HALL HAS CONTRACT FOR CHEESE FACTORY

Eugene Concrete Works Will Erect Buildings at Harrisburg and Elsewhere.

W. C. Hall, proprietor of the Eugene Concrete Works, has the contract for erecting the Harrisburg Cheese factory. The building, which is being put in for K. C. Eldridge of the Independence Creamery, will be of concrete blocks up to the window line, with a frame structure above that. The concrete blocks have already been shipped to Harrisburg and C. L. Bassinette, of Eugene, is in charge of the work of erecting the building. The floor will be of concrete also. It is expected to have the building ready for the installation of machinery before the 15th of July.

The concrete work also recently shipped a carload of blocks C. B. Swango, a Coberg farmer who is erecting a concrete milk house. M. C. Mahaney, of Eugene, is laying the blocks.

Mr. Hall has also sold a carload of blocks to George A. McCart, a farmer residing near Leaburg, for the construction of an addition to his barn. Mr. Bassinette will also have charge of this work.

VENIZELLOS PLEADS WITH GREEK FORCES

United Action Necessary to Drive Bulgarians From Eastern Macedonia He Claims.

Athens, June 29.—Premier Venizelos, in his speech to the crown, after taking the oath of office at the palace yesterday, said that Greece's place was beside democracy and that the nation was struggling for freedom of the world against the two central powers, with whom Greece's hereditary enemies were allied.

"We realize," the premier said, "that unless we drive the Bulgarians from eastern Macedonia, that part of Greek territory will be always exposed to great danger. Before, however, thinking of mobilizing that part of Greece which has not shared in our movement, we must vitalize its military organization which has fallen into such decay and bring about a fusion of the two armies. In brotherly co-operation, therefore, we shall now call out the untrained classes of 1916 and 1917."

ALBANY ALL COLOR FOR BIG ROUND UP

Not a Dull Moment During the Three Days' Exhibition and Fourth of July Celebration.

Albany, Or., June 30.—Albany is alive with color, bustle and enthusiasm over the opening of the Western Oregon Round-Up, which will give its Second annual wild west exhibition in Round-Up park next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, closing with a big Fourth of July celebration before and after the Round-Up events on Wednesday.

An attendance of from 50,000 to 60,000 people during the three days is freely predicted, and Albany is prepared to entertain the largest crowds in its history. Special rates prevail on all railroads, and thousands of visitors will flock in from Astoria to Roseburg.

Manager Clarence Adams has assembled a rare collection of Round-Up talent, including some of the best performers of the west. Adams went to southern California, where, around the moving picture studios many expert cow boys put up for the winter to take part in the movies, and there gathered up such reprobates as Silver Harr, Hank Potts, "Wind River Bill", Buff Jones, "Goldie Campbell, Rube Fisher, "Pee Wee" Holmes, Dorothy Morrell, Skeeter Bill Robbins, and many other luminaries of the southwest.

Adams picked from all over the country, however, and went to Pendleton for Nigger George Fletcher, John Tayche, Bertha Blanchett, Tracey Lane, John and Frank Roach, Lloyd Saunders, Miss Billy Clifford and little eight year old Mary Clifford, the midwest trick rider Kittle Wilkes, the little girl who has won the bucking horse contests at practically all the big shows she has attended in the past two years, will also compete. Her home is in Cheyenne. Anita Engle, of Redding, Elsie Ray, of Airile, Dorothy Morrell, of Winnepeg, are other women riders. Art Burmeister, of Cheyenne, Art Bivens, North Yakima, Dan and Louise Thompson, Montana, Spike Speckman, Klamath Falls, are a few of the hundred or more performers who are here for the contests.

Manager Adams has 250 head of horses on hand, including Sunfish Molly, Powder River, and many other wild ones from eastern Oregon and California. There will not be a dull moment during the 23 events daily.

Miss Phelps stated Saturday that while the unit had not yet been formally organized it would be in the near future, and it was hoped that all the nurses, about 70 in number, would be from Oregon. Only registered nurses belonging to the State Nurses' association will be accepted for enrollment. Registered nurses desiring to enroll can secure full information by writing Miss Frances McLain, secretary of the State Nurses' association, Stevens building, Portland, Oregon. All nurses must be able to pass the required physical examination.

BATTERY ADVERTISING A TEXT BOOK FOR MOTORISTS.

The car owner who reads the current storage battery advertising can learn as much about the care of storage batteries for all practical purposes as the man who sits down and reads a book on them, according to Mr. Anderson, the local Willard expert.

"Such advertising as the Willard company is doing," says Mr. Anderson, "is of immense value to all car owners. It sets forth in language that any one can understand the broad, general principles that underlie all battery care. And the man who reads it regularly and takes advantage of the advice given there is in a fair way to getting the most efficient use out of his battery."

"We men in the battery service stations are very quick to notice any change in the public sentiment toward our product and the public attitude toward the battery has changed a great deal during the last two years."

"It was only a short time ago, comparatively speaking, that not one motorist in a thousand knew that distilled water had to be added to his battery regularly. The average car owner would literally run his battery to death and then blame the battery."

"Very few motorists indeed even knew what a hydrometer syringe was, let alone how to use it. All this has changed to a great degree until today the average car owner either owns a hydrometer syringe himself, or, if he does not, goes to the service station and has the battery expert use a hydrometer syringe on his battery."

"Starving and over-heating the battery, short-circuiting and broken down insulations were things of which the average motorist knew nothing a little while ago. Today he is at least familiar with these terms."

"And the motorist of yesterday regarded his battery as a practically non-wearable part of his car, something to be classed with the bearings or engine or chassis. Now he is gradually coming to recognize that it is an accessory of limited life, something which must be renewed like tires although not so frequently or at so great a cost."

"Of course, the battery service station by word of mouth has had a great deal to do in this education of the car owner, but a greater part of it, I think, is due to nothing more or less than the magazine advertising that has appeared in the national papers."
