ARTILLERY WILL BE FULLY EQUIPPED BY LAST OF THIS WEEK

That Quartermaster Harris Will
Have Shipped All Needed
Equipment to Entire Corps
by Saturday Is Expectation.

The Coast Artillery will be fully equipped on a war basis by the last of the present week, if expected supplies arrive, according to present plans of Capt. Thomas B. Harris, quartermaster of the corps. Captain Harris and Sergeant L. F. Leonard have been on regular duty since July 1, and are busily engaged in shipping additional equipment to the various companies which are not yet supplied on a war basis.

The four new companies are fully equipped with the very latest type of equipment, while the eight old companies are just receiving new equipment.

Wednesday a large shipment was made to the First company at Ashland, and shipments will be made to other companies in rapid succession. Additional supplies will also be issued to the Second and Third companies.

The equipment of the corps will include sixteen mess outfits. There is one outfit for each company, one for the enlisted men attached to headquarters, including enlisted specialists, one for the band, one for the hospital corps, and one for the officers. Company officers as a rule now eat from the same kitchen as their men but at a different table.

All Water Is Sterilized.

All water will be sterilized before being used for drinking purposes when on the march and large canvas bags with automatically closing drinking spigots will be used. They are like enlarged water bags used by automobilists, and when hung from the ridge pole of the mess tent will keep the water cool and palatable. Any soldier drinking water from any source not passed upon by the proper authorities will be subject to court martial.

Another item of equipment which is attracting the attention of the officers and men is aluminum tent pins for the "pup tents" as the shelter tents carried on a march are called. There are nine pins to each two men, each man carrying half a tent. The substitution of aluminum for wood for these pins will not increase

the load of each man, and they are practically indestructible.

Sixty Pounds Maximum Load.
When in heavy marching order the load to be carried by each man is approximately 60 pounds and includes arms, equipment, and three days' rations. This amount is carried only when it is expected that the men will be absent from the wagon train for three days.

RAIN IS NEEDED TO MATURE STATE CROPS

Absence of Rainfall May Prevent Maturity in Light Soils and of Shallow Rooted Plants

Portland, Or., July 11.—"Shallow rooted crops and those on light soils are suffering materially for moisture and unless it rains soon the late planted crops will not come to full before maturity," reads the summary of crop conditions throughout Oregon for the week ending July 7 issued here today by the Portland weather bureau.

"Under cloudless skies, the continued hot, dry weather has been favorable for haying which is now general with good crops of clover and alfalfa being housed," the summary continues.

"Barley, oats and spring wheat were in fair to good condition, but heading very short, winter wheat generally good, and the harvest of rye has begun on valley land in Umatilla county.

"Corn, potatoes, hops, sugar beets and beans, where irrigated, made rapid advancement, warm nights being particularly favorable to the growth of corn.

"Pastures and ranges, as a rule, are drying up and are greatly in need of rain. The fruit outlook is still promising, berries are setting well with prospects for a large crop."

Earl McNutt Ships Car of Horses From Ashland

Earl McNutt received a carload of horses from Ashland Tuesday night. He had purchased them there last week and they were shipped up, being in charge of George Wiley, of Ashland. Mr. Wiley has been with the Ashland Transfer and Storage company of Ashland for the past five years, and as he was going to Portland and eastern Oregon to look over the country, took charge of the horses for Mr. McNutt. The latter will probably sell at least a part of them to the government. Mr. Wiley went to Portland on the Oregon Electric Wednesday morning.
