RED CROSS GUIDE IS PREPARED FOR USE BY OREGON PEOPLE

Edition of Extension Monitor, to Be Published by University of Oregon, Will Be Veritable Handbook for Workers.

The forthcoming Extension Monitor of the University of Oregon will be a Red Cross edition prepared for the guidance of people engaged in the activities of the society within the state and providing information concerning each subdivision of the state organization, together with names of officers of the 22 chapters, six branches and 174 auxiliaries in Oregon, or in territory bordering Oregon counties. It is stated that there are still 500 auxiliaries in the smaller communities of the state to be organized.

The Monitor announces that the extension division of the University of Oregon will serve as a recognized bureau of Red Cross information for Oregon. All extension department publications are to be used for the purpose of disseminating information. If the work of relief to dependent families of soldiers falls upon the Red Cross, the extension division will undertake a statewide census of dependent families of soldiers, and the indexing and the classification of the names, it is announced. The extension division has also placed at the service of the Red Cross its visual instruction facilities for the circulation of such slides and motion pictures as it may be desired to circulate in the state.

Detailed Directions Given.

The Red Cross edition of the Monitor gives a "Digest of Information for Oregon Red Cross Organizations." Directions are given for the work from the organization of an auxiliary to the most minute detail of the preparation of a hospital garment or bandage for shipment. Tables are printed of materials needed for the equipment of a base hospital or a hospital bed, including complete directions for making supplies.

It is announced that it is very important that all supplies conform to the same standard.

"Playing cards and tobacco cannot be sent to France, not even in comfort bags, nor can the American Relief Clearing House, Paris, accept shipments of alcohol," the instructions state.

A standard of box to be used in packing various classes of Red Cross supplies is defined. A bibliography of books on the American Red Cross available for use in Oregon libraries is also published.

Governor Urges Work.

Editorially the Monitor declares that through the Red Cross, every boy and girl, every man and woman may share in the tremendous preparation the government in making to meet the crisis which confronts the nation.

Governor James Withycombe in an address to the people of Oregon published in the edition states:

"What the Red Cross means to the people of all countries is too well known to require explanation on my part. Now that the war has been brought to America, let all of us see that Oregon is creditably represented not only in its support of our nation's military establishments, but also in its generous support of the Red Cross, whose services as an international agency of mercy have never been so urgently needed as today."

John L. Clymer, director of the Pacific Division of the American Red Cross, in a letter calls upon the newspapers of

Oregon to assist the extension department of the University in its Red Cross publicity plans.

President P. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon pays tribute to the boys who have gone out from the University to respond to the country's call and declares it the patriotic duty of the University and the people of the state to take part in the Red Cross movement.

The Monitor announces that this fall the state department of education will issue a series of booklets on the American Red Cross designed to meet the needs of teachers and schools.

SAYS BEANS WILL BE GOOD PRICE THIS FALL

County Agriculturalist N. S. Robb Says Farmers Will Reap Good Profits on Crops.

That the farmers of Lane county need have no fears but what they will get good prices for their beans, is the opinion of County Agriculturalist N. S. Robb, who returned Friday night from a two weeks' vacation trip to Eastern Kansas and northwestern Missouri. Mr. Robb said Saturday that of all the states in the middle west only Colorado, Ohio and Michigan have increased their bean acreage, while in several states there has been a decided decline because of the turning of attention to other crops. Eastern Colorado has made a material increase, Ohio and Michigan are reporting slight increases, while Minnesota, usually a good bean producing state, is short on acreage. There is an increase in acreage in the northwest but it will be easily absorbed in the eastern market.

The small grain average in eastern Kansas is materially increased, but the crop prospects in western Kansas and Nebraska are very poor. The Kaw river valley, the greatest early potato section in the middle west has a banner crop and it is easing conditions in middle west potato markets somewhat.

With the prospects of a world shortage of wheat, Mr. Robb states that the experiment stations and agricultural leaders of the middle west are turning their attention to the work of popularizing corn, potatoes, rye and other substitutes for wheat, and devising methods of their use. This is being done so that America's surplus of wheat for export may be increased.

He also reports that there is also a shortage of beef cattle in the pastures of southern Kansas and Oklahoma. Some of these pastures will be cut for hay. There are very many thousands of acres of upland prairie hay in that section and it commands the highest possible price as horse forage. Some pieces will cut a ton and a half to the acre, and it stands the drought there better than any tame hay yet found.

Pure bred cattle are also in increasing demand, two Hereford bulls bringing \$40,000 at a recent sale.

Mr. Robb visited his old home at Eureka, Kansas, and also spent some time in northwestern Missouri. He reports that the corn acreage in that section is increased and also in Iowa and that the corn though looking good and a good stand, is very late this year. With a favorable summer and a late fall it will be a bumper crop.

LANE BOY WRITES OF AVIATION FLIGHTS

T. E. Abeene Writes of Cross Country Trips in Texas Aero Squadron Work.

The Guard has received a letter from T. E. Abeene, a Lane county boy, formerly of Springfield, who is now with the Third Aero Squadron, at Camp Kelly Texas, telling of his work in the squadron. Under date of June 30, he says that the Lane county boys in camp are making good, and that he is in charge of a crew on scout machines, going along as "trouble shooter." The letter is as follows:

"When I left there a year ago I promised to write you, but found out after some time in the regular army that important events are seldom written by soldiers. So I have never written as I am trying to make a soldier of myself. But I will write you a little sketch of Texas from the clouds. This is a level country and when you get from 2,000 to 3,000 feet in the air you can see the whole surrounding country. The roads and streams show up fine and the whole country looks like a well kept farm. The timber here is scrubby and the brush small and when you look down on it it looks like plants in a garden. The towns look like birds eye views of cities such as you see in pictures.

"I have charge of a crew on an R-4, that is one of the scout machines, and go along as 'trouble shooter' on cross country trips. They generally fly from 2000 to 3000 feet high on cross country trips, but you can see so high here that those big machines look like sparrows. I am making good and most of the Lane county boys that I have met are. Quite a few of them in the aviation section, but they are all in other squadrons. My last trip was 45 miles we made it in 35 minutes and I back in 30."

\$1000 IS ADDED TO LANE RED CROSS FUND

Fourteen Ships Allowed to Reach Swedish Port

Copenhagen, Sweden, July 6.—Fourteen steamers from England, released under German safe conducts, arrived here today, while three other steamers also have arrived at other Swedish ports. The Swedish steamer Aspen, which was torpedoed by a German submarine last May, but remained afloat, was among the arrivals.

The Aspen was reported to have been torpedoed May 20, in the gulf of Bothnia, along with the Vesterland and Viken. The vessels, grain laden, had been released from British ports under a reciprocal agreement. The report of their destruction caused intense indignation in Sweden and the German minister expressed the deep regret of his government over the sinkings.

Washington, July 7.—One rear-admiral and a number of officers down to the rank of Lieutenant Commander will be selected soon to fill vacancies in the line of the navy. Secretary Daniels has ordered the selection board to convene in Washington July 10.

500 ACRES OF TREES PLANTED IN HEBO MOUNTAIN REGION

Forest Examiner Johnson Says There Has Been an Unusually Large Amount of Rainfall in Siuslaw Forest.

Work of planting 302,000 Douglas trees on about 500 acres of land in the Mt. Hebo district, Siuslaw National Forest, has just been completed, according to H. M. Johnson, forest examiner, who arrived in Eugene today. A total of \$500 acres of land, old burns, has been planted since the work was begun in 1909. Mr. Johnson stated, Mr. Johnson has also been supervising trail construction in preparation for tree planting operations in the future.

The actual work of planting the trees required about a month. A force of 150 men was employed. Some difficulty in obtaining men was experienced when operations were begun. About 680 trees were planted to the acre. The stock was obtained from the Wind River nursery in the Columbia National Forest.

Mr. Johnson stated that 60 per cent of the trees planted during the 1916 and 1917 season were alive.

"An unusually large amount of rain has fallen in the Mt. Hebo district this year," Mr. Johnson stated. "It has been raining once a week on the average and has been cloudy most of the time. It has been ideal weather for planting."
