Studley has begun suit in the circuit court against John Johnson, to recover the sum of \$300, together with interest at the rate of 8 per cent per year from September 19, on a note given to the Griffin Hardware company, and assigned the plaintiff. Thompson & Hardy are attorneys for the plaintiff.

recently began condemnation proceedings against Pattison. An agreement for right-of-way through land belonging to J. H. Eccleston and wife and J. P. Millhorn and wife in section 17, township 12 south of range 4 west, was filed for record today by the company. This land lies near Junction City.

It is probable that a compromise may be effected between the Southern Pacific company and C. Jensen, through whose Coos Bay branch will extend, this and the Lane county Asset company's property being the only two pieces of land through which right-of-way has not yet been secured. The company began condemnation proceedings against both a few days ago, but it is probable that the case against Mr. Jensen will not go to court. Right-of-way Agent Buell and Mr. Jensen held a conference today and it is probable that a Tompkins price for the land will be agreed upon.

Two young men giving their names as Howard Calvin and William Smith are in the county jail charged with entering the residence of Mrs. Anna Pitney at Junction City Sunday night, and stealing a number of articles therefrom. Sheriff Bown and his deputy, George Flak, arrested the men on the railroad between Eugene and Irving late yesterday afternoon, and as they had some of the goods stolen on their persons, their guilt was established. They at first pro-

tested their innocence, but afterwards admitted their guilt. They were taken before Justice of the Peace Bryson and bound over to the grand jury.

George T. Hall's application to build over the alley between his properties on Pearl street will come up before the city council this evening. His plan, as outlined by The Guard a few days ago, is to erect a large concrete block having a frontage of 90 feet on both Pearl and Park streets, with the alley in the center, but to have the second story of the building extend over the alley, leaving enough space below for the passage of the largest load of hay or any other commodity that might be hauled through the alley. Mr. Hall has had sketches of the building drawn and they show a very handsome structure.

NEW BUILDING FOR UNDERTAKING PARLORS ON OLIVE STREET

W. W. Branstetter Will Have One of the Best Equipped Chapels in Valley

W. W. Branstetter has begun the erection of a two-story frame building on Olive street opposite the Central school building to be used for his undertaking parlors and when completed, he will have one of the finest chapels in the state. The building will be 32 by 60 feet in dimensions, with a twelve-foot porch in front and a large porch behind. The second floor will be divided into living rooms, where Mr. and Mrs. Branstetter, and the latter's mother, Dr. Olive Waller, will reside. The building will cost when completed, about \$4000 and will be of the latest architecture. Mr. Branstetter plans to install a

model undertaking plant in the building and will be equipped with the latest appliances known to the profession. He expects to occupy the building about February 1, 1912, that being the date of completion called for in the contract.
