quired for graduation at the present time, 180 hours will be demanded. Of course, each hour will represent less work than at the present time.

A student may attend one term and then miss one, attend two and miss one or attend all three in succession. Fifteen hours will be the required amount for each semester, in order for graduation in four years or twelve terms.

The faculty's action is answer to the recent call of the National Council of Defense asking that arrangements be made whereby students could furnish help in harvest.

CONSCRIPT DOCTORS IS PLAN IN MICHIGAN

Attorney A. K. Meck Receives Letter From Brother in Bay State Bringing This News.

Attorney A. K. Meck has received a letter from his brother, Dr. H. L. Meck, of Petersburg, Mich., in which Dr. Meck writes that Michigan wants 600 doctors for its quota of the United States medical corps, and that if they are not enlisted by June 3, they will be conscripted. Those who are between the ages of 22 and 35 will be taken. Doctors who enlist will be given rank of first lieutenant or better, while those who are drafted will be ranked as non-commissioned officers. Dr. Meck wrote that he was going to enlist at once.

UNIVERSITY YEAR TO BE OF THREE TERMS

Faculty Recommends That Session Be Divided for Benefit of Farmers' Crops.

The University of Oregon school year will be divided into three semesters next year providing the board of regents agree to the plan. The faculty recommended last night that this action be taken.

Object in view is to make it possible for the students to spend more time working. If a student cannot attend a whole year, he may attend two terms or even one. The terms will be approximately three months long. Under the present system, a student cannot quit without completing nearly five months' work.

October 1 will be the date of opening day next year under the new plan and the term will close on December 21. The second term will begin January 2 and last until March 22. The third term will start April 1 and end June 17. Instead of the 120 hours which is re-

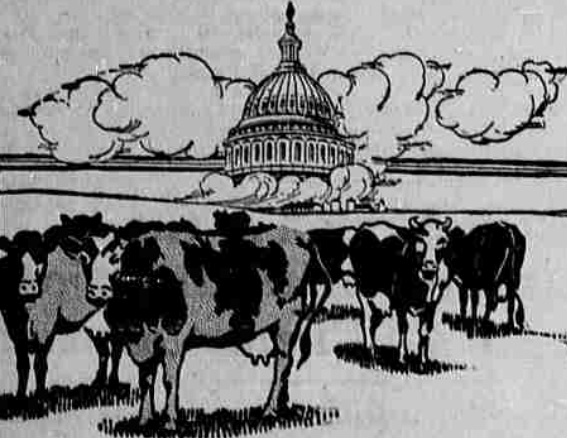
