PROMINENT PIONEER WOMAN IS DEAD

Hood River, Or., Dec. 11.—Georgiana Smith, wife of E. L. Smith of this city, died at her home here 11:30 o'clock Dec. 10 from complications of disease. Mrs. Smith was 69 years old and is survived by four daughters. They are Mrs. Watt and Mrs. W. M. Stevens, Hood River; Mrs. J. E. Rand of the land and Mrs. Oscar Nelson of the endale, Wash.

Mrs. Smith was married in 1851. With her husband she moved to Hood River in the 1850s and was active in women's work throughout the state.

PENSION BILL IS PASSED IN HOUSE

Sherwood Measure Carried by Overwhelming Vote, Despite Strong Opposition

Washington, Dec. 12.—The Sherwood service pension bill, which adds upwards of \$40,000,000 to the gov-

ernment annual expenditures by granting increased pensions to civil and Mexican war veterans on the basis of length of service, was passed by the house tonight by a vote of 229 to 92, despite the determined opposition of many democratic leaders.

Secretary of the Interior, Fisher estimated that the bill would add \$75,000,000 to the pension roll if all the 100,000 veterans eligible take advantage of the increased pension.

The republicans who voted with

the 84 democrats against the bill were Gardner, Gillette, McCall, Hill, Kent, McCreary, Payne and Utterby. Speaker Clark voted with the majority of his party for the bill. Democratic Leader Underwood and Fitzgerald of New York, chairman of the appropriations committee, voted against it.

The bill now goes to the senate where there is a disposition to pass some form of amended service pension legislation. Senate leaders,

however, will proceed slowly in the consideration of this legislation and many house democrats voted for the measure in the belief that the senate would not pass it.
