OREGON POULTRYMEN WILL HOLD SESSION

Meeting Planned in Connection With State Fair With View to Increasing Production.

On the ground that the problem of feeding the nation as a result of war is not the work of months, but of years, E. J. McClanahan, president of the Oregon State Poultry Breeders' association, today announced plans for a state-wide meeting of Oregon poultrymen, to be held in connection with the Oregon state fair at Salem this fall. At that time it is proposed to outline a campaign for the spring and summer of 1918.

Poultry associations in other states will carry out similar plans in an effort to render patriotic service to country by increasing the meat supply through the raising of poultry.

Mr. McClanahan has received a copy of an appeal by E. E. Richards, president of the American Poultry association, calling upon poultrymen to continue hatching chickens during the months of June, as follows:

"For fear that there may be a cry for bread in this blessed United States, let each of us do our bit. Every citizen with a flock of poultry in the back yard, every farmer with his flock of turkeys, ducks, geese or chickens, should continue his hatching during the months of June.

"We must produce more poultry meat than ever before to help supply the great shortage of food that seems inevitable. With poultry, we have a means of supplying the most desirable—the cheapest and quickest meat product of any other source of meat supply.

"The wonderful agricultural resources of the United States, in these war times are going to be taxed to the uttermost, for in addition to supplying our home demands, we shall be called upon to aid in supplying food to millions of suffering humanity in the world's torn and stricken war zone. Remember our friends in the trenches. Let us each do our bit."

HIGHWAY HEADS WILL DISCUSS BOND ISSUE

Adams and Benson Coming to Mass Meeting; Band to Play in Park.

Two of the three state highway commissioners will be present at East Park public mass meeting tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock to discuss the road bond issue. They are Simon Benson, of Portland, and E. J. Adams, of Eugene.

The band will be at the park to furnish live music and other entertainment will be provided.

This will be the most important meeting held in Lane county and a large crowd is expected.

Mr. Adams and Mr. Benson, chairman of the commission, will make clear the policy of the commission with reference to construction of roads and handling of funds. They will give special emphasis to construction of hard-surfaced roads and explain the points which will be of special benefit to Lane county.

Mr. Adams and Mr. Benson will arrive on the Oregon Electric from Portland tomorrow morning. Other speakers will be here to discuss and explain constitutional amendments limiting the number of bills that can be introduced into the legislature, the amendment to provide against repeal or constitutional provisions, and the uniform tax classification amendment and other measures to be voted upon.

SCHOOL EXHIBIT IS ATTRACTING MANY

Work of Industrial and Art Departments of Eugene Schools Is Shown.

The exhibit of the industrial and art departments of the Eugene public schools was opened at McMorran & Washburne's store Friday morning. No attempt was made to show the work of all the pupils, only a few of the best being shown because of limited space.

The exhibit in one of the Willamette street windows is attracting the attention of many passersby. There are on exhibition samples of turning, of sewing, carpentry and art work of far more than average quality.

The main exhibit, however, is on the second floor.

The work of the high school manual training classes, under Donald G. Robey, is represented by a number of excellent pieces of cabinet work. Among the most attractive are a photograph record case by Robert McMurphy, a roll top desk by O. Michaelson, a chair by M. Basanetto, a dining table by Harold Wells, and other articles by various others of the high school.

There were several very creditable pieces of carpenter work from the sixth grade where this work is taught by Donald McGoggy. There is also a very good exhibit of sewing by the junior high school girls, done under the direction of Mrs. L. H. Enright.

The art department, under Miss Jennie Mae Snidecor, is represented by work in the various lines, including charcoal work, drawing and coloring. The work in perspective and architectural drawing from the high school is especially accurate and neat.

There are a large number of bird drawings shown, they having been made in connection with the spring study of birds in the nature course.

The exhibit as a whole is a credit to the schools of Eugene and is being visited by many parents and others.

Germany Is Reconciled to Loss of Kiau-Chow

(By The Associated Press)

Copenhagen, June 1, via London.—From an article in the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin it appears that Germany has reconciled herself to the loss of Kiau-Chow, her former Chinese possession and the South Sea island colonies, which were captured by Japan. Commenting on rumors regarding difficulties between Japan and Russia, the newspaper declares Germany undoubtedly is ready to cede the lease of Kiau-Chow in direct negotiations with Japan in return for repayment of the millions spent in making it a German base in the east, and also is willing to discuss the future disposition of the South Sea colonies.

Paroles Are Sought by Interned German Seamen

(By The Associated Press)

San Francisco, June 1.—Paroles for many of the 200 Germans interned at the Angel Island detention camp here will be obtained soon, it was announced today by department of justice agents. Sailors from confiscated German vessels, and Germans taken from American ships, are among those who have made application for parole on advice of United States authorities, who are investigating the case of each applicant.

State Commissioners Are Opposed to Rate Advance

(By The Associated Press)

Washington, June 1.—Western state railroad commissioners today presented to the interstate commerce commission at its hearings on the application of the roads for a general advance of fifteen per cent in freight rates, data intended to show the effect of the Adamson law on operating expenses of the carriers. The purpose was to prove that the proposed increase is not justified.

W. G. Powell, rate accountant for the Nebraska railroad commission, presented figures on several lines north of the Missouri river.
