Are Paying Dog License.
Constable J. J. Harbaugh reports that 100 dog owners in Eugene and neighboring precincts have paid the county dog

tax to him. The new law makes it incumbent upon the owner to go to the constable and pay the tax. Constable Harbaugh has the precincts of Eugene, Blanton, Bailey, Davis, Zumwalt, Santa Clara and Glenwood. The state license is \$1.50 for male dogs and \$3 for females, in addition to the city license on dogs owned in Eugene.

Grants New Trial.
Judge G. F. Skipworth Thursday granted a new trial in the case of Kahn vs. Lare. MISSION OF NATION TO EXTEND LIBERTY, SAYS DR. J. D. SPAETH

Lecturer Closes Series of Talks on "English Poets of Liberty" at University of Oregon Summer School.

Dr. J. Duncan Spaeth delivered the last of his series of four lectures on "English Poets of Liberty" at the general assembly of the summer school session in Villard hall this morning. His subject was "Whitman and the Spirit of American Democracy" and the audience responded time after time with hearty applause as the speaker read or interpreted the stirring words of the American poet.

"The mission of America is the mission of an united nation standing for liberty and willing to extend it," was the tenet of Whitman, according to Dr. Spaeth. Whitman's trust was in the common people and he believed that the soundness of the common people would ultimately prevail, declared the lecturer. His was not a political creed, not a social creed, but rather a religious creed. His doctrine was not the equality of all men, but the identity of man.

"All men are not born equal. That is a doctrine handed down to us by the 18th century. We swallowed it whole, but we must modify it," said the speaker. No matter whether we follow Christ or Darwin in the end we must admit the identity of man, that the same blood flows in all of us, that you can't kill anyone without killing a brother.

In his analysis of Whitman the speaker contrasted the optimism of the democracy of America to the melancholy, sorrowful democracy of the Russian.

Dr. Spaeth said that democracy was not an established fact, not something to fence in and keep, but rather that "democracy is a destiny to be achieved. When the world is made safe for democracy then the real work of democracy will begin." More revolution against a despotic government is not democracy in the true sense. When governments became impotent then the strong individual became the despot.

"To create popular governments and strengthen them against the strong individual is the problem of the 20th century," said Dr. Spaeth.

Whitman is the true interpreter of the American ideal of democracy. In him you gain the difference between European and American democracy. The first

was that of the Revolutionary period when the watchword was "Liberty," and the second was the democracy of the Civil war and the watchword was "Union."

This American poet was born on Long Island in 1819 and came from patriotic stock. Being a Quaker, he did not serve in the Civil war as a soldier but spent three years in hospital work in Washington. His efforts there brought on the attack of paralysis that caused his death.

"Every teacher, every American, every promulgator of liberty should read Whitman's 'Democratic Vistas' if he wishes to gain a true conception of that for which America stands," said Dr. Spaeth. The speaker closed his address and fired his audience by reading a portion of Whitman's "The Mythic Trumpeter."

Dr. Spaeth left today for Pullman, Wash., to deliver a series of lectures before the summer school of the Washington State college. He will return in time to handle his regular classes the remainder of the session here.

REGISTRATION AT SUMMER SCHOOL IS NOW MORE THAN 200

Enrollment at Close of First Half of Term Shows Increase Over Opening Days. Vacation Next Week.

The University of Oregon summer school attendance at the close of the first three weeks was much better than indicated during the first few days of registration. The roll has been steadily growing, 200 students have been enrolled. The attendance in the Portland center of the summer school is almost 300, making a total of about 500 students taking courses as compared with 314 last year, when all departments of the school were conducted in Eugene.

The assembly lectures of the past week were delivered by Dr. J. Duncan Spaeth, professor of English literature at Princeton.

Dr. Spaeth will go to Pullman, Wash., to deliver a series of lectures next week and return to Eugene at the time of the opening of the second half of the summer school session.

Dr. Edna Wilson Bailey, of the faculty of the University of California, who has been instructing a class in zoology, completed her work with the close of the third week of the school. During the second half of the term, Professor Albert R. Sweetser will be added to the summer faculty teaching classes in botany and nature study.

Robert Krohn, superintendent of physical education in the Portland public schools, arrived on the campus this week and took up his work instructing a class in physical education. He had just completed a similar course at the Bellingham state normal school at Bellingham, Wash.

Professor James Henry Gilbert, representative of the Carnegie Endowment for Peace and Conciliation, will deliver the assembly lectures on the first four days of the fourth week of the summer school, beginning July 16. State Superintendent of Public Instruction J. A. Churchill will be the lecturer on Friday of that week. Henry Churchill King, president of Oberlin college, will be the lecturer, the fifth week and G. Stanley Hall, president of Clark University, will lecture daily, the closing week of the summer school.
