

# BOY SCOUTS WILL GO TO CAMP AT OAKRIDGE FOR TWO WEEKS' TRIP

## Rules Made to Insure Health and Safety of Campers; Special Precaution Is Taken Against Fire and Accidents.

More than 20 Eugene Boy Scouts will leave Eugene Saturday for the camp at Oakridge where they will spend two weeks. Others may sign up for the trip before Saturday. The Eugene branch of the National Physical Educational association, which is directing the project, has formulated the following set of rules for the young campers:

- The officers elected by the campers and the directors in charge of the camp must be obeyed and respected at all times.
- A daily program will be posted on the bulletin board of each day's activities, which must be observed and carried out unless changes in same are announced.
- Take Care of All Property. The best care possible must be taken of all camp property and equipment and particular attention paid that no damage is done.
- No member will leave the camp without the permission of the leader or director.
- No fires of any kind shall be built anywhere without the permission of a leader except the evening campfire.
- A camp library and confectionery will be open every day during the rest period under the supervision of a leader.
- No member shall enter the water voluntarily for any purpose at any time, or anywhere, without permission of a leader or director.
- No member shall rise between the time of taps and reveille, nor shall make any noise or disturbance that will awaken others.
- A tent leader will be selected from the members who will be responsible for the condition of the tent and who will see that the members of the tent are quiet between taps and reveille.
- There shall be no discourtesy shown during the morning devotions, evening discussion groups or talks.
- Each member will be expected to serve on the kitchen detail once during the stay in camp and once on a special detail to clean up the lodge.
- Table and tent assignments will be made according to registration selections being made by each member in the order registered.
- Table manners such as prevail in the ordinary home shall prevail in this camp.
- There shall be no profane or abusive language and no member will be allowed to dress so as to be the subject of criticism.
- Every tent shall be aired every morning and tents put in order during 12:30 camp duties. Appearance of tents will include the ground surrounding each tent, as well as the interior.
- No toilet shall be used by members of the camp other than the regular camp toilet within a radius of one mile.
- All garbage and refuse of any description must be disposed of at designated places. Dirty towels will not be tolerated and must be washed.
- Use Honor System.
- Every member of the camp will be expected to make something of value

which will benefit the camp during the stay in camp.

19. An honor system will be in use from the arrival until the leaving of camp and points will be awarded each member daily and the final standings given at the close of camp. Honor emblems will be distributed to those qualifying.

20. No member will be allowed to loaf around the camp or do other than what the camp program calls for unless sick or excused by a leader.

21. Failure to obey any of the above rules is shirking duty and members doing so are subject to appearance before the kangaroo court.

The following set of articles have been prescribed as necessary for every boy who goes Saturday: Plenty of bedding, one or two blankets, one or two comforters; changes of underwear; sweater; two or three pairs of old trousers; soft shirts; pajamas; bath towels; soap, comb, tooth brush and paste; heavy shoes; tennis shoes; handkerchiefs; Bible or Testament; mirror.

## DEFENDANTS WIN IN TWO CASES IN COURT

### Potato Case Finally Disposed of; Colgaard Held Not Liable on Bond.

The case of Latham vs. Morrison, involving damages for alleged sale of poor seed potatoes, which occupied the attention of the circuit court part of Friday and Saturday, all day Monday and part of Tuesday was decided by the jury in favor of the defendant. The verdict was brought in about 8 o'clock Tuesday night.

The case of the Mantle Lamp company of America vs. Peter Colgaard, was quickly disposed of Tuesday. The jury was called, the case presented and the verdict for defendant rendered Tuesday afternoon. The case was brought by the company to recover the amount of a bill alleged to be due the company from an agent named Hill, whose bond Colgaard had signed. The jury quickly decided that under the evidence the debt was not collectable from Mr. Colgaard, who is a merchant at Elmira. The jury consisted of Robert F. Sidwell, Clarence Burnett, R. M. Pratt, J. R. Parks, A. J. Johnson, Thos. J. Blakely, L. K. Pige, S. A. Bowles, J. L. Queen, W. H. Lackey, John F. Smith and Welby Stevens.

The case of Kahn vs. Lare, which was thrown out of court last week because a wrong juror got into the box by mistake, was called for retrial Wednesday morning. The court was compelled to take a recess while the court officers hunted up special veniremen to fill the jury, so many of the regular panel having been disqualified by sitting at the first trial.

## TO BUILD BARN AT LANE FAIR GROUNDS

### County Court and Members of Fair Board Meet and Plan Improvements.

There will be two more barns built at the county fair grounds before the county fair this fall. This was decided upon at a meeting of members of the county court and of the fair board, which was held Tuesday at the fair grounds.

It was decided to utilize the lumber used in the extra bleachers which were taken down last fall and the lumber put under cover. The joint committee decided to have an architect or surveyor decide upon the location of the new barns and the relocation of the old one, which will be moved to accord with the site of the new ones.

The sum of \$800 was recommended by the county budget committee last fall for this purpose and has been set aside by the county court.

Commissioners M. H. Harlow and E. R. Spencer, and Amos Wilkins, F. M. Wilkins, E. M. Warren, Henry Stewart and N. S. Robb, members of the county fair board, formed the party which made the inspection Tuesday.

## MISHLER WINS CASE IN SUPREME COURT

### Decision Handed Down Sustaining Judge J. W. Hamilton in Hop Case.

The verdict of the circuit court in the case of A. J. Mishler, respondent vs. J. M. Edmundson, appellant, has been affirmed by the Oregon supreme court, a copy of the decision having been received by the clerk of the circuit court Wednesday. The case is one involving the ownership of 184 bales of hops. Judge J. W. Hamilton, of Douglas county, presided, and the verdict was in favor of A. J. Mishler, plaintiff. J. M. Edmundson, the defendant, appealed the case and alleged error on the part of the presiding judge. The supreme court sustained Judge Hamilton on every point.
