

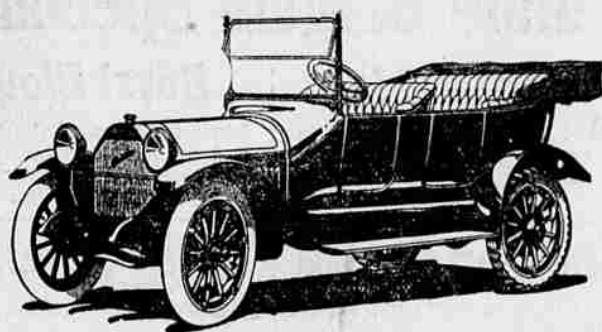

### POLICE DIG IN MANY CELLARS FOR BODIES

#### Italian Cocchi Is Key to White Slave Traffic in New York, Theory of Police.

(By The Associated Press) New York, June 21.—The cellar of every building occupied by Alfredo Cocchi, in whose shop the body of Ruth Cruger was found buried last Saturday, is to be dug up by detectives to learn if more girls met a similar fate. Work of excavating the cellars was begun today in several buildings in which Cocchi conducted motorcycle repair shops. No word of the arrest in Italy of Cocchi has been received by the police and it is feared that he has fled from Bologna where news was last received from him. Both Commissioner Woods and District Attorney Swan are working on the theory that Cocchi is the key to the white slave traffic in this city as revealed by Mrs. Grace Humiston, attorney for the Cruger family. Eight detectives were assigned today to the bureau of missing persons. Records of the bureau show that since January 1 between 700 and 800 girls and young women have been reported as missing.

### EXPECTS DIVERS WILL FORCE NAVAL BATTLE

#### German Writer Predicts British Fleet Will Strike in Effort to End Submarine Menace.

(By The Associated Press) Copenhagen, June 21.—The steady continuance of the submarine campaign will, in the opinion of Captain Kuehlwetter, the naval expert of the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger, ultimately force a general naval battle between the British and German fleets as the only means of ending the submarine menace. Captain Kuehlwetter blames the good weather for the falling off in number of submarine victims. He argues that the weather permits small submarine chasers to venture

further to sea, to shoot better and to detect periscopes easier.

In this argument the critics is quite impartial as he equally blames storms for the failure to secure better results in March. The other well schooled naval writers generally follow the admiralty instructions to treat the May results as practically as satisfactory as those of April and to describe the entire counter measures as a complete failure. They all accept the estimate of the Wolff bureau, the official news agency, that new tonnage is only one-fifth of that destroyed.
