WELCOME RAINS GIVE WHEAT BEARS CHANCE

Prices Lower at Close on Chicago Exchange. Prospects of Big Corn Crop Lowers Price.

(By The Associated Press) Chicago, May 21.—With speculation in wheat all but eliminated on the board of trade by the establishment of maximum prices, oats traders today took possession of the pit historically sacred to wheat, although there was little trading. A notice in the new oats pit stated that with the approach of warmer weather the augmented oats group, reinforced by many former wheat brokers, needed roomier quarters. Wheat prices dropped 8 to 10 cents early but recovered. Lowness of prices, lack of restrictions on trading and the magnitude of recent expert dealings all helped to widen out the business in oats. There was a notable absence of offerings and the market developed decided firmness. Advances, however, hardly exceeded one cent, with July inclined to steady at 68. Welcome rains over the entire wheat belt gave the bears an advantage and so too did reports that shipments of more than 1,000,000 bushels of wheat to the United States from Australia had been made. A big decrease in the United States visible supply total failed to bring the market any support. The close was weak 7c net lower with July at \$2.33 and September at \$2.10. Cold unfavorable weather gave strength to corn. Trading was on a fairly liberal scale. After opening 1-4 to 1 1/4 off, the market receded moderate general gains. Reports that planted acreage this season would be the largest on record led subsequently to a bearish reaction. The close was heavy at 1-4 to 1 1/8 net decline. Provisions weakened in sympathy with the hog market. Dealings were almost altogether in lard and ribs.

WALL STREET New York, May 21.—The week on the stock exchange opened with a confident resumption of the recent advance, industries and war issues again leading. United States Steel was conspicuous for its rise of 2 points to the new current maximum of 124 3/8. Other stocks of the same class gained 1 to 2 points in the first half hour's operations. Shipplings rallied from last week's setback and important rails made fractional gains. Specialties and utilities were featured by Industrial Alcohol and Ohio Gas at advances of 2 to 3 points. Aside from a further moderate decline in Denver and Rio Grande preferred there were virtually no exceptions to the higher trend. Steel's further advance to above 125 and an inquiry for shipplings and traction accompanied the renewed activity of the last hour. The closing was strong.

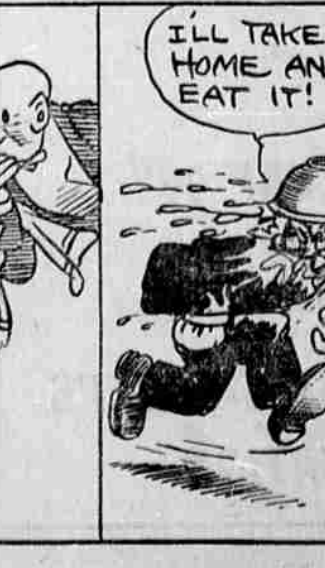
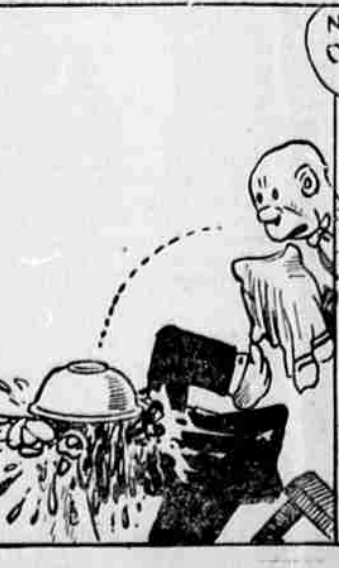
