San Francisco, June 2.—Whether or not baseball will be continued in the Pacific Coast league seems to be a question which will be decided by Uncle Sam rather than by the officials of the organization. One or two of the teams could manage to survive the selective draft in the event that members of the club were called on for service but others would be hopelessly shattered. The Klamath region in Oregon-California, considered one of the paradise spots for the fighters of the Pacific coast, has not been furnishing its usual good fishing owing to the backwardness of the season. The streams are heavily swollen by melting snows and the continued cold has prevented the hatching of flies which has resulted in the fish not jumping. With the arrival of warm weather, however, it is predicted that the fishing will be the best in many years for it is said that the fish never were more abundant. As a matter of fact fishing along the entire coast is not as good as it should be at this time of the year due to the coldspring.

"Dummy" Taylor, the famous pitcher for the New York National league team for 10 years, will endeavor to demonstrate that his pitching arm is still good in Spokane, Washington, on July 4. Opposing him will be Batiste, full-blooded Indian, who four years ago pitched for Portland in a 10 to 1 victory over Spokane, who also is a deaf mute.

The two mutes will appear in a game scheduled between teams representing Spokane and Seattle, as part of the convention of the Washington Association for the Deaf, to be held in this city July 3, 4 and 5. While it has not been definitely settled it is likely that every member of the two teams will be mutes.

Willie Hoppe, the world's champion balk-line billiard player, now in Los Angeles, where he expects to spend the summer. Hoppe has stated that he will not touch a cue for at least a month or six weeks. Even with this comparatively short lay-off, the champion says that it will take him a month's practice to get back to the top of his form but he figures he will be all the better for the rest. He is reported to have made \$51,000 on his last tour of the country.

The good form being shown by the San Francisco team of the Pacific Coast baseball league with the result that they are at the head of the percentage column has materially increased the attendance at the games. It has been an axiom of the game that the crowd will always find the winning ball team while the losers are wondering what has become of the attendance. With Los Angeles and Vernon down at the bottom of the list the truth of this is apparent, for the gate receipts in the southland have not been as encouraging as they might be.

RAILROADS WIN POINT

Washington, June 2.—The Interstate commerce commission held today that it is without authority, in the absence of undue discrimination, to order railroads to acquire equipment of a special type or to require the transportation of refrigerator cars on passenger or special trains.

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GERMAN CATHOLICS MAKE PEACE EFFORT

Rector of Institute in Paris Tells of Plans Aided by Residents in Switzerland.

Paris, June 2.—An effort on the part of the German Catholics to get into communication with the French Catholics on the subject of peace, is revealed in La Croix by Monsignor Baudrillart, rector of the Catholic institute in Paris.

"On May 18 last," writes Monsignor Baudrillart, "there was held at Olten a meeting of Swiss Catholics summoned by the famous German center deputy, Erzberger. The latter obtained the assistance of Swiss Catholics with a view to taking action with the entente bishops in favor of an early peace."

"Erzberger's motive, which he permitted expression before his most trusted friends, was this: Germany is at the end of her resources and must have peace as soon as possible."

M. Baudrillart says he rejected the advances thus made and gives his reasons for so doing, declaring it was not for the Catholics to enter into relations with the enemy.

FIRST FOOD BILL IS PASSED IN SENATE

Administration Measure Carries Appropriation of \$11,101,000 for National Survey.

Washington, June 2.—The administration food bill today was adopted by the senate by an aye and nay vote.

The bill appropriates \$11,101,000 for an immediate investigation of the food resources of the country and for other measures to stimulate agriculture and facilitate the distribution of farm products. A similar measure has been passed by the house, appropriating \$14,770,000 for the purpose. The bill will now be sent to conference.

The senate accepted an amendment by Senator Newlands to permit paroling during the war of federal convicts who have served 90 days' imprisonment, providing they are employed in industries or agriculture.

An amendment by Senator Borah to include Idaho in the area affected by the private acre homestead act was adopted as well as one by Senator Jones of New Mexico, prohibiting creation of forest reserves in New Mexico and Arizona except by act of congress.

Senator Thomas reintroduced his amendment to regulate food speculation but it was rejected. One by Senator Husting, empowering the secretary of commerce to buy and sell fish also was voted down. It was similar to the one by Senator Fletcher rejected yesterday.

MANY GOING FISHING

McKenzie and Siuslaw Attracting Eugene Fishermen.

Numerous fishing parties left Eugene Saturday night and prepared to leave Sunday morning for fishing points in the county. Those going down to the Siuslaw went out on the Cook Bay limited Saturday afternoon while most of those going to the McKenzie waited until early Sunday morning.

Blue and Red Uprights, Golden Spinner and Brown Neckles were favorites for fly fishermen. Stores report more sales of these than of other varieties. Golden spinner was another fly in demand this week-end.

The waters seem a little too high yet for spoon or spinner fishing, though a good many fish have been landed with these baits.

R. S. Smith, local attorney, planned to go up the McKenzie Sunday morning. W. B. Follett, local life insurance agent, with a party, went down the Siuslaw.

Farming Operations Are Carried on in Canal Zone

Ancon, Canal Zone, May 21.—Farming operations are being carried out in the suitable sections of the zone, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, originally begun as a military move to prepare the isthmus for a siege, the operations have been stimulated by the scarcity of food and the call from all parts of the world for increased production.

The United States government is operating more than a dozen plantations for the growth of garden truck and fruits, has 40,000 acres of land cleared for the pasture of cattle, has stocked Gatun lake with imported food fish in addition to the indigenous varieties, has begun a hog farm and has 12,000 chickens already on hand.

THREE BILLION DOLLAR BUDGET IS COMPLETED

Senate and House Conferees Reach Agreement on All Questions, Including Provision for Acquisition of Ships.

Washington, June 2.—Three billion dollar war budget, including provision for \$75,000,000 for an American merchant marine, was today completed by the senate and house conferees who reached agreement on all questions.

The shipping legislation was reshaped so the president will direct and be responsible for the acquisition of the merchant vessels, but specifying that the emergency fleet corporation, headed by General Goethals, as well as the government shipping board, must be used in the work.

The appropriation of \$10,000,000 to be spent in the discretion of the secretary of war was stricken out. Today's action is final and complete.

GERMANS SEEK DIVER BASE OFF VENEZUELA

Reports of Enemy Plans Received by State Department Causes Concern.

Washington, June 2.—Reports have reached the government from a source described as reliable that Germany is attempting to get control of the island and Margarita, off the coast of Venezuela, for use as a submarine base. The state department has forwarded the information received to Venezuela for the consideration of President Gomez.

The exact nature of the advice is withheld, but officials permitted it to become known today that the report had caused some concern here. They indicated that they had positive confirmation of overtures designed to secure control of the island but that they were uncertain whether the effort had met with any degree of success.

Utah-Idaho Millers and Grain Dealers Win Case

Washington, June 2.—The interstate commerce commission today affirmed its decision in favor of the Utah-Idaho Millers and Grain Dealers association in the case against the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad affecting the property of the so-called differentials between wheat and flour rates from Utah and Idaho to Nevada and California.

The commission had held that the flour rates should not exceed by more than five cents per hundred pounds the present rates on wheat, which required the railroads to reduce the flour rates. The decision says that under the adjustment of rates which the railroads had made, Utah and Idaho flour was virtually barred from the California markets and the decision sought equalization of the rates to avoid discrimination.

ed, but that about ten miles would be built in each county each year until the main roads were completed. He denied that there was any graft behind the bill, and said that he had offered \$10,000 reward for proof that there was, but declared that the graft was in front of the bill, trying to stop its passage. The cement trust, he said was this graft: that the members of the trust were recently fined \$2500 each for violating the law and immediately raised the price of cement 40 cents per sack. The macadam roads in Lane county were good roads for team traffic, he said, but once the roads in Douglas county were built so that tourists could come in from the south that the macadam would be gone in a few months, hurled over the fence by the cars.

The cost he said would be borne by the automobile owners, but would not cost them anything, as the saving in gasoline, tires, upkeep and depreciation would amount to ten per cent of the present outlay, which was estimated at \$34,000,000 per annum.

Mr. Benson stated that he had made \$6,000,000 on a borrowed capital of \$800 and that the people of Oregon could make an equally good investment by voting the bonds. The bonds he said would not be paid for by taxes, but not only these roads but the lateral roads needed would be built from the profits of the state from these roads, and a big margin left.

J. H. Devers, former district attorney was introduced to talk on the measure providing for a new penitentiary. Mr. Devers set forth the unsanitary, uncomfortable and disgusting condition of the present penitentiary, stating that the inmates were confined two in each cell seven by six feet, with almost no ventilation; that the toilet accommodations would be tolerated in the poorest tenement. He strongly urged the people as a matter of common justice and decency to authorize the erection of a new penitentiary.

Girl Power Going to Waste

Camp Fires Need "Guardians" to Direct Energies of Youngsters.

"But we can't get anybody. They're all too busy!"

An eager-eyed twelve-year-old, intent on enlisting as a Minute Girl, pressed close to the secretary's desk in the reception room at Camp Fire headquarters in New York.

"We've asked all the big girls and they won't," she accused contemptuously. "They have tons and liter's societies and play bridge and go round all the time with beaux. We can't get them to be guardians and hike—they just won't."

Every day the headquarters mail is full of letters telling the same story—girls want to enroll, follow the Service program, wear the uniform, but older women cannot be found to enlist as the "Guardian" necessary to form a Camp Fire unit.

There are 95,000 Minute Girls doing team work in Camp Fires all over the country.
