Fishing Boat Launched—The launch Eliza Ann, built at Glenada by Yost Brothers for deep sea fishing off the Siuslaw, was launched yesterday, being christened by Miss Jane Colter. The craft measures 55 feet by 14 feet beam and is six feet deep. An ideal engine will be installed, and the boat manned by the builders, with Captain Hermann Wetzel at the helm. The tug Gleamer arrived here from the Umpqua to tow out the barges used on the jetty project. The rails from the jetty have been taken up and will be shipped at once to Seattle.

Lord Northcliffe, publisher of the London Times and London Daily Mail, along with many more newspapers and periodicals, has just arrived in the United States to head the British war mission here. He will have complete charge of the work to be done by the British officials, and will do all he can to show the American people why they should awaken to the importance of the war.

FOOD SPECULATION

From every hand come reports that American farmers are rising to the occasion and planning the biggest crops ever-grown. Everything the public can do will be done to help cultivate and harvest these crops. Patriotism and self-interest will take care of this part of the program.

There remains another of equal importance, and that is to see that the food produced on American farms gets to the right parties without waste and without extortion.

We believe we violate no rule of ethics when we declare that the right parties are the people who consume this food. The railroads must haul much of it from the villages to central distributing points. Grain must be ground into flour and meal. Live stock must be converted into beef and bacon. Butter and cheese must be made. Potatoes must be kept from freezing and beans must be cleaned and put into bags or cans. All of these products will have to be handled in different ways and sold to consumers or retailers or exported by proper authorities to our allies now fighting our battles in Europe.

In the past we have tolerated a scandalous amount of juggling and mishandling of these products. They have been bought by special agents or buyers; sold to jobbers; re-sold to wholesalers; held in elevators, cellars and warehouses and sold over and over again. They have been dumped into the river to force a shortage and stiffen the price. They have been shipped back over the routes whence they came. They have been cornered by gamblers on 'change. They have been bought by local merchants on the expectation of doubling their money. They have been hoarded by retailers.

17 Young People Held on Suspicion of Treason

Philadelphia, June 21.—Seventeen young men and women arrested here last night for distributing literature which the police declared to be contrary to the government's welfare, were held without bail today on charges of suspicion of treason and inciting to riot.

SINN FEINERS IN RIOT

Dublin, June 21.—The Sinn Feiners, who have held several demonstrations since the release of the persons arrested at the time of the uprising last year, brought about further disorders today. Some 500 of them, carrying Sinn Fein flags, attacked residences of former soldiers over which Union Jacks were flying. Windows were smashed and police who came up were stoned. Eight men and five women were arrested.
