OREGON ELECTRIC

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PORTLAND SUSPENDS ALL WHEAT TRADING

Merchants' Exchange Quits Operations Until Government Has Declared Its Policy.

(By The Associated Press) Portland, Or., June 21.—All trading in wheat on the Portland Merchants' Exchange has been suspended until the government has declared its policy in regard to the wheat trade, read an announcement issued at the exchange today.

The order applies to transactions in futures and cash deals alike. Dealings in futures was permitted here last Monday for the first time in several months.

Uncertainty regarding the government's food control plans, which caused wheat to drop thirty-two cents here yesterday, was the main reason for the move, it is understood.

Chicago, June 21.—Improved crop prospects in the northwest together with free offerings in the southwest tended today to ease the wheat market. Opening prices which ranged from the same as yesterday's finish to 1c lower, were followed by a material downturn for September but a slight gain for July which however, soon disappeared.

Another advance in the July delivery ensued owing to scattered buying orders. September continued to be depressed. The close was unsettled 1 1/2c net lower to 2c advance with July \$2.03 and September \$1.78 1/2.

Forecasts of unfavorable weather gave temporary strength to corn. After opening unchanged to 5/8c off the market scored a substantial advance and then sagged all around well below yesterday's close.

Renewal of export buying led afterward to a decided upturn. The close was nervous at gains of 1-1/4 to 1-1/2c net.

Oats showed stubborn resistance to selling pressure.

Provisions had a downward bent, influenced chiefly by weakness in the hog market.
