# 50 ARE TOO LATE FOR MEMBERSHIP IN UNIT OF EUGENE RED CROSS

Applications Pour in for Places in Ambulance Corps; Organization Expects to Be Called Within 10 Days.

More than 50 applications for membership in the University of Oregon ambulance corps have been received since the muster rolls were closed Monday, according to a statement made today by Captain John E. Kuykendall. The organization expects to be called into service within the next 10 days, in view of the fact that it was just eight days from the time the University of Washington corps notified the war department that it had been recruited to full strength until the call came. The Washington boys will leave Seattle for the mobilization camp at Allentown, Thursday or Friday.

"We have had no trouble getting men," Dr. Kuykendall stated today. "There has not been an hour since the muster roll was closed that some one has not called on the 'phone wanting to get in. Telegrams have been coming from all sections of the state. What we need is money. There is a great possibility that we may receive a call before we get funds needed for equipment. The Eugene branch of the Red Cross has promised help in a financial way, but there should be some independent subscriptions. These are needed very badly. It would be hardly fair to the Red Cross in this city to take too large a part of the fund it will have for expenditure at home. Subscriptions are needed and needed at once. Patriotic people who can afford to aid the ambulance corps should respond at once."

Among today's purchasers were Henry and Irene Anderson, children of Mrs. Jack Nice, 1267 Ferry street. The purchase was made through the McMullan and Washburne store. Mr. Nice is foreman of the Guard printing department.

patch adds, to remove from Athens those men who if possible are more responsible than Constantine for the events which led to the crisis; namely General Doumanis, Colonel Metaxas and former Premier Gounaris.

Former Premier Venizelos, defeated in his efforts to carry Greece into the war with the entente, left Athens in September of last year and established at Saloniki a provisional government for the northern part of Greece. This government declared war on Germany and Bulgaria and now has troops on the fighting front in Macedonia.

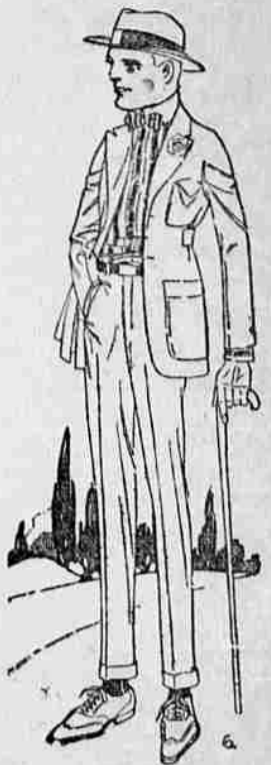

## BRITISH LOSE 22 SHIPS

London, June 13.—The weekly shipping report issued by the admiralty today states that twenty-two British merchantmen of more than 1,000 tons were sunk. Ten merchantmen of less than that tonnage also were sunk, together with six fishing vessels.

# FAIR WILL FEATURE NEXT GENERATION

Executive Committee of Fair Board Plans for Features of Exhibit.

Boys and girls will have a prominent part in the Lane county fair this fall. There will be a number of special prizes offered to them. The Radiators Drum Corps will furnish music each day and the Boy Scouts of America will assist as ushers in the grand stand, errand boys and otherwise as may be needed, if proper arrangements can be made.

The executive committee of the fair board met at the chamber of commerce Tuesday evening and laid the plans for the coming fair. They decided to increase the number of prizes offered for the products of boys and girls. The members of the Lane County Boys' and Girls' Pig clubs will be given special prizes of \$4 for the best and \$3 for the second best sow and litter of pigs; for the best weaned pig not over six months old, \$3, second best, \$2. Only Berkshire, Poland China, O. I. C., Duroc-Jersey and Hampshire pigs will be considered. This is open to any boy or girl in Lane county who may join one of the clubs.

Six prizes will be given to boys and girls who raise chickens under the chamber of commerce plan. The prizes will be \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25, \$1.00, 75c and 50c. Four prizes of \$1.75, \$1.50, \$1.25 and \$1.00 will be given to members of the Lane County Girl's Chicken club.

The boys of the drum corps and the boy scouts will be admitted free in exchange for their services.
