



AMERICAN STEAMER ENGAGES SUBMARINE

Two Torpedoes From German U-Boat Go Wide of Mark. Diver Driven Off.

An Atlantic Port, June 16.—An American steamer arriving early today reported an engagement with a German submarine off Brest, France, May 28, in which the U-boat fired two torpedoes, one at her bow and one at her stern, but neither found its mark. The naval gunners fired, but do not think they made a hit. After ten shots from the steamer the submarine disappeared.

Off the coast of Ireland the American steamer picked up three members of the crew of a Norwegian lumber ship which was torpedoed and sunk five miles ahead of the American ship. The survivors were landed at Queenstown.

Crossing the English channel the steamer received a number of "S. O. S." calls but was advised by patrol boats not to reply.

AMERICAN SHIP DAMAGED.

LOSS OF DIVER DENIED.

Amsterdam, June 16, via London.—An official statement issued in Berlin says the submarine sunk by the Kroonland could not have been German, as all German submarines which were off the Irish coast on May 15 have returned.

On the arrival of the American liner Kroonland at an American port on Thursday, it was made known that the liner had rammed and sunk a submarine shortly after two of the undersea boats had attacked her, one from each side.

Telephone and Telegraph Companies Aid in War Plans

Washington, June 16.—Private companies are supplying thousands of operators for the signal corps of the war armies. The committee on telegraphs and telephones of the Council of National Defense announces that the American Telephone and Telegraph company alone was organizing fourteen battalions of picked experts; the Western Union company has arranged for the instruction of 3000 additional Morse operators, and the Postal Telegraph company and various independent companies are also doing their share.

All are preparing to replace men operators with women in order to release the men for war service.

Body of Missing Girl Is Found in New York City

New York, June 16.—Detectives investigating the disappearance here of Ruth Cruger, four months ago today unearthed a girl's body believed to be hers, in the cellar of a motorcycle shop conducted by Alfredo Cocchi, who disappeared after the investigation was begun. The body was bound with a rope and wedged under a furnace.

Socialist in Danish Cabinet Opposed by Conservatives

Copenhagen, June 15.—Via London.—The response of Premier Zahle to the demand of the conservatives that T. Stauning, the Danish socialist leader and minister in the Danish cabinet without portfolio, quit the cabinet is still unknown. Indications are that the government will prefer to dispense with the conservative representative rather than the socialist representative if forced to choose.

TWO DIRECTORS TO BE CHOSEN MONDAY

Dr. Beardsley and Mr. Goodrich in No Sense Competitors for Position.

There will be two school directors elected at the regular annual school meeting to be held in the election room at the city hall Monday afternoon, June 18. There have been but two entered the race. L. J. Goodrich is a candidate to succeed himself and Dr. G. S. Beardsley is a candidate to succeed E. O. Potter, who declined to be a candidate. No other candidates filed for the position and no other names will be printed on the ballots.

Under the new law the budget has to be adopted at the annual election. The amount to be raised is placed on the ballot in dollars and cents instead of being voted on a millage basis as heretofore. The budget this year, as adopted and placed upon the ballot by the board, is \$1800 less than the amount appropriated for the schools last year. The total budget for this year is \$95,248 with estimated receipts from sources other than tax to be voted, \$20,387.85, leaving \$65,000.80 to be raised by district tax.

Photographs Taken Four Months Ago of Eruption of Volcano Which Destroyed Nation's Capital at Its Base.



San Salvador, capital of the nation of that name on the western coast of the Central American isthmus, was destroyed by an earthquake and an eruption of the great volcano El Salvador, along with six other cities. This photograph in perhaps the last taken of the volcano in eruption. Hamilton M. Wright, the well-known traveler, and author of a "Handbook of the Philippines," one of the best works on the islands, took the picture on a recent trip. He was fortunate enough to reach San Salvador while the smoke poured from the mountain. More than 200 persons in San Salvador have lost their lives through earthquakes or volcanic eruptions during the last two years.

JAPANESE STEAMER IS SUNK; CREW LOST

Tansan, Which Sailed From Boston May 9, Destroyed by German Submarine.

Boston, June 16.—The Japanese steamer Tansan Maru, which left Boston May 9 for Manchester, England, has been sunk by a German submarine. Cable advices to agents here today stated that Captain Nichikawa and the crew of 27, all Japanese, are believed to have been lost.

The Tansan Maru was under charter to Patterson, Wythe and company of Boston and carried a general cargo. Ship and cargo were valued at \$1,600,000. The vessel was unarmed.

Reports had been current in shipping circles for some days that the Tansan Maru had been lost, but it was not until today that the agents received definite information.

The Tansan Maru, formerly the British steamer Sir Charles Tennant, registered 2415 tons gross and was built at New Castle in 1894.

MORAL CO-ORDINATION OF ALLIES ADVOCATED

London, June 15.—Henry Franklin Bouillon, member of the French chamber of deputies and chairman of the inter-allied parliamentary conference, who is arranging inter-parliamentary conferences of the allies for this fall, speaking at the American Luncheon club today urged the vital need of the closest possible co-operation between the allies in what he hoped would be the final push war. He said:

"It has been our misfortune that some of our best plans have miscarried and we also have made some serious mistakes owing to the lack of co-operation and co-ordination. We must avoid such mistakes in the future. We must be prepared for the worst. We must be prepared for a situation in which we may not get all the assistance we expect from Russia, although everybody is still hopeful."

"So we are unutterably glad that what America has done in its organization of its manhood. But there is another thing still more than man power, namely, co-ordination of our moral determination never to stop until we have attained the ends set before us."

Thirty-Five German Aliens Are Admitted to Citizenship

San Francisco, June 16.—Thirty-five German aliens were admitted to American citizenship here today under a ruling made by Superior Judge E. P. Mogan, who held that those who had filed their applications for final papers before the declaration of war by the United States were eligible to become full fledged citizens.

EARL COOPER WINS AUTOMOBILE DERBY

Ralph Mulford Loses 250-Mile Race at Chicago After Leading Most of Way.

Chicago, June 16.—Earl Cooper won the 250-mile automobile race from Ralph Mulford here today, covering the distance without a stop in 2:25:28. Eddie Herne was third. Cooper averaged 103 1-3 miles an hour.

Averaging 104 1-2 miles an hour, Ira Vail, a dark horse led the first fifty miles with Joe Boyer second and Ralph Mulford third. Henning, Devigne, Patterson and Lecain were forced out of the race because of engine trouble.

Mulford was leading at the 100 miles having covered the distance in 57:21, an average of 104 1-2 miles an hour. Barney Oldfield and George Ruess were forced to quit because of engine trouble. Joe Thomas was uninjured when his car skidded in the back stretch, forcing him to withdraw temporarily.

Speeding at 104 1-2 miles an hour, Mulford was nearly two miles ahead of de Palma at 150 miles. The time was 1:24:14. Earl Cooper was third.
