SPRINGFIELD'S ELECTION TO BE TESTED

Arrest Will Be Made for Sale of Liquor and Case Taken to the Supreme Court

In order to test the validity of the recent election in Springfield, where in the people voted to license saloons in that city, it has been agreed between District Attorney E. R. Bryson and the advocates of the home rule law, that an arrest will be made for the sale of liquor and the case passed through the lower courts to the supreme court for a final hearing on the law.

It has been agreed that tomorrow Sheriff Haven shall purchase a bottle of beer from E. R. Perkins, of the firm of Chas. E. Perkins, who will be granted a license to sell liquor. Perkins will be placed under arrest, he will be found guilty in the justice court and a fine will be imposed. The case will then be appealed to the circuit court and Judge Harris will hear the case probably next week, immediately thereafter giving his decision. It will then be appealed to the supreme court.

Perkins has agreed not to sell any more beer and the city will remain "dry" till the supreme court gives its decision.

The attorneys in the case will endeavor to have the supreme court advance the case on the calendar and in that event a decision might be forthcoming during the last week in January or the first week in February.

This seems to be a fair and square way of testing the home rule law as it applies in "dry" counties, and all parties connected with the case declare that they will free up to the agreement to keep the city "dry" till the final decision is given.

Junction City, Dec. 12.—There are five teams at work on S. M. Norman's field adjoining the city, grading the electric railroad. The horses and mules are shod at the Johnson stable and it is presumed that they will begin working inside the city limits soon.
