EUGENE TO OBSERVE PATRIOTIC SUNDAY

Pastors of City Call Upon People of Eugene to Fulfill Patriotic Duty.

That it is the patriotic duty of every resident of Eugene to attend church next Sunday, is the opinion of the members of the Eugene Ministerial association. President Wilson has designated it as a patriotic Sunday and Herbert C. Hoover, national food commissioner, has issued an appeal to the ministers of the United States to assist in leading the people of the country to the task of feeding the world. Under these circumstances the ministers of Eugene believe that every automobile in Eugene should be used to convey some one to church next Sunday instead of being used for a pleasure trip. The following members of the ministerial association have signed an appeal to the people to attend church that day: H. W. Davis, president; W. M. Case, secretary; H. B. Dorks, A. L. Crim, F. E. Fisher, G. H. Parkinson and A. M. Spangler. The text of the appeal is as follows:

Observe Patriotic Sunday.

"President Wilson has saluted the churches of our country. Three national calls have been made to the churches for next Sunday's services. One in behalf of food conservation, one in behalf of the Red Cross, and one in behalf of good citizenship. By reason of these patriotic calls, the undersigned pastors of Eugene churches desire an earnest word with the people of Eugene and surrounding country.

"By the request of our government, next Sunday's services are not to be our own. Mr. Hoover in his appeal to the ministers, says: 'As a minister of God, a leader of the people, a lover of liberty and your fellow man, your co-operation is earnestly desired and greatly needed.'

"In such a time as this, the people turn naturally to the church. It will be a calamity to the nation and to the churches if their chosen ministers neglect to exercise the proper leadership in the great cause of feeding a world in need. He asks of us to secure co-operation of appropriate religious and civic bodies; and closes his appeal with these words: 'Let us make it the purpose and motto of every household in America, to save the waste and win the war.'

Local Interest Surrendered.

"It is our purpose to heed this call of our country to the best of our ability. All local and congregational interests will be surrendered in behalf of the larger call to consider this world interest.

"We therefore, acting for our government and in the interest of humanity, appeal to every citizen and to every household of Eugene, and surrounding country, to make next Sunday a truly patriotic Sunday, by attending church services. No greater question than food conservation now confronts us. Pleasure seeking on next Sunday will not be a manifestation of loyalty to our country and our president. Your country requests your presence at church on next Sunday. Forgetting ourselves, we appeal for patriotism, pure and simple. Let every automobile be found in front of some church, and not carrying pleasure seekers who disregard this national call."

GERMAN CENSORSHIP MADE MORE DRASTIC

View in Rotterdam Is That Something Is About to Happen in Kaiser's Country.

London, June 29.—Special despatches from Rotterdam say it is inferred there, in view of the gagging of the German press, that something drastic has happened or is about to happen in Germany. They quote the Frankfurter Zeitung, complaining that it was compelled to issue its political section until further notice without an independent expression of opinion and say the censorship now far exceeds anything previous. The press is declared to be completely muzzled. It is said the real secret of the paper shortage is a government move to compel newspapers to print such bare news allowed, excluding commentary matter. The belief is expressed in Holland that next week's meeting of the reichstag may produce startling developments.

TWO FRENCH SHIPS SUNK

Paris, June 29.—Two French merchantmen of more than 1,000 tons and three of less than that size were sunk by submarines or mines in the week ending June 24, according to the weekly announcement issued here today. In that time there were 1,088 arrivals at French ports and 969 sailings.

OREGON PEPPERMINT IS USED TO GRADE UP EASTERN PRODUCT

President of Willamette Valley Growers' Association Returns From Eastern Trip. Increase in Price of Oil Predicted.

Oregon peppermint oil, produced by the growers in the Willamette valley last year, was used to grade up Indian and Michigan oil, according to O. H. Todd, president of the Willamette Valley Mint Growers' association, who returned to Eugene yesterday after a visit with his brother, A. M. Todd, multi-millionaire "peppermint king," at Kalamazoo, Mich. The A. M. Todd company, of Kalamazoo, purchased all oil produced in this state last year, paying the growers who have been conducting experiments with the crop a little more than \$10,000. The menthol content of the Oregon oil was found to be 55 to 63 per cent as compared with 35 and 45 per cent for oil distilled from mint grown in the eastern districts, where mint growing has been carried on extensively and successfully for many years.

A. M. Todd was so impressed with the Oregon product that he contemplates a special trip to this state in the fall with a view to encouraging the growing of mint. If he can receive assurances of a production of 150,000 to 200,000 pounds annually, he will contract in advance and loan money to Oregon farmers on their crop, according to O. H. Todd, who said that he was authorized to make this statement for his brother. Paul Todd, chief chemist for the mint company, will accompany his father west and in the event that the older Todd does not make the trip, the son will come alone to confer with Oregon farmers.

Peppermint oil is one of the few farm products of which the price has been forced down by the war. Recent sales of oil were made at \$1.70 a pound. Before the war, the price ranged from \$3.50 to \$4 a pound. Shipments of the oil to Europe have stopped entirely. The A. M. Todd company was the only concern engaged in the export trade on an extensive scale. The last four shipments of oil made by that company were sent to the bottom of the sea by German submarines. It was decided to attempt no further shipments until the submarine warfare has ended. The only export trade now being carried is with South America and Australia, but the demand is now equal to the supply. In time of peace, Germany uses one-fifth of the world's total production of peppermint oil and other European countries are heavy consumers. In view of these facts, it is believed that the price of oil immediately following the war will return to its former high level, if it does not exceed it.

"The chance for a big advance in the price of peppermint oil this fall is very good," O. H. Todd stated. "The first thing I intend to do is make a visit to the farms in the valley and urge the growers to clean out the weeds and get their crop into condition. Mint is going to pay well this year."

Mr. Todd has been in the east since April. He said that he visited all the big peppermint growing districts and believes that the Oregon country excels them all in production per acre and character of crop.

ALSACE IS PROUD OF GENERAL PERSHING

American Warrior Is Welcomed by People From Land of His Fathers.

Paris, June 29.—Major-General Pershing yesterday received a delegation from the Alsace-Lorraine republican committee. Referring to the American commander's Alsatian ancestry, the vice-president, M. Staehling, told the general how proud they were that a descendant of their little country had come to fight for the triumph of their inalienable rights and the restoration to France of the lost provinces.

General Pershing was visibly moved. He said he was most happy to greet representatives of the valiant people who had suffered so deeply because of fidelity to their country and that he had a warm place in his heart for Alsace, the land of his fathers.

Boy Labor Mobilization Is Now Being Considered

Washington, June 29.—War time mobilization of the boy labor of the nation is the purpose of a two-day convention of the United States boys' working reserve, which opened in the offices of the council of national defense here today. The vast labor shortage, which, it is believed, will ensue when the draft goes into effect, is hoped to be partially offset by the utilization of America's youth in agriculture and the industries.

Itinerary of Belgians to Coast Is Completed

Washington, June 29.—The Belgian commission itinerary for its trip to the Pacific coast was made public here today. Departing Sunday the first stop will be in Chicago Monday.
