AMERICAN WOMEN TO TAKE PLACES OF MEN, IS BRITISH PREDICTION

Miss Christabel Pankhurst Says Charge in This Country Will Be Even Greater Than in England and France.

(Correspondence of the Associated Press)
London, May 25.—The war will cause a greater stimulus in women's activities in the United States than it has done among the women of Europe, in the opinion of Miss Christabel Pankhurst, daughter of Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the leader of the British militant suffragettes. Miss Pankhurst has recently returned to England after two years of self-imposed exile in France, with the exception of some months spent campaigning in the United States. She left England when the police objected to her too strenuous methods of suffrage propaganda, which brought her into prison on several occasions.

"American women," she said, "will take men's places to an even larger extent than they have in England and France. The result will be that the women of America who already enjoy more privileges than their sisters on this side of the Atlantic will have a still larger measure of freedom after the war when, I believe, all who want the vote can have it."

"I think I know the women of America," she went on, "and I can just see how they will throw themselves into the spirit of these days of strife."

"The women of the United States are quick witted and adaptable. For this reason they will replace men in a larger variety of industries than even the French and British women have done. At the same time their work will spell efficiency which will prove a good argument for their retention in many places after the war is over."

"The chivalrous American men will not overlook the sacrifices of the women in war time and he will recognize the same as men in England are doing, that women are bound to show the same wisdom and patriotism in the use of the ballot. However, as regards votes for women in England, which nearly every one believes is sure to come after the war, if not before, all I care to say is that we will believe it only when we see it."

It is easy to see that Miss Pankhurst has lost her heart to France. "The French," she continued, "remind me of the simplicity of your Abraham Lincoln. They are at once courageous, joyous and willing to work modestly and quietly for victory. They know they have made great sacrifices, greater by far than any other country but they never hear them utter a word of complaint."

Miss Pankhurst said she was one of those who believed that nothing could be more cheering to the French at this stage of the war than to see an American army fighting on her soil.

The eyes of the entire old world, she declared, seemed to be turned to the new world and anxiously watching for the power they knew was in the United States to assert itself in the world struggle.

BRITISH MAY MAN INTERNEED VESSELS

Plan Decided Upon by Government, If Enough Americans Can Not Be Secured.

Washington, June 6.—Many of the German vessels seized in American ports at the beginning of the war may be manned by British merchant marine officers if enough American officers cannot be found for them. The shipping board recommended to President Wilson today an extension of the Panama canal proclamation of 1914, which would permit this.

The government expects to have great difficulty in finding both officers and men for the German ships and for the great fleet of vessels the shipping board are preparing to build.

Congress will be asked soon to empower the president to suspend certain provisions of the navigation laws to permit an interchange of American and Canadian shipping on the Great Lakes and to allow British vessels to ply between American ports and Porto Rico.

A shortage of coastwise shipping on the Atlantic, Pacific and Gulf coasts, it is believed, may be met under the law creating the shipping board. The law permits the board to operate in coastwise trade any vessels it may charter. Foreign vessels, therefore, may be chartered and operated by the board for coast ships. At present they are barred from engaging in coastwise trade.

German Food Supply Is Declared to Be Sufficient

Berlin, via London, June 6.—It is officially stated that at a conference between the Prussian house of lords and the heads of the various government departments it was decided that there was complete assurance that the food supply was sufficient for the remainder of the crop year and until the conclusion of a victorious peace.

GERMANS DESTROY BOMBS.

STREET REPAIRING TO BEGIN THURSDAY

City of Eugene to Purchase Mixture of Clark-Henry Construction Company.

The city of Eugene will commence the work of repairing the paved streets of the city this week. Under the terms of an agreement with the Clark-Henry Construction company that company will deliver the hot mixture at its mixing plant for the fixed price of \$7.50 per ton. The city will haul and spread the mixture, using the equipment of the Clark-Henry company, the rental of the equipment being included in the ton price. This price also includes the services of Sam Laird, one of the construction superintendents of the company, who will oversee both the making of the mixture and the placing it upon the streets.

The mixing plant will be started Thursday and the actual work on the streets as soon thereafter as possible.

The Warren Construction company is just completing the repairs on certain streets which it put down and on which repairs were to be made by the company for a term of years.

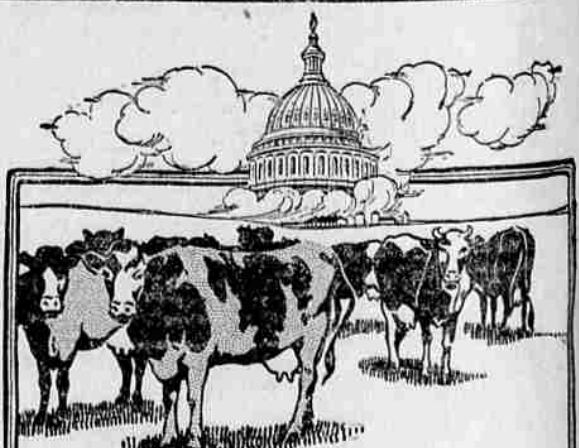

BRITISH SHOOT DOWN FOUR GERMAN PLANES

(By The Associated Press)
London, June 6.—Four of the German airplanes returning from yesterday's raid over England were destroyed by British pilots, it is announced officially.

One British pilot who pursued the Germans toward Dunkirk brought down two of the raiders. Later ten British machines from Dunkirk engaged the returning Germans, destroying two of their machines and forcing down four.

Sixteen German airplanes took part in the raid over Essex and Kent, dropping bombs which killed two persons and injured 29. Two German airplanes were brought down by British anti-aircraft guns while the raid was in progress.
