METHOD IS CHANGED MAKING SCHOOL LEVY

Oregon School Districts Will Hereafter Levy Sum in Dollars Instead of Mill Tax.

The last Oregon legislature made a radical change in the manner in which school districts will levy the local school tax at the annual meeting. Heretofore the board has estimated the amount of money necessary and then figured out the rate of taxation to be imposed to meet these needs, which rate was voted on by the electors.

Hereafter all school districts will adopt the budget system, and decide upon the sum of money to be raised. The matter of setting the number of mills on the dollar of property necessary to raise that amount will be left to the assessor.

If the districts have outstanding indebtedness it will be necessary to add that amount to the sum necessary to be raised and certify the total amount to the assessor.

The taxpayers can cut the amount to be raised, or eliminate items in the budget as presented by the board but once the amount is settled by the voters the per cent of levy is computed in the assessor's office.

MANY PIONEERS ARE IN EUGENE TO ATTEND I.O.O.F. GRAND LODGE

Five Members of Spencer Butte Lodge for More Than 50 Years Act as Reception Committee to Visitors.

The pioneer is conspicuous among the delegates who have arrived in Eugene to attend the sessions of the grand lodge which convenes tomorrow. A committee of five members of Spencer Butte lodge, organized in 1860, who have been members of the lodge which is today the host to the grand lodge for more than 50 years, has been designated to welcome pioneers from other lodges of the state to the meeting in Eugene. Some sort of a reunion of these early Odd Fellows will be arranged when the sessions of the grand lodge convene tomorrow morning.

The members of the pioneer reception committee and the dates on which they joined Spencer Butte lodge are as follows: T. G. Hendricks, March 31, 1864; D. R. Lakin, January 10, 1865; J. D. Matlock, October 3, 1865; J. H. McClung and J. S. Luckey, November 20, 1866. All of the members of the committee have also resided continuously in Eugene with the exception of Mr. McClung, who is now a resident of Portland.

HAS PUNISHMENT FOR MEN WHO VOTE AGAINST BOND ISSUE

Spokane Man Would Sentence Them to Travel Oregon Roads; Tells Experience Coming on Pacific Highway.

J. H. Chambers, of Spokane, Wash., is a strong booster for the Oregon road bonds. He arrived in the city Monday night from San Jose, coming in an auto, accompanied by his wife. After his experience on the Pacific highway, especially through Douglas county, he says that any man who will vote against the bonds ought to be compelled to travel over the road in a car winters during the rest of his natural life.

Mr. and Mrs. Chambers left San Jose Thursday morning. They reached Roseburg Saturday noon and were from then to Monday night reaching Eugene. The first bad roads struck were on the Siskiyou, where there had just been a heavy rain. That was not so bad, however, as the mud there could be shoveled. The roads from the mountains to Grants Pass were mostly good, and were not so bad between Grants Pass and Roseburg as between Roseburg and the Lane county line.

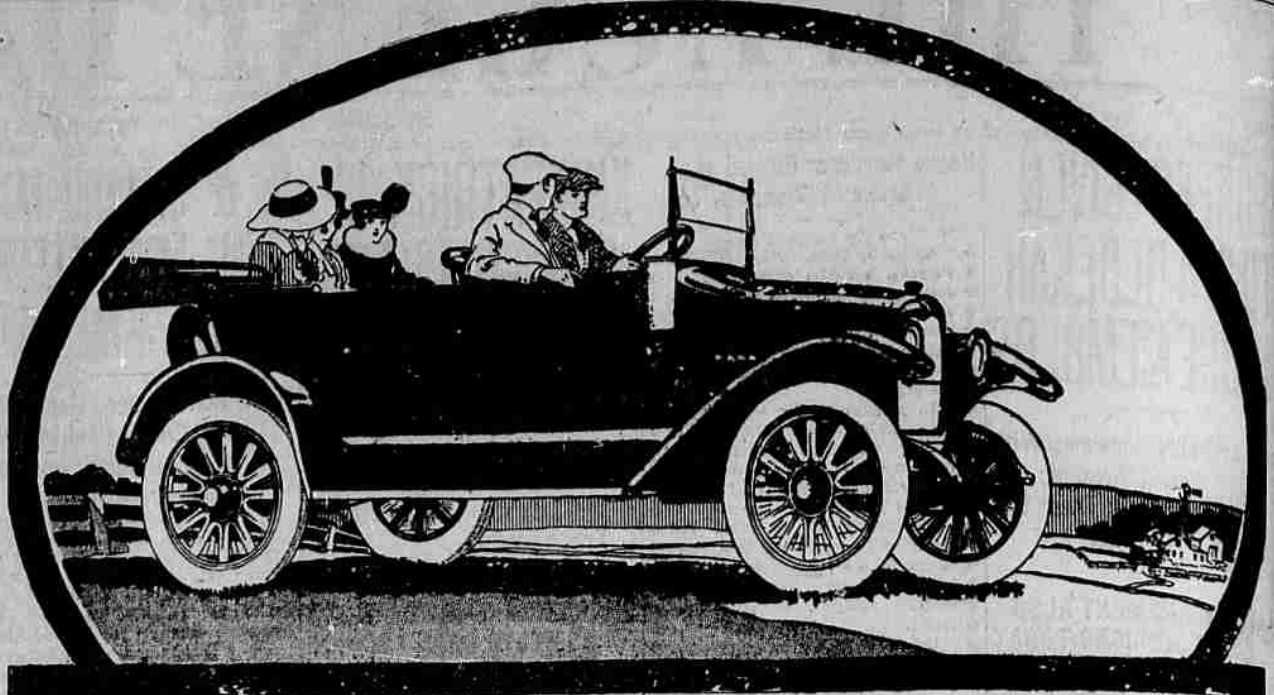
Mr. Chambers declared that his wife had to sit with her fingers in her ears nearly all the way from Roseburg, because of his language. The mud was so sticky that they could not shovel it out from around the wheels and had to get down on their hands and knees and pick it out with their fingers.

To cap it all, the other side of Yoncalla they met a Russian family stranded in the mud with a broken car and gave them all their lunch, expecting to get to Yoncalla at noon. They reached there at 8 o'clock at night and the restaurant man and the woman at the hotel both refused to get them any supper but they finally persuaded the latter to get them some cold coffee and bread and butter. They met five cars going south, all of whom were having about the same experience.
