His card has not yet arrived. King, with a number of other men, all the rest of whom were from cities over 30,000, registered at Bitter Creek, Wyoming, King, like the rest, forwarded his card to the mayor of his home town, but in view of the fact that Myrtle Point is under 30,000, it should have been sent to the county clerk of Coos county. When King told his story to Sheriff Parker, the authorities wired the mayor of Myrtle Point who answered that he had received the card and had sent it to the clerk, but it had never been received. King will enlist in the regular army.
