CELEBRATE BIRTH OF NATION'S BANNER

Judge G. F. Skipworth Delivers Forceful Address Before Eugene Elks Lodge.

The spirit of deep loyalty sobered by the momentous crisis facing the nation was plainly in evidence at the flag day celebration held by Eugene lodge No. 357, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, at their lodge room Thursday evening.

The patriotic address was delivered by Judge G. F. Skipworth who briefly referred to the history of the American flag, stating that it had never been raised but in defense of human liberty and that it had never gone down to defeat. He spoke of the causes leading up to the present international situation, declaring that the American people were a peace-loving people and that at the beginning of the present world war the people were unanimous in wishing to keep out, but as the contest developed it had become so plain that the contest was one between autocracy on the one hand and democracy on the other that the nation had risen as one man and demanded that America stand for the rights of her people and the freedom of the seas. He paid a very high tribute to the historic address of President Wilson to congress in April last. While all cannot fight for the country, he said, each of us has a work to do and must be willing to make self-sacrifices to do that work and to see that the American boys in the field have every comfort and safeguard that is possible for them to have and that money will buy. The address was not the impassioned appeal of a campaign orator, but rather the keen, incisive judicial summing up of a trained legal mind. It was listened to with intense interest and greeted with hearty applause at its close.

June 14 is the birthday of the star spangled banner and on that day each year in every Elks lodge room in America the members of that order gather in their lodge room and celebrate the occasion. The celebration this year was even more impressive than usual. It has in the past been customary to make an especial display of the American flag from business buildings and residences on that day, but this year it is the exception, not the rule to see a building which does not show the red, white and blue, hence an unusual display was not noticeable.
