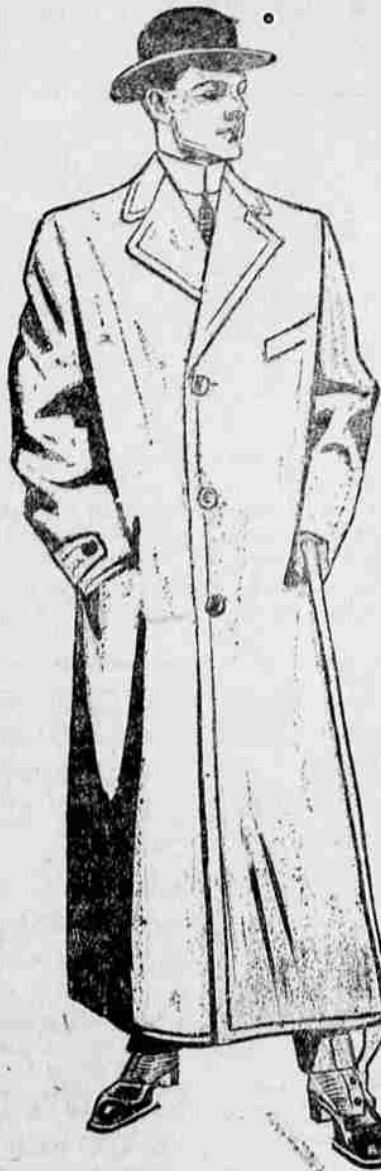

MAGAZINE AGENT BRANDED AS SWINDLER

Faker Secures Large Number
of Subscriptions in Eugene
at Reduced Rates

An accomplished faker worked a number of Eugene citizens, selling subscriptions to the Ladies' Home Journal this week. He gave his name as James Hartman and said that he was authorized to sell subscriptions to the Journal for \$1.00 per year, instead of \$1.50, which has always been

the price of that periodical. Wednesday forenoon about 11 o'clock he drifted into the Red Cross drug store and accosted Dr. M. L. Kreamer to whom he said that he had been directed by Mrs. Kreamer. Dr. Kreamer recalled that the Curtis Publishing company, which publishes the Journal, had frequently denounced as frauds all who offered cut rates. He asked the man more in regard to the matter. Hartman drew a bunch of receipts and stubs and began citing people who had taken advantage of the offer in Eugene. Dr. Kreamer noticed that the wording and form of the checks looked suspicious and demanded credentials. Hartman said that he did not have them with him but that his manager did, at the Osburn. Dr. Kreamer consulted Schwarzschild's book store and was informed that the Ladies' Home Journal did not cut rates.

The police were notified and instituted a search at once. Officer Christensen located his man near the city limits on West Sixth street, to which part of the city he had gone in search of more victims when he left the drug

store. He told the officer that he had been misunderstood in regard to the manager as that gentleman had headquarters in Seattle, and that he was on his way here. He seemed to be perfectly calm. He said that he was 29 years old, and did not appear to be older. He was tall, thin and delicate in appearance, had a light complexion and a few freckles across the nose. He was dressed in a blue suit, gray cap and tan shoes. His left hand was crippled.

There was no evidence in the hands of the police which would warrant his arrest so he was kept under surveillance. He stayed around town all day Wednesday but it was discovered yesterday that he had disappeared. It was rumored on the streets that he had taken the streetcar to Springfield Junction and the train from there, but there does not seem to be anything in the report.

This morning a telegram was received from the Curtis Publishing company in response to a telegram sent to them by E. Schwarzschild, stating that the man was a fraud and asking that he be arrested. The publishing company offers \$25 for the arrest of anyone who pretends to be their agents, who is not.

HAMPTON'S STORE AT SPRINGFIELD ENTERED BY SKYLIGHT THIEF

Small Amount of Cash and
Some Clothing Taken, But
Amount Not Known

Guard Special Service. Springfield, Or., Dec. 1.—A burglar entered Hampton's dry goods store in this city some time Wednesday night and stole \$5 in cash, which had been left in the till, and a quantity of merchandise, mostly clothing, but Manager George Lamar is unable to ascertain the amount taken, as the store was left disarranged at closing time Wednesday evening after a big day's business. The thief entered the store through the skylight, letting himself down with a rope. He climbed to the roof of the city hall first, then passing over the Woodmen of the World building to the roof of the new Seavey building, where the store is located.

It is believed that the thief took an entire outfit of clothing, as the underwear, hat, shoes and clothing department were disturbed. It is hard to estimate the loss, but it is thought that the burglar carried away about \$40 worth of goods besides the small amount of cash that was left in the till.

P. E. & E. CAR GOES TO CORVALLIS FOR WORK

Will Be Used in Construction
of Monroe Extension to
Eugene This Winter

That the Portland, Eugene & Eastern intends to start construction work on the Monroe extension to Eugene soon is further evidenced by the shipping to Corvallis today of the flat car which the company has had in Eugene for two or three years past. The car was taken to the S. P. freight depot grounds today and will at once be transferred to the S. P. tracks and hauled to Albany, thence over to Corvallis on the C. & E. and thence to Monroe on the C. & A., where it will be used to haul materials for the construction of the proposed extension.

It is not known when the extension to Eugene will begin, but it is thought here that it will be very soon, and if the Southern Pacific company is really behind the enterprise it will not be many weeks before the line is completed, as the S. P. seems desirous of entering Eugene with a competing electric line as soon as or before the Oregon Electric completes its line to this city.

CONDUCTOR LEWIS HAS BAD ACCIDENT

P. E. & E. Employee's Leg
Broken at Car Barns This
Morning

G. W. Lewis, a conductor on the P. E. & E. railway, had his leg broken about 8 o'clock this morning while taking a large construction car from the sheds at the Thirteenth street station for use on construction work at Monroe. The front car was being motored by Manager Geo. W. Ford, while Mr. Lewis stood on the right side of the tender in the rear, holding the trolley. He stood too near the draw-bar between the cars and when they were turning the curve the draw-bar was jerked against his leg by the construction car, snapping the bone like a pipe stem. He was taken to the General hospital at once and Dr. Day summoned. The bone was set and he is now resting easily. Everything possible is being done by the company to alleviate his suffering.

The construction car was shipped today to Monroe where the company is now doing construction work and concentrating materials for more extensive work.

It is not generally known that eagles are protected by law in this state, the law having been passed at the last session of the legislature. This fact was made known a few days ago when a resident of the hill country brought in an eagle to have it mounted.

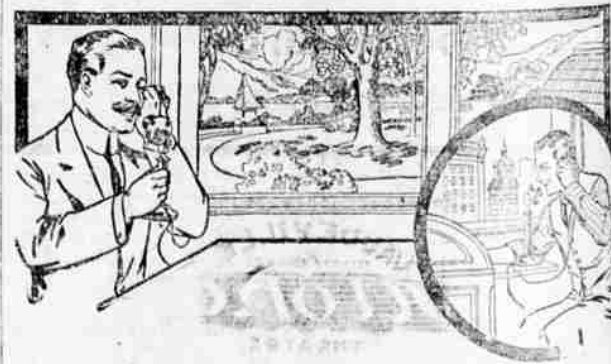
