LAKE CREEK VALLEY IS EXTREMELY RICH

Howard M. Brownell Tells of Need of Valley for Good Roads to Transport Produce.

Howard M. Brownell, who delivered the address at Blachly, in the Lake Creek valley, and predicts that it will be one of the richest sections of Lane county. In speaking of the valley he said:

"The Lake Creek valley is about 23 miles from Junction City, toward the coast, is about a mile wide and perhaps not more than ten or twelve miles long, and for beauty of scenery is unsurpassed by any small section of the county I have yet visited.

"In the early days the bottom land was covered with heavy timber which had to be grubbed out and cleared away by the owners of the land, today the bottom land is clear and where the timber once stood there are now rich pastures and grain fields. The clover and hay and cereal crops are the best I have seen anywhere in Lane county and I have been quite generally over the county this year. Mr. Earl showed me a field of barley which he planted on the 15th of June, now it is almost a foot high.

"The country is ideal for dairying. I am told that every week the people there ship out over a ton of cream.

"This country needs a road worse than anything else; in summer the road is very good but in winter it becomes practically impassable, it requiring four horses to haul out a small load of any kind of produce. With some assistance from the county court this road can be put in shape for travel the year around and this improvement in my judgment, ought to be made as it would benefit, not only the people of Lake Creek valley, but all the citizens of the county as well."

PROTEST MADE TO VATICAN BY ZIMMERMANN

German Secretary of Foreign Affairs, Acting for Government, Objects to Pastoral Letter by Cardinal Mercier.

(By The Associated Press)
Copenhagen, July 6.—Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, secretary of foreign affairs, announced to a committee of the reichstag, according to news reaching here, that representations have been made to the vatican regarding the pastoral letter of Cardinal Mercier wherein he spoke in forcible terms of Germany's crimes and outrages in Belgium. The letter was published in the French press and was the subject of angry comment by German newspapers.

The socialist newspaper Vorwaerts of Berlin says there is no doubt that the vote of the constitutional committee of the reichstag today will result in rejection of the socialist proposal to introduce universal and equal suffrage in the federated states by action of the reichstag.

GERMAN CROPS POOR.
Copenhagen, July 6.—The German government's over-optimistic report on the crop prospects which were declared on June 25 to be "really brilliant" were sharply criticized yesterday by speakers in the reichstag ways and means committee. They accuse the government of giving the people a false view of the situation, arousing unrealistic hopes.
Herr Roessicke, president of the German Farmers' Union, also said that the grain crop had suffered greatly because of drought. He expressed hope for the crop growing on heavy soils, which usually prospered in dry seasons. He said that even the early potato yield was poor but that the late potatoes usually made up for this.

CENSORSHIP IS LIFTED.
Copenhagen, July 6.—In consequence of vigorous representations in the reichstag main committee, the preventive censorship imposed a few days ago on the Frankfurter Zeitung has been raised. The measure was the result of a financial article by Professor Weber of Heidelberg University on the financial and exchange situation.

SAXON DIET OPPOSES KING.
Copenhagen, July 6.—A despatch from Dresden says the Saxon diet which Tuesday warned the government of a disappearance of the sentiment of loyalty toward the king and also of a coming upheaval unless the government mend its ways, has now broken openly with the government. This action is a consequence of the refusal of Count von Vitthum D'Ekstadt, premier of Saxony, to authorize the diet committee on constitutional reform to continue its labors during the recess. The diet refused to give the necessary authorization to settle fuel problems and it must therefore be reconvened not later than August. This will enable the constitutional committee to resume work.

BUTTE MINERS CONFERENCE
(By The Associated Press)
Butte, Mont., July 6.—A committee representing the Metal Mine Workers' union, which declared a strike on the mining companies for higher pay and changed working conditions, went into conference today with international labor union representatives who want to know the attitude of metal miners toward the American Federation of Labor. W. H. Rodgers, federal mediator, was a member of the conference.

The Metal Mine Workers' union, according to the mining companies, is controlled by the Industrial Workers of the World. The union's press committee, in a signed statement, has said that it will not affiliate with any international body of laboring men until the strike has been won. It was said that unless the metal miners agree to affiliate with the American Federation of Labor that all support will be withdrawn by union labor and that an effort will be made to organize another union of miners in sympathy with the American Federation.

The beginning of the end of the electricians' strike for higher wages from the Montana Power company is expected to come tonight when President F. J. McNulty, of the electricians, who is here from Washington, addresses the electricians' union. Other international union representatives assert that Mr. McNulty will advise the electricians to accept the company's counter proposal which will give the electricians more money than they demanded.

More men reported for work at the mines today than any day since the strike was called by the miners over three weeks ago. The smelter at Anaconda resumed operations today with a week's supply of ore on hand.

OBJECTS TO BEING CALLED 'JOHN DOE'

Slacker Claiming to Be German Now Says He Is American and Under Conscription Age.

Von Moltke, alleged slacker, arrested at Cottage Grove, who claimed to be a second cousin of General Von Moltke, told a very different story when brought before United States Commissioner J. L. Dillard, Friday morning. He then stated that his name is George Von Moltke Ellsworth, and that he was born in New Jersey and is only 19 years of age. He claimed that he was on a lumber schooner en route from Honolulu to Port Townsend on registration day and that when the ship arrived in port those of registration age registered, but that he did not, as the ship's books proved him under age.

When asked why he gave his age as 23 when arrested he said that a "hayseed" sat down beside him and began asking him questions and so he told him what he thought he wanted to know. He also resented being booked as John Doe Von Moltke, and was insistent in his demands to know where the sheriff's office got the name.

United States Commissioner John L. Dillard held him and Tom Dees, picked up by Officer J. A. Macey, to the federal grand jury in Portland in bonds of \$1000 each. Deputy United States Marshal W. F. Hartmann, of Portland, arrived from Klamath Falls Friday morning and took the prisoners to Portland the same day.

WHISKEY IS FOUND IN JAIL BY OFFICER

Thurman Berry Says He Placed It There While Making Search for Owner.

Ira Gilstrap's conception of his duties as a special Fourth of July policeman at Junction City may prove the undoing of Thurman Berry, who had been employed as a guard for the Southern Pacific Co. Gilstrap's first official act after receiving his commission was to make an inspection of the jail in which he found a large valise. In it he found 13 quarts of whiskey. He told members of the city council of his discovery and it was decided to call the sheriff.

Sheriff J. C. Parker went to Junction City Wednesday night and took possession of the liquor, leaving the valise full of wooden blocks and a deputy on guard. Berry put in an appearance at 4 o'clock yesterday morning, when the deputy challenged him.

Berry admitted placing the liquor in the jail. He said that it had been abandoned in a field by men who had gotten off a freight train and that he had been making an effort to locate the owners.

Berry's connection with the railroad was that of a guard. He was appointed soon after the declaration of war. A key to the jail was given to him at that time.

TREASON IS CHARGED.

Philadelphia, July 6.—Thirteen young men and women socialists arrested last night for distributing alleged treasonable literature were today held under bail ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000 for trial. Two of the six women were charged with inciting to riot.
