IS NOT PARTY TO
OUSTING OF KING

Washington Government Not Consulted About Allied Coup Which Dethroned Constantine of Greece.

ATHENS SITUATION IS
WATCHED WITH INTEREST

Will Hellenic Government Be Urged to Enter War or Will Entente Be Content With Passive Neutrality, Question.

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, June 13.—The United States was not consulted about the allied coup which dethroned King Constantine, it was said at the state department today and has not yet taken any part in complex European diplomacy.

So far, it was explained, the United States is more of a military and economic than a diplomatic partner with the allies. But intimations were given today that as one object of the United States in entering the war was to secure a just and permanent peace founded on equitable principles, the United States will begin to exercise an increasing interest in all readjustments in Europe, especially in the Balkans.

Great interest now centers in whether the allies, having dethroned Constantine, will urge Greece to actively enter the war or whether they will be content with their passive neutrality removing all threat from a rear attack on the forces at Saloniki. The allies have at least 650,000 men in the Balkans.

This force, even without Greek aid, is capable of a strong offensive, the prize of which would be the splitting of the central empire by the isolation of Turkey and Bulgaria. The crumbling of Russian and Rumanian strength, however, has smashed the other jaw of the pincers and has made an offensive problematical.

PARIS IS ELATED

Paris, June 13.—The vigor with which the French senator, M. Jonnart, on special mission to Athens as the representative of France, Great Britain and Russia, began the settlement of the Greek problem in obtaining the abdication of King Constantine and Crown Prince George has caused much satisfaction.

That he will succeed in helping Greece to get on her feet again in the shortest possible time, notwithstanding many difficulties, which still remain, is the unanimous opinion. The new Greek ruler, Prince Alexander, Constantine's second son, is expected to prove friendly to the allies.

The Saloniki expedition has been attacked by many in France as useless but every one is agreed that the force once there ought to be given every opportunity to accomplish its purpose. It was admitted that with the perpetual menace of a stab in the back from the Greek royalist army, that the expeditionary force was doomed to partial inaction. Encouraged by the moderation of the entente allies, whose over patient policy was attributed largely here to the opposition of the late Russian regime to strong measures, Constantine eluded most of the guarantees extracted from him during June and December of last year and continued his intrigue with Germany. The blockade alone kept him from active hostility. If he could get the Thessaly crops into his hands, not only would the entente allies lose a weapon but he would add considerably to the difficulties of the Venizelist forces who counted on gaining a part of the crop. M. Jonnart, after a series of rapid consultations with the entente allied ministers and with the Greek premier, Alexander Zaimis, decided upon quick and drastic action and proceeded to Saloniki where he arranged with General Sarraill for military assistance.

BRITISH COMMENT.

London, June 13.—In its comment upon King Constantine's abdication, the Westminster Gazette says:

"The allies were absolutely sincere in expressing their desire to protect the integrity and independence of Greece. Prince Alexander will have fair play as a constitutional ruler and his country, if it so chooses, as an honest neutral."

CONSTANTINE IN ATHENS

TO RECALL VENIZELOS

It is expected that former Premier Venizelos will be recalled to power over united Greece and will work cordially and loyally with the new king.

RUSS SITUATION
AT KRONSTADT
REACHES CRISIS

Garrison Passes Resolutions Demanding That Council Obey All Commands by Central Government.

Petrograd, June 12, via London, June 13.—The Kronstadt revolt has reached a new critical stage, owing to the formal repudiation of the secessionist council of deputies. The garrison also virtually unanimously passed a resolution demanding that the council obey all the commands which the provisional government issues in defense of the revolution or in defense of Russia against a foreign enemy.

PEASANTS URGE LOYALTY

Petrograd, June 12, via London.—The all-Russia council of peasants delegates after discussing at a special sitting the recent events at Kronstadt, passed the following resolution by a vote of 1,000 to 4:

"This congress wishes to inform the inhabitants of Kronstadt that the peasants will stop the despatch of all food to Kronstadt if the town does not immediately join the revolutionary forces to those of the Russian democracy and unless it recognizes the provisional government."

The resolution urges the government to demand the absolute submission of Kronstadt, and, in event of refusal to adopt energetic measures.

RUSS OUTLOOK BETTER

Petrograd, June 12, via London, June 13.—The provisional government is making rapid progress toward constitutional reconstruction and domestic reform. This week there is sitting a council of sixty-one members which aims to prepare for elections to the constituent assembly, which will not only draft Russia's permanent constitution, but will also solve immediate problems, such as the questions of nationalities and the transfer of the lands of the nobles to the peasantry.

RUSS DISCUSS NOTE.

Petrograd, June 12, via London, June 13.—Russian feeling on President Wilson's note emphasizes a cleavage between the temporary government and the socialist element. All newspapers supporting the government hail with the greatest enthusiasm what they term "the straightforward exposition of characteristic American diplomacy."

The socialist organs, however, accuse President Wilson of using high-toned language and vague phrases embodying principles unacceptable to the Russian democracy and even hinting that the declaration of the United States government against a policy of imperialism and annexations is insincere.

Grand Jury Has Been
Called Back for Friday

TO ROUND UP SLACKERS

PARIS PLANT WRECKED

PERSHING JOINS
WAR FORCES ON
FRENCH GROUND

Arrival of General, Who Will Command American Force, at Boulogne on Way to Paris Is Announced.

GREAT PRECAUTION IS
TAKEN DURING VOYAGE

Steamer Is Guarded by Destroyers and Accompanied by Hydroplanes and Dirigible Balloons. British Pay Tribute.

Paris, June 13.—General Pershing landed at Boulogne this morning and will arrive in Paris this evening.

General Pershing was met at the quay by General Pelletier, representing the French government and general headquarters of the French army; Commandant Hue, representing the minister of war; General Lucas, commanding the northern region; Colonel Daru, governor of Lille; the prefect of the Somme and other public officials. British soldiers and marines lined up along the quays rendered military honors as the vessel flying the Stars and Stripes, preceded by destroyers and accompanied by hydroplanes and dirigible balloons, steamed up the channel. Military bands played "The Star Spangled Banner" and "The Marseillaise" as General Pelletier and his party boarded the boat to welcome General Pershing.

CHEERED BY FRENCH.

Boulogne, June 13.—The channel steamer Invieta with Major-General Pershing and his staff on board, steamed in port at 9:40 o'clock this morning. It was welcomed with cheers from French territorial and British sailors and soldiers on shore, to which British troops between decks replied lustily. British and French military bands struck up "The Star Spangled Banner" as the ship came to the dock. General Pershing stood on the deck, surrounded by his staff.

After the representatives of the French authorities had been presented to the American officers, the American landed and reviewed the French territorial. The Americans then entered motor cars for a ride around the city. All along the route they were followed by crowds who greeted General Pershing with the greatest enthusiasm. At 11 o'clock the general received a number of American and French newspaper correspondents. He then departed for Paris on a special train.

MISSION FROM RUSSIA
ARRIVES IN AMERICA

Delegation of 40 Members Headed by Boris A. Bakhmeteff Makes Quick Trip.

Washington, June 13.—The Russian mission to the United States headed by Boris A. Bakhmeteff as special ambassador, has landed at a Pacific port. The party, consisting of about 40 members, will stop first at Seattle, Wash., and proceed at once to Washington.

The mission passed through Yokohama about 11 days ago and consequently made a quick and easy trip. Baron Ungern, one of the secretaries of the Russian embassy here, met the party and will escort it across the continent to Washington. In Chicago Breckinridge Long, third assistant secretary of state, will join the mission. Such courtesies as were extended to the visiting British, French and Italian special missions will be extended to Ambassador Bakhmeteff and his party.

The head of the Russian mission comes to Washington in a double capacity, first as the head of the extraordinary embassy sent by the provisional government to extend to the United States government its thanks for entry into the war on the side of the entente allies and to arrange for material assistance from this country, and second, as ambassador-resident, until such time as the provisional government can make a permanent appointment.

GERMAN ATTACK FAILS.

London, June 13.—The repulse of a German counter attack on the positions newly gained by the British along the Somme river is announced by the war office.

GERMANS REPULSED

Paris, June 13.—The following official communication was made public here this afternoon:

"Artillery fighting occurred in the region of Moulin de Laffaux, Mont Camille, the Butte du Mesnil, Hill 304 and Des Paroches. A surprise attack undertaken by the enemy in the vicinity of La Haute Chevauchée was repulsed. Everywhere else the night was comparatively quiet."

TEUTON AIRMEN
SHOWER BOMBS
UPON ENGLAND

London Is Visited in Fourth Raid of Recent Series of Attacks Made by Kaiser's Aviators.

SCHOOL HOUSE STRUCK
BY HIGH EXPLOSIVE

Ten Children Are Killed and Fifty Injured. Total of 49 Dead Reported by Secretary of War Derby.

London, June 13.—The death of 49 persons and the injury of 200 in today's air raid was announced in the house of lords today by the Earl of Derby, secretary of state for war. The secretary said he feared these figures would be exceeded when fuller reports had been received.

Several engagements between German and British airplanes occurred during today's raid but the results at present are uncertain, it was announced tonight.

The official statement says numerous bombs fell rapidly in the east end of London. The raid over the city lasted about 15 minutes.

London, June 13.—The east end of London was bombed today by fifteen hostile airplanes. A large number of British airplanes pursued the Germans who flew over Essex to London.

A bomb struck a schoolhouse killing ten children and injuring fifty. One German airplane is reported to have been brought down.

In the house of commons, Chancellor Bonar Law said thirty-one persons had been killed and sixty-seven injured in the raid over London, as far as ascertained.

The east end of London, in which live the city's poor, suffered heavily from the raid. Bombs fell in many congested districts and while the number of casualties has not yet been ascertained, two hospitals report handling upwards of fifty cases, four of whom died and many of whom were seriously injured.

The German airplanes appeared over London shortly before noon. A great battle occurred in the air. The invaders were attacked by anti-aircraft guns as well as by British aviators.

"The following official statement was issued:

"Lord French (commander of the home defenses) reports that about 15 hostile airplanes were heard crossing the Essex coast, passing in the vicinity of the Nore (part of the estuary of the Thames) at about 11 a. m. They proceeded in the direction of London, separating when they had covered about half the distance.

"The east end of London has been attacked and bombed, but no reports have yet been received of casualties or damage done. Anti-aircraft guns of the London defenses have been in action. A large number of airplanes are still in pursuit."

LESLAND LINER SUNK.

Boston, June 13.—The Leyland liner Anglian, which left Boston May 30 for Liverpool, has been torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine, according to cable advices received by agents here today.

The advices stated that the crew had been saved, although officers of the Leyland line said they had no information regarding the attack or where the Anglian was sunk. On her last voyage from Boston she was commanded by Captain Lawrence and carried a general cargo. Ship and cargo were valued at \$2,000,000.

The Anglian, formerly the Megantic, was a British steamer of 5532 tons gross and was built at Glasgow in 1898.

Portland, Or., June 13.—Oregon has oversubscribed her quota of the Liberty loan bond issue by \$1,500,000, the total of subscriptions throughout the state having passed the \$10,000,000 mark today, according to the committee in charge of the bond selling campaign. The state's quota was \$8,500,000. The exact total has not been compiled, but the committee announces it is slightly above \$10,000,000.

George H. Kelly, of Portland, who a few days ago sent word ahead that he was coming to Lane county to work, not to make speeches, in the Red Cross campaign, is on the job. He spent the morning conferring with Lane county committee and mapping out his itinerary and his work.

He went to Cottage Grove this afternoon to work with the war fund committee of that place. Thursday morning he will go to Creswell to assist the aggressive committee selected there last night. Thursday afternoon he will be in Junction City, Friday morning in Springfield, Friday afternoon in Wendling and Marcola, and all day Saturday in Eugene.

"Lane county has got a good organization," Mr. Kelly said today. "You're going to raise the money here in Lane county and that's the main thing."

Mr. Kelly leans more towards work than towards speech-making, which he can do in good shape. If speeches are necessary in Lane county's campaign to raise \$19,700 for the Red Cross war fund, he is prepared to make them.

"All day Saturday I will be at the service of the Lane county committee in Eugene," said he. "I can outline my work and I'll do it. In any case, I want to see the business men."

REGENTS TO INVEST

STRUCTURE IN BONDS

\$15,000 Will Be Placed in Government Loan; Portland Woman Elected to New Department.

Decision to invest the \$15,000 pledged and subscribed to the women's building of the University into Liberty Loan bonds was made by the Board of Regents who met here today. More than \$8,000 has been paid in and the remainder is collectable.

Miss Lillian Tingle, principal of the girls' department of the Benson Polytechnic school, of Portland, was elected head of the new department of household arts at the University. She will take her work in October.

Provision was made for military courses at the University next year. In the case that a government officer cannot be obtained, the executive committee of the regents has the authority to hire some other instructor.

A. C. Dixon, member of the board, was elected vice-president. Mr. Dixon is now on his way home from Chicago. He has been attending the rate hearing conference at Washington, D. C.

C. C. Jerimah was elected to fill a vacancy in the commerce school made by the resignation of Prof. J. Hugh Jackson and C. C. Edmonds was chosen to fill the place made vacant by Prof. Allan Hopkins. Mr. Hopkins is now at the officer's training camp at the Presidio, Mr. Jackson will take up graduate study in the east.

The quarterly plan of the college year was adopted. The amount of work will not be lessened as a result and the time will not be shortened. The term will merely be divided into three seasons instead of only two. The first will open early in October.

Miss Caille Beck, of McMinnville, was elected to the position of instructor in the University Junior high school.

In his report, President Campbell said that 125 students would be serving in various parts of the army and navy before the summer was over.
