland to negotiate for other players he has in view. At Chicago he hopes to meet R. L. Hedges, the owner of the St. Louis Americans, to whom he may trade "Roaring" Bill Rapa for Pitcher "Lefty" George and another player, possibly Infielder Kufina. Hedges wants Rapa, and McCredie is willing, provided he gets the players he wants in return.

JACK WELCH WILL REFEREE FIGHT

Los Angeles, Nov. 21.—In spite of his protests, Freddie Welch has accepted Jack Welch as the third man in the ring for his fight scheduled with Ad Wolgast here Thanksgiving day. At a meeting of Wolgast, Tom Jones, Welch and Promoter Tom McCarey, Jones urged that Welch be selected. Declaring that while he was accepting an undesirable official, he would rather take Welch than lose the chance for the fight, the question which has been troubling the fans the most has been definitely settled.

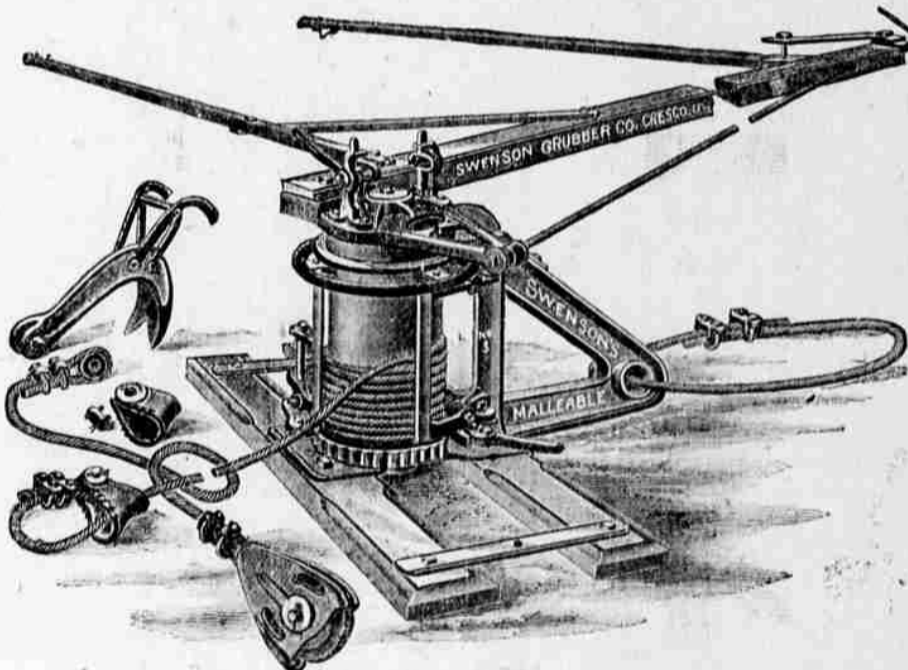
