

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR TO RAISE ARMY FUND

Societies Forming Baseball League to Help Buy Entertainment for Soldiers.

Christian Endeavor societies of the state have formed a baseball league through which they will raise money for the Oregon troops. The money will be used in providing amusement for the boys during the long months of waiting.

The league was started by Miss Harbert who wrote to Chaplain Gilbert of the Third Oregon Infantry. Chaplain Gilbert approved of the work and said that good, clean amusement was the great thing that the men needed.

Societies may become members of the league by sending the price of a baseball to their district social service superintendent. Miss Louise Brown, of Dorena, holds this office in Lane county.

The first organization to join in Eugene was the society of the Central Presbyterian church.

The money will be expended through the Y. M. C. A. camps.

APPRECIATION IS SHOWN PRINCIPAL

Members of High School Faculty Commend Work of F. A. Scofield.

The following resolution commending the work of F. A. Scofield, retiring principal of the Eugene high school, was passed at a meeting of the high school teachers Saturday:

"The members of the Eugene high school faculty wish to make this public acknowledgment of the generous and fair dealing and earnest encouragement which Mr. Scofield has at all times given. He has done excellent work in giving organization to the administration of the curriculum, and to the maintenance of discipline; he has sought to secure a higher standard of accomplishment from both teachers and pupils; and he leaves the Eugene high school at the close of his two years of administration in a strong and stable condition."

Mr. Scofield leaves the Eugene schools to attend Stanford and Columbia universities, doing his first year's work at the California institution. He has been principal of the Eugene high school the past two years and is to be succeeded by A. C. Hampton, of La Grande, Oregon.

ONLY 16 MORE NEEDED IN AMBULANCE CORPS

Captain Kuykendall Expects Body to Be Full Tonight or Tomorrow.

Only 16 more men are needed for Red Cross Ambulance corps No. 14. Seventy men have been accepted for the service, and organizers expect the corps to be at full strength today or tomorrow. Several men are due from the cities of Medford and Tacoma.

Captain Kuykendall returned from Portland Saturday night where he talked with several University graduates and younger men who expect to be here to enlist today or tomorrow.

Three of the boys who have already been accepted and sworn into the ambulance corps are graduates of the Eugene high school this spring. They are Herbert Jones, Lester Edblom and Gaylord Peltier. A great many others in the graduating class are old enough to get into the corps and it is expected that they will be part of the remaining 16 needed to complete the corps.

AMERICAN SAILING VESSEL DESTROYED

Destruction of Magnus Manson by German Submarine Is Announced in London.

London, June 11.—The American sailing vessel Magnus Manson has been sunk by a German submarine. She was sent down after the crew had left her.

Private advices were received in Mobile late last month that the Magnus Manson, 1751 tons had been torpedoed off the French coast. The despatch received there stated that the master and crew were saved.

AMERICAN CREW HOME

An Atlantic Port, June 11.—Captain J. Urquhart and twenty members of the crew of the American sailing ship Dirigo destroyed by a German submarine on May 31, arrived today on the American steamship St. Paul. John Ray, one of the crew was drowned.

WHEAT CARGO LOST.

London, June 11.—The Belgian relief commission has received an unconfirmed report that the Norwegian steamship John Bakke, 1011 tons gross, with 2000 tons of wheat for Belgium by way of Rotterdam, has been sunk.

NORWEGIAN DESTROYED

New York, June 11.—The Norwegian steamship Askild, a vessel of 2264 tons gross register, which departed April 5 with cargo for England, was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine May 19 near the French coast, after leaving England for Africa, according to members of the crew who reached here today.

"We had time to take to the boats," Otto Bernsen, one of the crew said, "and then we had a narrow escape from death by shell fire. A French destroyer came up and fired on the submarine and the submarine fired back. We were between both craft in small boats and shells fell all around us."

ITALIANS TO LEAVE.

THE RED CROSS

Editor Guard:—The following paragraphs were clipped from yesterday's paper:

"Our people have talked of patriotism they have cheered the sacrifices of others, they have hung out flags, all of which shows a good spirit but what are they going to do? Are they going to cheer on their boys and their neighbor's boys to risk their lives and then not back them up and do their utmost to protect them when they are the most helpless?"

"If you don't go yourself send your money, and enough of it to enable you to hold your head up. Make your sacrifice big enough to stand beside that of the boy who has enlisted or of the mother who has sent her son."

What becomes of the money that is paid for the lessons to become a nurse's aid? There are a great many who would take the training and be ready to give their services when the time comes, but the classes are limited to twenty, the fees are \$3.50, \$2.50, \$1.50. When the Red Cross was organized after you paid your fee, you were entitled to this Red Cross training without additional charge. You were to take the examination and, if you passed, you sent fifty cents to Washington and you received your certificate and you were ready to enlist as a nurse's aid.

Mr. Hush, when he organized the chapter here, said distinctly everything was free and anybody could take the training.

My boy, all I have, and not yet 18 years of age, will go in July and if it was not for these fees, I too, would be ready to take the training and be ready to go if I am needed. While I would not likely be near my own, I would be helping some other mother's boys, as I hope some will help mine if help is needed.

But the fees are keeping me out, the same as others. It seems as though if we paid for the little booklet and were ready to enlist, the lessons should be free. If the work is taken only for our own special benefit then we should pay. If these fees went in to the Red Cross fund, instead of the individual pockets, we would try and get the money to take the lessons and be ready when the call comes. If this is patriotism, I fail to see it. It is like the ones who howl the loudest and call the other slackers, when they themselves do nothing. Let those who have the money give freely, let those who have not, and can give their service do their share just as freely.

EXPRESS CASE DECIDED.

Washington, June 11.—In the South Dakota express rate case the supreme court today annulled in part, so far as they exceeded the state's powers, injunctions of state courts against the American and Wells Fargo Express companies which required them to maintain certain lower intrastate rates despite interstate commerce commission tariffs permitting higher rates to prevent discrimination against Sioux City, Iowa.

The court through Justice Brandeis, reaffirmed its ruling in the Colorado Shreveport rate case and held that the federal commission, in regulating interstate rates has power to displace state rates fixed by local state authorities.

Sunday Newspaper Is Held Necessity by Iowa Court
