BULGE IN CORN STRENGTHENS WHEAT

Gains in Prices at Chicago Due to Reports of Continued Cool Weather.

(By The Associated Press) Chicago, July 7.—Active buying on the part of commission houses swept the corn market upward again today. Opening quotations which ranged from the same as yesterday's finish to 1-3-4c higher with September at \$1.55 to \$1.55 1-4 and December at \$1.14 1-2 to \$1.16 1-2 were followed by gains all around that carried December to \$1.17 1-2.

Decided further gains were scored owing more to reports of continued unusually cool weather. The close was nervous at 1-3-8 to 3-3-4c net advance.

Wheat sagged owing to neglect. After opening 2c lower with July at \$2.10 and September nominal, the market descended to \$2.09 for July.

Subsequently the market showed more firmness, apparently influenced by the bulge in corn. The close was unsettled at 5c net lower to 2c advance with July \$2.07 and September \$1.04.

Oats were firmer in sympathy with corn. Scattered demand for hard and ribs lifted provisions a little.

WALL STREET New York, July 7.—Week-end covering of short contracts imparted general strength to today's session on a very turnover. Leading shares in the railway, industrial, metal and equipment divisions scored extreme gains of 1 to 2 1/2 points. Among specialties the movement was more uneven, some of those issues advancing 1 to 3 points, while a few others, notably General Motors and Disinfectors' Securities, were heavy at times. Reading led the rails with pronounced strength in St. Paul, Union Pacific and New York Central. United States Steel rose a substantial fraction with shares of the same class. The closing was strong. Sales approximated 275,000 shares. Bonds were irregular, the Liberty issue holding steady at premiums of 1-50 to 2-50ths.

FRUIT CONDITIONS ARE ABOUT AVERAGE

County Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart Makes Report After Visit to Orchards.

County Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart, who was in Eugene Saturday morning, stated that the fruit crop in Lane county this year would be just about average. He also stated that pest conditions were fairly well in hand, the only blight to any extent, being found in the low land and swales in the northwestern part of the county.

Mr. Stewart has been working in the Long Tom district for some time past but says that he can begin to see the end of the season's work in that section.

ONE AMERICAN KILLED. (By The Associated Press) New York, July 7.—One American citizen was among the four members of the crew of the American steamship Orleans who were drowned when the vessel was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine, according to cable advices received here today by the ship's owners, the Oriental Navigation company. The American was E. Nogot, messman, of the Philippine Islands. The other men drowned were Thomas Cleary, fireman; A. Tamarants, seaman, and A. Murillo, coal passer.

DOG TAX DUE JULY FIRST.

Pursuant to Chapter 369 Laws of 1917 notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Lane County, that an annual tax is due upon all dogs over six months of age as follows:

On each male or spayed female dog, \$1.50. On each unspayed female dog, \$3.00.

The above tax is payable to the Constable of the Justice District in which the owner of the dog resides, and is due July first of each year, and when not so paid the following penalties are provided:

Section 8. Should the owner of a dog or dogs refuse or neglect to pay the license fee herebefore provided for after demand, in writing, by the constable, then the said constable shall seize and destroy the said dog or dogs unless redeemed in forty-eight (48) hours.

Section 10. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to a fine not to exceed \$50 or by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed twenty-five days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
