

GENERAL HAIG'S ARMY PREPARES FOR OFFENSIVE

Artillery Activity Indicates That British Commander Has Chosen Wide Sector for Next Big Blow.

All the familiar signs which herald a great offensive are reported from the British front in France and everything points to the near approach of a resumption of fighting on a great scale in the western front. The thunder of the British guns increases day by day in volume while trench raids and other feintings for position multiply in number.

The most interesting feature in the meagre official reports is the repeated announcement of a tremendous artillery duel in progress around the little Belgian village of Wytschaete, about five miles south of Ypres. From this point as far south as the famous Vimy ridge, thirty miles away, the guns are roaring day and night, apparently indicating that General Haig has chosen this wide sector for his next big blow. In this connection it is recalled that General Maurice, director-general of military operations, predicted some weeks ago that the next British offensive would be on a vast scale than any which preceded it.

GERMANS REPULSED

Berlin, June 5, via London.—In mentioning the heavy artillery fire that has been in progress for days past in the Wytschaete salient on the Belgian front, today's army headquarters statement reports the advance of detachments to learn the effect of the fire. Such advances it is declared, invariably have been repulsed.

ALLIES ARE REPULSED

Sofia, via London, June 5.—The repulse of numerous French and British attacks on the Macedonian front is claimed in an official statement issued by the war office on Monday.

BRITISH TAKE PRISONERS

London, June 5.—Only minor raiding operations are reported from the British front in France. Several prisoners were taken by the British near Ypres, the war office announced today.

ATTACK GERMAN WORKS.

London, June 5.—The aerial attacks on German establishments in Belgium are being continued vigorously by the British. Further operations were reported officially today as follows:

Naval airplanes on Sunday night attacked the airframe at St. Denis Westrem, near Ghent. Many bombs were

dropped with good results. The enemy's airplane base at Zeebrugge was attacked by our seaplanes at the same time and shipping in Bruges also was bombed. All our machines returned safely.

ITALIANS ARE REPULSED

Vienna, Monday, June 4, via London, June 5.—Increasing activity near Jamiano on the front above Trieste where several Italian attacks were repulsed, is reported in today's official statement which says:

"It is evident from a careful estimate that the Italian losses in the tenth Isonzo battle surpass all the previous sacrifices of the enemy. In the course of the nineteen days of the battle at least 35 Italian divisions were engaged in the first line, so that along a front of forty kilometers half of the Italian army attacked. The enemy's losses in killed or wounded positively surpass 100,000 men. Moreover we took 10,000 prisoners, making total Italian losses 180,000 men."

"For his part, the enemy occupied Mount Kuk and the destroyed village of Jamiano, which gains hardly justify the cry of victory on the second anniversary of the war with Italy. Indisputable success remained ours."

FRENCH REGAIN GROUND.

Paris, June 5.—The positions captured by the Germans northwest of Froimont farm on the Aisne front were retaken yesterday by the French, the war office announced. Violent artillery fighting occurred in the Champagne.

AUSTRIANS DRIVEN BACK

Rome, via London, June 5.—Massed attacks by the Austrians on the Italian lines south of Gorizia from Dosso Fati to the sea have been repulsed after severe fighting. The Italians not only succeeded in stopping the Austrian rush between Castagnavizza and Jamiano, but by counter attacks even succeeded in taking advance positions in this sector, the war office announced today.

RUSS FORCES ADVANCE

Petrograd, June 5, via London.—(British Wireless Per Wireless Press)—Russian troops have made an advance south of Baneh, near the frontier between Persia and Turkey, the war office reports. Attacks by Kurds were beaten off.

GOUTOR TO COMMAND

Petrograd, June 5, via London.—General Goutor, who has been commander of the eleventh army, has been appointed to succeed General Brusiloff in command of the southwestern front.

Monday night's Petrograd despatches announcing the appointment of General Brusiloff as commander-in-chief of the Russian armies said that General Guero (or Guero, as it is sometimes spelled) commander of the Russian western front, would be General Brusiloff's successor. Apparently this was an error induced by the similarity in names.

General Goutor earlier in the war was chief of the general staff at Kazan, in eastern European Russia.

THE BARA RECEIVES NECKLACE OF INTAGLIOS

Miss Theda Bara, the famous William Fox screen star, of "The Tiger Woman," at the Savoy today and tomorrow, has been the recipient of many strange and wonderful gifts from unknown admirers but one which is remarkable for its beauty and value was sent to Miss Bara from an anonymous donor in Italy. This gift is a necklace of intaglios of exquisite carving and intrinsically of great value.

Accompanying the necklace was a letter explaining to Miss Bara that the sender of this rare gift was attached to a scientific expedition exploring the ruins of ancient Pompeii. While digging in some ruins he came across a chest on ancient jewels, in which reposed the string of intaglios in a rare state of preservation. Having always admired Miss Bara, he wrote, and having only the night before seen her in a William Fox photodrama in a moving picture theatre in one of the smallest Italian cities, adjacent to where he was making his scientific researches, then and there made up his mind that a string of such beauty and exquisite workmanship could only grace the fair throat of the most wonderful screen actress in the world.

Mr. Scavillio Anonymos, the sender, concluded his letter with a request that Miss Bara wear the famous necklace in her next vampire picture, as he was sure that the intaglios must have once graced the neck of a Pompeian vampire many hundreds of years ago.

when the president mounted the platform. Many veterans crowded around him and shook hands before he began his speech. Thousands stood on the streets outside the hall.

The president said he felt there was some significance in the coincidence that at the moment he was welcoming the former host of the Confederacy to the capital they sought to destroy, additions of young men were registering themselves for service to keep the world free.

"These solemn lines of young men going today all over the union to the places of registration," said he, "ought to be a signal to the world to those who dare flout the dignity and honor and rights of the United States, that all her manhood will flock to that standard under which we all ought to serve and that he who challenges the rights and principles of the United States challenges the united strength and devotion of a nation."

"We have prospered with a sort of heedless and irresponsible prosperity. Now we are going to lay all our wealth, if necessary and spend all our blood, if need be, to show that we were not accumulating that wealth selfishly, but were accumulating it for the service of mankind."

"Men all over the world have thought of the United States as a trading and money-getting people, whereas we who have lived at home know the ideals with which the hearts of this people have thrilled; we know the sober convictions which have lain at the basis of our life all the time and we know the power and devotion which can be spent in heroic ways for the service of those ideals that we have treasured. We have been allowed to become strong in the providence of God that our strength might be used to prove, not our selfishness, but our greatness and if there is any ground for thankfulness in a day like this, I am thankful for the privilege of self-sacrifice which is the only privilege that lends dignity to the human spirit."

I. W. W. THREATEN TROUBLE

Lansing, Mich., June 5.—Governor Sleeper today ordered a squad of national guardsmen rushed to Negaunee, a nearby mining town. Reports from Negaunee said that I. W. W. agitators there were threatening to forcibly oppose registration.

QUIET IN MONTANA.

Helena, Mont., June 5.—Registration was carried out here today in a brisk fashion and in the best of order. No disturbance of any kind is expected here by the officials. Registration in the state generally is regarded as due to be effected without incident.

ALL SALOONS CLOSED
(By The Associated Press)
San Francisco, June 5.—Registration proceeded here early today without disturbance. Superior Judge Graham of the county council of defense, and Registrar Zemansky after a tour of the polling precincts, said that the bulk of the citizens would be registered by 2 o'clock. San Francisco's quota had been estimated at 60,000. All saloons and practically all business houses were closed.

EXTRA POLICE ON DUTY

New York, June 5.—Called to their duty by whistles of factories and of ships in the harbor, New York's young men thronged to the registration places early. The booths were guarded by policemen and members of the Home Defense league, and in districts peopled by foreign born classes, federal agents and city detectives patrolled the streets. In the armories, 10,000 national guardsmen were kept on duty, while the regulars were held in readiness in the army posts about New York.

SEATTLE REGISTERS EARLY.

Seattle, June 5.—Registration proceeded without noteworthy incident in Seattle today. Men of military age made

haste to get on the rolls early, instead of holding back. Officials do not look for any disturbance or for any general evasion of the law.

ENROLL IN MIDDLE WEST.

Denver, Colo., June 5.—Holidays or half holidays proclaimed in many sections by legal authority, coupled with meetings to stimulate patriotism, were expected today to make the enumeration of all eligibles an easy matter. In Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming. No where was disorder anticipated, unless at Farmington, N. M., where trouble was reported last night.

The returns from Arizona, New Mexico and Wyoming will be among the last to reach the provost marshal-general because of the lack of communication facilities.

Alleged anti-selective draft propaganda at East Las Vegas, N. M., and the action of Pueblo Indians in opposing the draft because they are not allowed the franchise were not expected to develop any serious difficulties.

MEXICANS REGISTER.

El Paso, Tex., June 5.—Six veterans of the Confederate army marched in a body to a registration headquarters here today and offered their services to the country. The youngest was 70.
Hundreds of Spanish-speaking young men registered here today. Many are Mexican citizens who will be exempt from military service.

THREE SHOT IN DETROIT.

(By The Associated Press)
Detroit, Mich., June 5.—Three men were shot this afternoon in a saloon fight resulting from an argument over the selective draft. Over a hundred men participated in the struggle which took place after two men had come to blows over the subject. The saloon was wrecked. All the men involved were foreigners.

GERMAN IN CUSTODY

New York, June 5.—The first arrest on a charge of opposing conscription occurred in Hoboken, where Otto Schroeder, born in Germany, was taken into custody for distributing hand bills attacking the draft law.

ONE ARREST AT BUTTE

(By The Associated Press)
Butte, Mont., June 5.—Registration proceeded practically without a hitch in Butte today. Men are crowded about all the registration booths of which there are 16 in the city and 25 in the county outside the city. But one man, John Lennon, was arrested. He went into the registration booth but refused to give his name. At the city jail he said he had decided not to register and would not go to war. The company of troops sent here yesterday from Helena is not in evidence today.

ITALIAN IN CUSTODY
San Francisco, June 5.—Vincent Fer-

rero, an Italian, was the first man arrested here today for attempting to interfere with registration. He was taken into custody by a secret service agent for attempting to incite a crowd of Italians to resist registration.

Governor Stephens sent the following telegram today to Provost Marshal-General Crowder, in Washington:

"Registration proceeding satisfactorily in California. The registration is much heavier than was expected. No disturbance reported and the people of California are responding in a most patriotic manner."

At the state bureau of registration it was said registration at 2 o'clock was almost twice as great throughout the state as had been expected by that hour.

CROWD CHASES DISTURBER

Omaha, Neb., June 5.—D. E. Ensigen, a young man claiming to be only 20 years of age, was arrested this afternoon charged with obstructing registration. Following some derogatory comment by Ensigen, a crowd, estimated at 300, chased him through the downtown streets until he was rescued by the police.

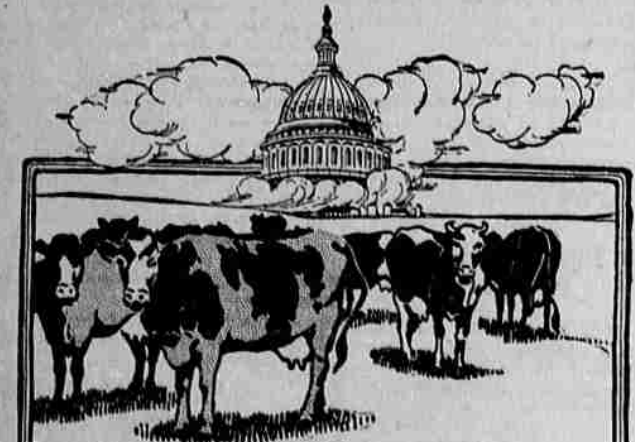
