Ryan goes to the Cleveland American league team next season, and his many admirers in Portland figure that he will make good. Ryan was the logical leader in Pacific coast batting last season, for he played in 120 games, while Heltmuller of Los Angeles, who outranked Ryan in batting, played in but 79 games. After the holidays Buddy announced that he intended to join Harry Ables at the latter's home in Texas for a few weeks prior to reporting to the Cleveland club at New Orleans.—Oregonian.

OUTLAW LEAGUE TO BE FORMED IN EASTERN CITIES

Washington, Dec. 20.—According to an announcement here, plans are being perfected for the establishment of a new "outlaw" baseball league, to have clubs in Brooklyn, Newark, Paterson, Reading, Washington, Baltimore and Richmond. Leagues protected by the national commission have teams in all these cities. The new organization is a revival of the "outlaw" union league, which has a brief existence in 1908, and is to be called the Atlantic league.

Portland, Dec. 21.—Multnomah club will have three of the greatest kickers in the country in the backfield for the Christmas and New Year's games with the Seattle clubmen, for Keck, famous Oregon Aggie fullback, telephoned to Dow Waker from Salem yesterday saying he would be on hand Sunday for practice. Clarke, Wolff, and Keck will probably alternate with boot work.

The winged M squad will probably be still further augmented by the addition of Captain May, of the Oregon Aggies, a former clubman who is expected to fill in at guard. His home is in Portland and he is expected here in a day or two and may make the trip to Seattle on Christmas day.
