## LOCAL BOARD TO PASS UPON DRAFT LAW EXEMPTION

Special Body for Each Community of Approximately 30,000 Population Will Be Appointed by President Wilson.

Washington, June 7.—To pass upon claims for exemption from military service under the conscription law, local boards will be appointed for approximately 30,000 population. This was announced today by the provost marshal general's office in a statement saying: "There will be a local exemption board for approximately each 30,000 population. The power of appointing these boards rests with the president but the task is so large that a general plan for their selection has been outlined by the president.

"These local boards will have to do especially with self executing exemptions, that is, those in which exemption depends only upon the determination of facts as, for example, whether a man is a federal, state or judicial officer, whether he is a clergyman or whether he comes in any other way within any classification for which exemption is specially provided in the selective service law.

"In each federal judicial district there will be at least one board of review to which appeal may be taken from local boards and which will have also original jurisdiction in the exclusion of discharge from the selective draft of persons engaged in industry, including agriculture found to be necessary to the maintenance of the military establishment or the effective operation of the military forces or the maintenance of national interest during the emergency.

"The exemption regulations are not in final form. When they are they will be promulgated by the president."

## MOTHER PLAINTIFF IN SUIT AGAINST SON

Susannah M. Findley Alleges Charles Findley Took Advantage of Her Illness.

Susannah M. Findley has brought suit against her son, Charles Findley, asking that the assignment of a mortgage of \$600 which she made to him be set aside. She alleges that he took advantage of her illness and told her that it was necessary for her to assign the mortgage to him to protect her property, but that he would reassign it to her. He refuses to do this, according to the complaint, and also refuses to satisfy the mortgage unless he gets the money in payment of the note secured by the mortgage. Mrs. Findley is represented by Walter B. Jones, who was also the notary who acknowledged the assignment. The complaint was filed in the circuit court Wednesday.

## AMERICA WILL AID FRENCH WAR PLANS

Andre Tardieu Tells of Full Cooperation of United States With Entente Allies.

(By The Associated Press) New York, June 7.—Working plans for complete co-operation between the United States and allied governments in the prosecution of the war with Germany were announced today by Andre Tardieu, high commissioner in charge of the permanent French war mission, which has been fully organized.

The inter-allied commission in Europe will determine the needs of the respective allies and they will be communicated to the missions here which in turn will submit them to the United States. The United States government will determine whether it will be possible to meet the needs in this country, taking the requirements of the American fighting forces into consideration first.

The United States government will act as contractor in this country for the allies and as such will have complete control of prices and deliveries. No further contracts for the French and British governments will be signed with private concerns.

## RIOTS IN BOHEMIA ARE VERY SERIOUS

Demonstrations Verge on Proportions Revolution Against Austrian Rule.

(By The Associated Press) Chicago, June 7.—Word that demonstrations verging on the proportions of revolution have broken out in Bohemia against Austrian rule was received here today by J. F. Smetanka, secretary of the Bohemian National Alliance, from Dr. Edward Benes, grand secretary of the Bohemian Slovak national council at Paris.

"The cablegram tells of riots at Prostějov, Moravia, Ostrava, Budejovice and Prague, before the governor's palace and continues: "Address of the Czech club, complaining all Czech deputies not in jail, to the reichstag says: 'We demand the union of all the Czech-Slovak lands into one democratic state, of which the Slovaks must be a part.'"

## TRAINING CAMP PLAN FOR OFFICERS GIVEN

Only Those Who Give Promise of Making Good to Take Second Course.

(By The Associated Press) Washington, June 7.—The policy of the war department with respect to men now under training to become reserve officers was outlined in a statement today by Adjutant-General McCain, stating the process to be followed with each class of candidates.

"The best qualified of all reserve officers and candidates will be selected to become officers of the regiment which the training company represents," it says, adding that these officers will be supplemental to the men appointed from the regular service for each new regiment. The number of men to be taken in each grade cannot be decided until the number to come from the regulars has been determined.

The remainder of the qualified men at the training camps will be commissioned as reserve officers, to aid in the training of the new armies as additional officers of each regiment and this class will be drawn upon from the supply of temporary officers for the regulars and active officers for the second five hundred thousand of the selective army.

"It is more a matter of enforcing a high standard than of approaching a large number," the statement adds, "and it should be borne in mind that other training camps will follow if the war continues.

"An excellent man with three months' training is much superior to a weak man with a year's training; hence, it is better to rely on the excellent man of the next camp than to rely on weak men, no matter how much time they have devoted to training."

General McCain says that only those men who give definite promise of being efficient officers with additional training will be encouraged to repeat the course and enter the second camp.

## MAY END TONG WAR

Portland, Or., June 7.—Portland Chinese tongmen announced today they had received notice that the six warring tongmen signed a two weeks' armistice June 4 at the request of the Chinese Peace society of San Francisco. The armistice expires June 18 and in the meantime the society is endeavoring to make an amicable settlement of the war Chinese have fought up and down the Pacific coast during the past several months.

## APPEAL FOR DOCTORS IS MADE BY ENGLAND

American Medical Association Asked to Send at Least 200 to Front Each Month.

(By The Associated Press) New York, June 7.—Colonel T. H. Goodwin, ranking medical officer of the Balfour commission, today appealed to the American Medical Association convention to send 200 doctors and 200 nurses to the western front each month, declaring that human endurance cannot stand much more than the surgeons of the entente allies are now undergoing. "On a short line there are from 20,000 to 30,000 wounded in but a few hours," he said. "Shall we leave them there or get them to the hospitals? I think you will realize that the medical men must be on the firing line if the wounded are to receive proper care. Our losses of medical men have been considerable."

Among the speakers today was Dr. R. W. Corwin of Pueblo, Colo., Dr. Arthur D. Boyan of Chicago was elected president of the association for the years 1918-1919.

## France Is Much Pleased Over News of American Registration

Paris, June 7.—"The socialist conference at Stockholm, without the participation of American, Italian and French delegates will lose a great part of its prestige," says Jules Cambon, general secretary to the minister of foreign affairs today. It will not have the practical character its organizers expect. We appreciate that the United States has shown by its refusal to provide socialist delegates with passports that the greatest democracy in the world will not consent to tolerate that any party should substitute itself for the regular government of the country.

"The news of the enthusiasm with which the Americans celebrated June 5 and the returns from the registration," said M. Cambon, "has been received with the greatest satisfaction by Frenchmen."

## Conference Report on War Budget Bill Is Rejected

(By The Associated Press) Washington, June 7.—The house today rejected the conference report on the \$3,281,294,641 war budget bill because of a \$3,000,000 appropriation inserted by the senate for the purchase of the old Jamestown exposition site and buildings, and the construction of a naval base and training station there.
