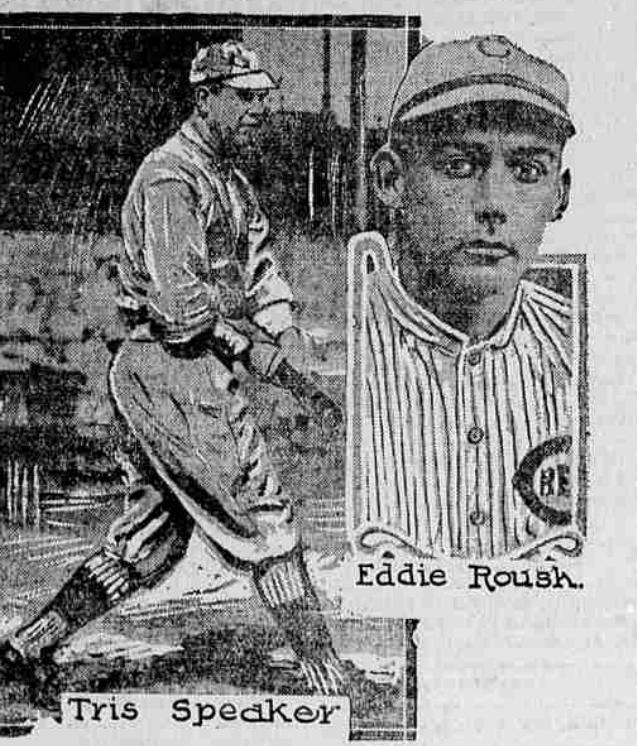

WILSON WAR MESSAGE APPLAUDED IN ROME

Reference to President's Utterances Occasion for Demonstrations in Chamber.

(By The Associated Press) Rome, June 21.—A remarkable demonstration for the United States took place yesterday in both the chamber of deputies and the senate when President Wilson's war message to congress was referred to. The entire cabinet, deputies and senators stood up and applauded, the public tribune also joining in the cheers. Premier Boselli, whose speech in view of the recent ministerial crisis was eagerly awaited, referred to "the greatest democracy in the world speaking nobly in President Wilson's messages." The premier appealed to the country to remain united in thought and energetic in action and warned against attempts to depress or pervert the public mind. He continued: "Without victory no social class, the proletariat less than all others, can hope for a future of progress and happiness. There are none who do not earnestly hope for peace but those who desire it without complete national liberation desire an impossible peace. They deny their birth right as Italians and prepare unconsciously a new and terrible war for the near future."

WILL STANDARDIZE AND SELL PRODUCE

Grangers Eugene Warehouse Will Be Ready to Handle Crops This Fall.

F. B. Harlow, chairman of the committee in charge of the organization of the Grangers Eugene Warehouse association, stated Wednesday that the association would have the warehouse in readiness to handle produce this fall. The plan of the association is to receive the small lots of produce from the various farmers on commission. The managers estimate that the loss to producers was at least one and one-half cents per pound on the beans raised in the Eugene territory last year because of the fact that they were brought in in small lots, were dirty and not graded. The same is true of other products. The association will install facilities for cleaning grains and other products, and will grade them and sell them in large quantities so as to attract buyers. They have leased the Jennings warehouse, of which they will get possession about July 15, after which they will proceed to install machinery.
