CHARGE OF SCANDAL DENIED BY HARDING

Senator Says Statement Referred to Information About "State of Unpreparedness."

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, June 8.—Senator Harding, Ohio, republican, disclosed in the senate today that lack of public confidence was retarding subscriptions to the Liberty Loan and in the interest of unity senators were withholding information which "might call" for investigation and shake the confidence of the American people in the conduct of the war.

Senator Harding was speaking in reply to Senator Lewis, the democratic whip, who had attacked Senator Harding's Declaration day speech at Columbus, Ohio, in which he referred to Secretary McAdoo's bond selling methods as "hysterical" and "unseemly."

Senator Harding referred to recent executive sessions of the senate at which the practices and conduct of the Council of National Defense were assailed. Senator Reed insisted on having facts and Senator Harding said his statement referred to unpreparedness.

"I have information relating to unpreparedness," said the senator. "I do not construe my remarks as meaning that anything dishonorable or of a scandalous nature was charged."

Senator Reed retorted that the Ohio senator had thus modified his statements but added that newspaper headlines and the public would not so construe them.

"I want to stamp out here and now," said Senator Reed, "the insinuation that there is anything serious or infamous that would startle the American people."

Senator Harding did not continue the discussion and the incident closed.

CASE IS DISMISSED WITHOUT PREJUDICE

Motion Is Granted by Judge G. F. Skipworth in Suit of Meek Against Dimm.

A motion to dismiss the case of Meek vs. Dimm, was argued in the circuit court Thursday afternoon and Friday morning. Judge G. F. Skipworth granted the motion, and the case was dismissed without prejudice.

A jury was then drawn in the case of C. D. Johnson vs. John R. Fitzgugh. The plaintiff alleges in his complaint that he hired to the defendant to work for him for an agreed price of \$75 per month, that he worked from November 25, 1916, until February 1, 1917, and that only \$13.50 was paid him. He asks a verdict for \$144.06 and costs and interest. O. H. Foster is attorney for plaintiff and H. E. Slattery for defendant.

Three Are Killed When Storm Sweeps Oklahoma

Oklahoma City, Okla., June 8.—Three men are dead, another is reported to have been killed, scores were injured and incalculable property and crop damage done by tornadoes and violent wind storms which swept over parts of Oklahoma last night. Hundreds of cattle are reported to have been killed and many oil derricks thrown down.

Council Hill and Pumpkin Center, two small villages, are reported to have been wiped out. Wires are down and definite communication is lacking.

McNary Is Sworn as Senator From Oregon

Washington, June 8.—Senator Charles L. McNary of Oregon, appointed to succeed the late Senator Lane, was sworn in today.

LATE BULLETINS

AMERICAN SHIP SUNK.

Paris, June 8.—The torpedoing of a gth American steamer and the shelling and sinking by the submarine of the small boats in which the steamer's crew were escaping is reported by the survivors of the French three-masted sailing ship Jeanne Cordonnier. The French ship was torpedoed in the English channel on May 31 and the crew reached Havre in open boats. They declare they witnessed the destruction of the American ship after their own vessel had been sunk.

INDICTED FOR TREASON

Columbus, Ohio, June 8.—Late today three Columbus men were indicted for treason by the federal grand jury on charges of having conspired to resist the draft. They are Ammon Henney, Cecil Bailey and Harry Townsley, who were apprehended while printing and distributing anti-conscription literature.

SOCIALISTS' MEETING OFF

London, June 8.—"Owing to various circumstances," the general meeting of the international socialist committee set for today in Stockholm could not be held, says a Reuters despatch from the Swedish capital tonight.

It is rumored, says the message, that the meeting has been postponed until September.

WILSON PICKS "LIVE WIRES" AS OFFICERS IN GREATER ARMY

Rule of Strict Seniority Is Disregarded When President Nominates New Major Generals and New Brigadiers.

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, June 8.—In nominating three new major-generals and eighteen brigadiers today, President Wilson disregarded strict seniority and went down into the list for "live wires" for the greater army.

In addition to the army promotions, more than 200 officers of the navy were advanced to higher grades, among them Captain Hugh Rodman who becomes a rear-admiral.

Washington, June 8.—President Wilson today nominated these brigadier-generals to be major-generals: John F. Morrison, William L. Sibert and Charles G. Morton.

Eighteen colonels were promoted to be brigadiers. They are: Edwin F. Glenn, John Biddle, Henry C. Hodges, Jr., Adelbert Cronkhite, William H. Sage, Omar Bundy, Richard M. Blatchford, David O. Shanks, Robert L. Bullard, Augustus O. Blockson, George T. Bartlett, Joseph T. Dickman, Henry T. Allen, Chase W. Kennedy, Harry C. Hale, Samuel D. Sturges, William M. Wright and Peyton C. March.

TO PREPARE ARMY CAMPS

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, June 8.—Contracts for the construction of cantonments for the selective army will be awarded this week. The war department announces that it had adopted the cost plus a percentage of profit form of contract in order to get maximum speed and efficiency in the work.

In a statement issued tonight through the public information committee it is pointed out that quarters for more than 600,000 men are to be provided before September 1, the date when the first selective troops are to be called to the colors. Each training center will house 40,000 persons.

An emergency construction committee was appointed by the National Defense council to aid the quartermaster's department in the big work.

Contracts are to be let on a seven per cent basis to cover overhead costs and contractors' compensation, with an upset of \$250,000.

Six Masked Men Attack Iowa National Guardsmen

Fort Dodge, Iowa, June 8.—Six masked men last night attacked the Iowa National guardsmen who were guarding a bridge here, it became known today. The soldiers returned for more than twenty minutes engaged. It was said one of the attackers was shot. None of the soldiers was injured.

American Artist to Paint Wilson's Picture for Irish

London, June 8.—According to the Dublin correspondent of the Times, John Sargent has accepted a proposal from the governors of the national gallery of Ireland to paint a portrait of President Wilson. It is recalled that Sir Hugh Lane, who was drowned on the Lusitania, offered ten thousand pounds for a portrait which Sargent had undertaken to paint in behalf of the Red Cross.

Sir Hugh Lane bequeathed the prospective picture to the Irish national gallery and the bequest was confirmed in a court decision handed down on Wednesday. James Stephens, writing on behalf of the gallery governors, said to the president: "It is the opinion of the board that the portrait of the greatest American president, painted by the greatest American artist, would be a real acquisition."

Effect Is Made to Admit Laborers From Canada

Washington, June 8.—Secretary Wilson's ruling waving certain provisions of the immigration laws so that Mexican labor may be brought into this country for agricultural purposes has been extended so as to include labor from Canada. Because of a shortage of labor in the northern lumber regions, an effort also is being made to have the secretary include in the order labor for this work also.

62,985 Men Total War

colored registration 3,148; indicated possible exemptions 126,576.

The men eligible in the state for registration under the selective draft law had previously been estimated at 363,479 based on census bureau figures.

The total exemptions indicated by men registering in California including aliens, was 197,988, leaving 99,548 persons who claimed no exemption.

Registration of aliens in the state showed a total of 67,404 and 3,958 alien enemies were registered.

MONTANA SENDS TROOPS.

Washington, June 8.—Montana is the fifth state in the union to fill her quota of recruitings for the regular army. At the close of recruiting yesterday Montana had 834 war volunteers for the regulars against a quota of 752.

We cut the chicken in several pieces (noting on a slip of paper which parts were to be fried in Cottolene).

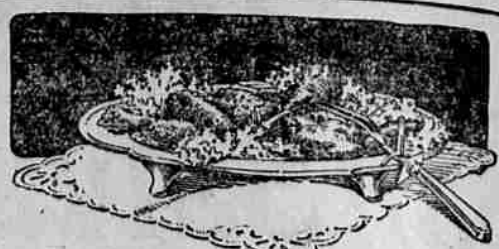

RUSSIAN PEASANTS URGE ARMY LOYALTY

"Lynch Law" Is Effectively Invoked to Suppress Thievery in Towns and Villages.

(By The Associated Press)
Petrograd, June 8, via London.—The congress of peasants in session here adopted a resolution today calling upon the army to submit itself to discipline and defend revolutionary Russia. The congress affirms the duty of those it represents to defend the country energetically and make every sacrifice to sustain the fighting strength of the army.

The text of the resolution adopted by the delegates of peasants follows:

"The peasants aspire to an equitable peace without humiliating annexation or indemnity and with the right of each nation to dispose of itself. International relations and treaties should be submitted to the control of the peoples interested. Dispute should be settled by an international tribunal and not by force. The congress approves the union of workers and appeals to the peasants of all countries to force their governments to renounce annexations and indemnities.

"The congress considers that it is its duty energetically to defend its country, recalling before no sacrifices in order to sustain the fighting strength of the army and the struggle for the safety of the patrimony of the Russian people. The congress summons the army to submit itself to discipline and defend revolutionary Russia of peasants and workers. It grants its benediction to this war and will not forget the blood which has been shed."

Minister of War Koresensky has ordered that the resolution be read to all ranks of the army and the navy.

Petrograd, June 7, via London, June 8.—"Lynch law" has been invoked by the peasants with good effect for the suppression of thievery in the towns and villages in the vicinity of Kharkov, according to advices from that city. Organized bands which flourished under the protection of the old police system are shown little mercy. The whipping post

has become the accepted form of punishment for lesser offenses, including the selling of home made intoxicants.

Italian Socialists Will Not Attend Stockholm Meeting

Rome, June 8, via Paris.—Minister of the Interior Orlando has confirmed the report that no passports will be given to Italian socialists who wish to participate in the conference at Stockholm.
