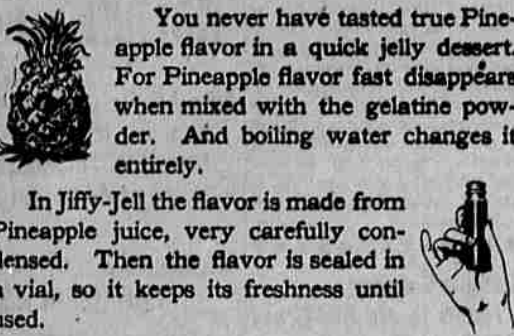

ANOTHER AFFIDAVIT IN BOMB CONSPIRACY TRIALS REPUDIATED

Charge of Misconduct Against District Attorney Charles M. Fickert Now Said to Have Been Wrongfully Obtained.

(By The Associated Press)
San Francisco, May 30.—An affidavit retracting a statement made to the police was added today to the public's supply of information and bewilderment as to murder trials being conducted here to place responsibility for a bomb explosion last July which killed ten persons.

Rufus S. Patterson, who made the retracting affidavit is serving sentence for conspiring to put an innocent man in jail in order to get a reward. The affidavit sets forth that Patterson was persuaded by promise of liberty and \$100 to make a statement to Duncan Matheson, captain of detectives, charging District Attorney Charles M. Fickert with misconduct in the so-called bomb cases.

Patterson now says, in the affidavit held by Fickert, that his charges were prompted by hope of gain.

Existence of the affidavit became known in a tiff between Fickert and a police commissioner at a hearing on another subject.

ZETA KAPPA PSI WILL HAVE LOCAL CHAPTER

National Forensic Honor Society for Women to Be Represented at University.

The national forensic honor society, Zeta Kappa Psi, notified the University of Oregon local, Gamma Zeta, by telegram Wednesday that their petition had been acted upon favorably by the national council and a chapter would be installed at Oregon. The local chapter is making hurried preparations for formal installation Friday evening.

Zeta Kappa Psi is the only national forensic society for women in the United States. It was founded at the University of Kansas in 1913 and the University of Oregon will be the fourth chapter admitted. The University of Ohio was also acted upon favorably but their chapter will not be installed until next semester. Zeta Gamma will become the Gamma chapter of Zeta Kappa Psi.

The local chapter was established last year and admits only women who have represented the University in debate or oratory. The members at present are: Vivian Kellens, who is a member of both the varsity and co-ed teams; Rosalind Bates, who has entered for the Failing and Beekman oratorical contest, and who was on the varsity debate last year against O. A. C.; Amy Carson, peace orator and member of the co-ed team; Roberta Schubel, on the co-ed team, and Marie Badura and Helen McDonald, both members of the sophomore debating team.

The formal installation of the Gamma chapter will take place Friday night in Villard hall to be followed by a banquet at the Osburn hotel. All four chapters of the fraternity will hold celebrations at the same time. Differences between eastern and western time have been taken into account so that the ceremonies at Kansas, Missouri and Wisconsin will be carried on at the very minute the Oregon chapter is being made part of the national society.

ITALIANS CONFIDENT OF GAINING TRIESTE

Capture Is Inevitable, Members of Commission Visiting in America Assert.

Washington, May 30.—The Italian mission visited Annapolis today and later returned to Washington. Recent military events in Italy are being followed with the most tense interest by members of the mission who say that the fall of Trieste now is inevitable.

Trieste, however, is viewed as a side issue to the main offensive which is now directed toward opening up the road to Ljubljana, which in turn opens the road to Vienna. Sharp mountains stand before the Italian advance and it is estimated it will cost 500,000 men to pass them. General Cardona, it is thought, is seeking to avoid this loss by going around.

Dr. Hillis to Campaign in Interest of Liberty Loan

San Francisco, May 30.—Doctor Newell Dwight Hillis, pastor of Plymouth church, Brooklyn, N. Y., and Lawrence Chamberlain, banker and bond expert of New York, arrived here today on their tour of the country in the interest of the Liberty loan bonds.

INCREASED POSTAGE RATE FOR PAPERS IS WAR TAX PROPOSED

Senator Hardwick of Georgia Would Make Levy of 3 to 8 Cents Pound for Advertising Portions of Publications.

Washington, May 30.—Administration influence was brought to bear today in favor of amending the war tax bill to increase postage rates of newspapers, magazines and other publications enjoying the cent-a-pound rate.

Postmaster-General Burleson conferred with Chairman Simmons of the senate finance commission revising the bill and urged the committee to adopt the amendment of Senator Hardwick of Georgia to increase second class postage rates.

Mr. Hardwick's plan would add \$20,000,000 this year and more in subsequent years to second class rates by a tax ranging from 3 to 8 cents a pound upon the advertising proposition of publications, retaining the present rate only on news space.

Support to the Hardwick plan by the postmaster-general follows its recent endorsement before the committee by two of Mr. Burleson's chief aides. It was understood that Senator Simmons told the postmaster-general that sentiment is not strong in the committee for inclusion of the Hardwick amendment. The question will be brought before the committee when it resumes its revision work tomorrow.

Cross-examination of shippers was conducted today evidently with intent to show that protests are chiefly local and not representative of countrywide interests.

George F. Cummins, representing the United Light and Railway companies of Iowa, declared that increased rates would have a disastrous effect on lighting, heating and electric traction companies.

Protests of Washington fruit and other interests were presented by J. Curtis Robinson and W. T. Clark, fruit dealers, and O. O. Calderhead, statistician of the Washington public service commission. J. A. Little, representing North Dakota shippers, filed statistical exhibits and arguments to show that the carriers enjoyed a light operating expense and heavy operating revenue in the state.

FARMERS OPPOSE MAXIMUM PRICES

Secretary of Nebraska Co-operative Association Goes to Washington to Protest Legis

Lincoln, Neb., May 30.—J. W. Short-hill, secretary of the Nebraska Co-operative Grain and Livestock association, will go to Washington Friday as a representative of co-operative grain and livestock associations in 11 middlewestern states to protest to congressional committees considering food legislation against fixing maximum prices for farm products. Farmers and grain dealers are opposed to price fixing, Mr. Short-hill said, "except as a last resort and unless it is evident the commodity is in control of a monopoly."

Mr. Short-hill said he would appear "especially for the grain producers of the middle-west." He said he would represent associations in the following states: Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Nebraska, Kansas, North Dakota, South Dakota, Iowa, Minnesota, Oklahoma and Colorado.

"We are opposed to government legislation fixing maximum prices for any commodity unless it is known to be under monopolistic control or unless it is to break a speculative corner," said Mr. Short-hill. "The agricultural interests of the west are unalterably opposed to government interference with the prices of farm products in any degree."

The agricultural interests, however, would not oppose fixing a minimum price for farm products, Mr. Short-hill said, but neither would they advocate legislation to that end.

French Plan to Forestall Socialist Peace Efforts

Paris, May 30.—A bill which has reference to the decision of the French socialist convention at Stockholm was introduced in the chamber of deputies today by Paul Pignatelli-Conti. It provides that "whoever concludes or attempts to conclude any convention or negotiations of political, diplomatic, military, economic or social character, aside from the constituted governmental authorities, either with subjects of an enemy power or with an assemblage embracing a foreign enemy, shall be punished with five years' imprisonment and a fine of 10,000 to 50,000 francs."
