

7 OREGON MEN TO BE SELECTED FOR ARMY DRAFT

Formal Announcement Made by War Department of Quota of Troops to Be Supplied by Western States.

CREDIT IS GIVEN FOR MEN NOW IN SERVICE

Lane County Will Not Be Called Upon for More Than 40 and May Be Exempt as Whole, According to Indications.

Washington, July 13.—Formal announcement today that 687,000 men will be selected from those registered on June 5 for the first national war army and to fill up vacancies in the national guard and the regular army.

The quota of men which western states will be required to furnish follows:

The table from which the net quotas were compiled shows that all enlistments in the national guard and the regular army up to June 30 have been allowed as credits. The instruction to governors from the secretary of war accompanying the table directs governors of the various states to allot the state quota as given among the exemption board districts, so that each board in each district will know exactly the number of men to be furnished by the district in filling the state quota.

Credits Allowed.

Contrary to expectations, the government has allowed credit for the total strength of the national guard including all those men who were in the service prior to April 1 and who have been retained.

With a thousand exemption boards not yet organized and only twenty-four states having completed the work of numbering serially the registration cards, indications are that the first drawing will be deferred until the week of July 23.

Officials have not disclosed the plans of the drawing itself, but it is believed that numbered slips will be enclosed in capsules and drawn from a large glass vessel in Secretary Baker's office.

To those exempted, the war department, it is announced, will give with each exemption certificate a bronze button bearing the inscription "Exempted—U. S. This is intended to remove from the exempted any suspicion of being slack.

The number of men to be drafted from Oregon has been reduced by credit given for volunteer enlistments in various branches of the service. The announcement made in Washington today means that Lane county will not be called upon to supply more than 40 men under the draft from among the 2500 registered June 5, while it is possible that the county will escape the draft altogether because the county's quota of men, in proportion to the requirements from the country as a whole, has already been greatly exceeded. Whether the county or the state is to be decided upon as the unit in apportioning credits for volunteer enlistments will be the deciding factor in determining whether or not Lane county will be affected at all by the draft.

Adjutant-General White in an interview published at Salem yesterday indicated the view that each county will be given credit separately, which, if decided upon as the final basis of selection, would exempt the county as a whole from the first draft of men for the new army.

In the event that the state is to be treated as the unit in giving credit for called men, Lane county would be called upon for 40 men under the draft, figuring the population of the state at 976,092 and Lane county at 40,000.

Lane county is the second county in the state in number of men who have volunteered. A total of 126 men has been sent to the army and 328 are enrolled in the Oregon National Guard, making a total of 454, according to figures prepared at the office of the adjutant-general. Marion county is next with 141 in the regular army and 257 in the national guard, making a total of 398. The total number of men the state has furnished for the regular army is 1974 and the total number in the national guard is 4883, making a grand total of 6857.

TEUTONS EXPECTED TO PUT UP DESPERATE DEFENSE IN GALICIA

Russians Have Opportunity of Turning the Germanic Line Northward Along Zlota Lipa and Seal Fate of Lemberg.

General Korniloff's Russian armies which already have driven a vast wedge into the Teutonic lines in eastern Galicia appear to be at the crucial point of their campaign for Lemberg.

Having crossed the river Lomnica, behind which the Austro-German forces planted themselves in their retreat from the Halicz region, the Russians have opened up the possibility of turning the whole Germanic line northward along the Zlota Lipa.

Desperate attempts may be expected on the part of the defenders of eastern Galicia, however, to prevent the continuation of this menacing advance beyond the Lomnica and the battles now in progress may be vital in determining the fate of Lemberg and all the eastern Galician terrain.

Today's statement from Petrograd shows that in Wednesday's fighting which resulted in the capture of Kalusz, the Russians took 960 prisoners, chiefly Germans, and five heavy guns, besides ten machine guns.

On the French front Paris mentions sporadic artillery activity in sectors of the Aisne front and to the north of Verdun, with attacks at several points in the Verdun sector. The assaults failed.

Hail's troops in northern France continue comparatively inactive. Last night successful trench raids were carried out by them in the Hulluch and Ypres sectors in Belgium.

Petrograd, July 13.—In the course of the battles in eastern Galicia on Wednesday the official statement issued today by the Russian war department, the Russians captured ten officers and 850 rank and file, chiefly Germans. They also took five heavy guns and ten machine guns.

GERMANS REPORT REPULSE

Berlin, July 13, via London.—(British admiralty per wireless press)—Russian attacks at several places on the Lomnica line in Galicia between the Dniester and the Carpathians were repulsed yesterday the war office announces. Increased activity on the Roumanian front is reported.

WILL PUT ROSEBURG ROAD IN GOOD SHAPE

Counties and State Commission Working in Harmony to That End in Near Future.

The road between Roseburg and Eugene will be put in first class shape for continuous travel throughout the coming winter was the statement made by State Highway Commissioner E. J. Adams and members of the Lane county court Friday, at a conference held with Emmett Sharp, the supervisor in road district No. 98, in which is located the road which has raised such a protest.

Mr. Adams stated that the contract would be let in a very short time for the improvement of the Pass Creek canyon, in Douglas county, one of the worst stretches of the Pacific highway in the state. Mr. Adams also stated that there were several heavy fills in that road and that no attempt would be made to hard surface it this year; that it would be covered with crushed rock and given an opportunity to settle well before receiving the hard surface.

Mr. Sharp was down consulting the county commissioners regarding details as to the work on the Lane county side of the line and expected to commence the work of grading the new road and getting the road ready to surface it in the very near future.

Both Commissioner Adams and the county court are determined that the first thing to do is to put the highway in condition to carry travel twelve months in the year. Mr. Adams doubts if macadam will stand permanently under the traffic which will come on the Pacific highway, but says that the state can well afford to let any counties desiring try it out as it makes a better base for hard surface after having been thoroughly settled under traffic.

Mr. Adams also stated that one of the questions upon which Mr. Benson and the other two commissioners differ is as to whether the supreme object of the commission is to be to furnish the best road facilities to the people now in Oregon, and to connect up the populous centers, or whether its main object should be to furnish the shortest possible route between main points for tourists. Mr. Adams and Mr. Thompson insist that the first aim is to make good roads where they are best suited to the needs of the communities through which they pass even though the tourist may have to travel a few miles farther in going across the state.

Mr. Adams also stated that it is the policy of the commission to attack the worst spots of road first, so as to get just as much road as possible so it will be passable twelve months in the year.

CENSORSHIP IS UNAUTHORIZED IN MINE REGION

Man Who Looked Like Army Officer and Is Called "Captain" Stops Press Despatches During Deportation.

MINING MEN SUCCEED IN SUPPRESSING NEWS

Superintendent Copper Queen Smelter at Douglas Insists That He Received Directions From Sheriff's Office.

Douglas, Ariz., July 13.—The censorship imposed on Associated Press despatches filed here and in Bisbee yesterday during the deportation of nearly 1200 members of the Industrial Workers of the World from Bisbee was directed by two officers of the Phelps-Dodge corporation—Robert Rea, general auditor of the corporation, and H. H. Stout, superintendent of the Copper Queen smelter here. These men and not an army officer, as reported to the outside world by the Western Union office here at the time, were the ones who issued the censorship orders to the telegraph company.

The report that the military had established the censorship was due, according to Manager Tillotson of the local Western Union office, to the fact that Mr. Stout generally is known as "captain" and to the fact that his dress is similar to that of an army man. Mr. Tillotson told the Associated Press after the censorship had been removed and an investigation made that he thought Mr. Stout was a captain in the regular army and that he was bound to obey his orders regarding the transmission of despatches relating to the disturbance at Bisbee.

Not Government Action.

The report that the military had imposed the censorship persisted throughout the district until late last night when inquiries at army headquarters brought the information that no military censorship had been in effect. Early today Mr. Stout admitted that he had directed the censorship but said he had acted on instructions "from the sheriff's office" at Bisbee. Pressed as to who in the sheriff's office had authority to censor telegrams, Mr. Stout was unable to designate from what person he had received his instructions, but persisted that they came from Bisbee. Sheriff Harry C. Wheeler went to Columbus on the cattle train on which the men were deported and had not returned to Douglas early today.

The first despatch concerning the deportations was filed by a correspondent of the Associated Press in the Western Union office at 6 a. m. yesterday. It was sent at once, to El Paso, to be relayed to the Associated Press office at Denver but before the relay was made, Mr. Rea, representing the Phelps-Dodge corporation, which controls the mines affected by the strike at Bisbee, instructed the operator on duty that the message was withdrawn. Upon this authority, according to the Associated Press, it was withdrawn.

NEW ROAD TO COAST LIKELY TO DIVERT TRAVEL FROM CITY

Route Regarded Probable Would Take Travel Between Florence and Portland Around Eugene via Junction City.

There is a very great probability that the coast branch of the Central Oregon highway will not be constructed from Florence to Eugene, but that the road will connect with the Pacific highway two and one-half miles south of Junction City, a route which would divert all travel between Florence, other points of the coast and Portland north of Eugene. This is said to be the most likely route found by Assistant State Highway Engineer C. M. Thomas, who after making a trip over the ground has returned with County Highway Engineer W. H. Libby in an effort to find as good a route, if possible, leading more directly into Eugene. In connection with the building of the coast branch of the Oregon Central highway and the possibility that it will connect with the Pacific highway an entirely new route for the Pacific highway between Junction City and Eugene has been proposed by engineers of the state commission. The plan which has been made as a suggestion for the consideration of the Lane county court contemplates the elimination of the river road now a part of the Pacific highway and the hard surfacing of a prairie road paralleling the Oregon Electric railroad for the greater part of the distance. The new road would be about the same length as the present road and four miles west of the river road.

To Eliminate Railroad Crossings.

The present prairie road crosses the railroad at many points, but the route for the new prairie road suggested by the engineers eliminates all railroad crossings between Junction City and Lassen station, a suburb of Eugene. It is outlined as running to the west of the railroad straight south for a distance of between 10 and 11 miles to the Elmina road and thence west over the Elmina road into Eugene.

The route of the proposed new road is within three miles of the Alvarado fruit district and the road would permit the hauling of fruit to market on motor trucks, if connecting roads running into the district were put into shape at comparatively small expense. It will also serve the lake region of western Lane county, permitting travel over between nine and ten miles of hard surfaced road in coming to Eugene from Florence and the coast region. The river road does not serve either of these regions and only one side of the river, it is stated.

Want Road to County Seat.

Assistant State Highway Engineer C. M. Thomas and County Engineer H. W. Libby have been spending the greater part of the week in an effort to agree upon a route for the coast section of the Oregon Central highway. The possibility that a route connecting with the Pacific highway two and one-half miles north of Junction City and 10 miles north of Eugene may be decided upon has been causing some concern here, as it would take the coast travel to and from Portland away from Eugene. The county court takes the view that the road should be constructed from the coast to find such a route, with suitable grades, the engineers returned to the field Thursday.

The route for the highway has been agreed upon from Florence to Blachly, by way of the portage on the North Fork, up the North Fork, crossing the divide to the main Siuslaw river at Ramrock, thence running to Swishome and up the Lake Creek road by way of Cape Horn, Deadwood and Greenleaf.

The route from Blachly to the valley is yet undecided. There is some talk of cutting across below Triangle Lake and going up Nelson creek by way of Hale, Noti and Elmina to Eugene. The old stage road from Swishome to Noti will not be followed under any consideration, according to the engineers. It would require too great a mileage and be too difficult to construct and would not serve the population in the territory it is desired to reach. Still another route considered, which is said to offer a promising grade, follows the so-called Hall road from Blachly directly east through Cheshire to the Oregon Electric railroad connecting with the Pacific highway two and one-half miles south of Junction City. A route out by way of Goldson, Franklin, Alvadore and into Eugene is another possibility and it is for the purpose of seeking better grades and shorter distance between Goldson and Alvadore that the engineers have made their second trip into that territory.

Brush Fire Near Mabel

Not Regarded as Dangerous

Fire burning in the brush above Mabel, near a rich timber region, have been causing some concern. A great cloud of smoke was visible from this city yesterday. A telephone message from Wendling stated that the situation was not considered dangerous.

The fire is in slashings on the Coast Range Lumber company's lands. The timber in that section of the country is extremely dry.

ORGANIZING TO RESIST I. W. W. DEPREDATIONS

Governor Withycombe and Adjutant-General White Decide That Home Guards Will Protect Interests of People.

CITIZENS OF OTHER STATES PREPARE TO MEET MENACE

Men Departed From Bisbee, Ariz., Move Toward Columbus, N. M., and El Paso, Tex., Using Tie Transportation.

San Francisco, July 13.—The far west was continuing early today to further align itself against the Industrial Workers of the World, state, county and city officials and even the citizens acting in their own behalf were actively following the lead of Bisbee, Ariz., where at an early hour the citizens who yesterday deported more than 1,000 men were asked to mobilize against any return of the undesired.

In Oregon more than 100 men have already enlisted in a home guard battalion to be stationed permanently in Oregon for home defense. All have had previous military training. Announcement of the organization was made following a conference on the I. W. W. situation in eastern Oregon between Governor Jas. Withycombe, Adjutant-General George A. White and State Fire Marshal Harvey Wells at Salem.

Governor Moses Alexander of Idaho has announced he will not ask for federal troops until the civil authorities of his state have failed to cope with the situation. Tomorrow he will confer with Governor Ernest Lister of Washington.

Sheriffs of Alameda and Contra Costa counties, Cal., prepared to repel a reported invasion of I. W. W. said to be marching from the north, and during the night deputies stood guard over all roads leading into both counties.

Bellingham Acts Quickly.

Short shift was given one agitator of the organization by unknown men north of Bellingham, Wash., last night when he attempted to reach a logging camp. Apprised of his visit the I. W. W. was waylaid and inveigled into an automobile. He was driven to Bellingham where he was told to take the first steamer away from that section.

From Butte, Mont., where the present situation first gained prominence reports seemingly indicate a settlement of the mine strike within the near future. Discussion has broken out among the different striking elements and a mass meeting will be held Sunday to decide whether a portion of the men who struck in sympathy will return to their tasks.

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3,000 MONARCHIST TROOPS SURRENDER IN TEMPLE OF HEAVEN

General Chang Hsun Forced to Take Refuge in Dutch Legation in Peking While Fighting Continues.

(By The Associated Press)

Washington, July 13.—Chinese legation despatches from Peking dated at noon today said that quiet had been restored in the capital after a battle in which the monarchist troops of General Chang Hsun were overwhelmed by republican forces.

The republican victory was complete, the despatches said, the last contingents of Chang Hsun's men having been forced to surrender. The monarchist general himself was reported a refugee in the Dutch legation.

Tien Tsin, Thursday, July 12.—Republican headquarters reports that 3000 troops of General Chang Hsun, the monarchist leader, surrendered in the Temple of Heaven after a fight of two hours. Chang Hsun took refuge in the Dutch legation. Fighting continues in the Forbidden city with a remnant of Chang Hsun's forces. A large fire is raging there.

Shanghai, China, Thursday, July 12.—A Tien Tsin telegram says the republican attack on Peking began at 4 o'clock this morning and that artillery, machine guns and airplanes are being used. Five or six foreigners who were watching the fighting from the falls of the city were wounded.

The legations at Peking are receiving foreigners for protection and taking every precaution.

It is reported that telegraphic communication has been interrupted.

NEW MEXICO CHIEF ORDERS DETENTION OF I. W. W. FOR NATION

War Department Officials at Washington Without Information as Use of Federal Troops in Disturbances.

(By The Associated Press)

Santa Fe, N. M., July 13.—Governor W. E. Landay of New Mexico, declaring the I. W. W. now at Hermans, N. M., should be treated humanely, but not allowed to cause disturbances, has directed Sheriff Simpson of Luna county to conduct the prisoners peaceably to Columbus and hold them in tents or stockade and feed them at state expense until the federal authorities take charge.

The governor has wired President Wilson requesting that "the general government take charge and dispose of the matter according to federal law and order," explaining that New Mexico "is now without organized military forces because the regiment is in federal service."

WASHINGTON NOT INFORMED

Washington, July 13.—The war department was without reports today from Arizona at the headquarters of the southern department indicating that Major-General Parker has used federal troops in the maintenance of order in the region where disturbances have been created by I. W. W.

General Parker's orders were to cooperate with the governor of Arizona and to take such measures as he regarded necessary for the protection of life and property. He was cautioned, however, to show no partiality and not to use the troops in the support of any faction, avoiding participation in any controversy.

Senator Myers, Montana, addressed the senate on the subject of the disorders today, declaring that the government should take "drastic action" against those lawless elements in the west who are threatening to burn wheat fields and are causing the shutdown of sawmills and mines.

"Much of the trouble," he said, "I believe is due to lawless elements who have injected themselves into the situation and are controlled by people hostile to this country."

A patriotic appeal to striking slaves in the Arizona mining regions to return to work in the interest of their own and their adopted country was sent today by telegram by the Serbian minister, Lionomir Michailovitch to M. R. Szewczyk, a slavic leader at Bisbee, Ariz.

The men had appealed to the southern slay council and the minister here for advice. About 1,000 of them are in the districts where the disorders have occurred.

B. K. WHEELER PAYS FINE FOR SPEEDING

Driver of Motor Car Alleged to Have Traveled at Rate of 39 Miles an Hour.

B. K. Wheeler today paid a fine of \$10 in municipal court for speeding in an automobile. He is alleged to have driven his car on East Thirteenth street at 39 miles an hour. He entered a plea of guilty when brought before Municipal Judge Grace Stearns.

Wheeler was arrested March 12 for speeding on a motorcycle. He was fined \$10 at that time.

Americans to Join French in Celebrating Independence

Paris, July 13.—Observance by the American troops in France of the French national holiday is provided in a proclamation issued today by Major-General Pershing. It follows:

"July 14 is hereby declared a holiday for all troops in this command. The people throughout France will celebrate on that day the declaration of the sacred principles of liberty, equality and fraternity in defense whereof we are now in France to fight by the side of the French soldiers. This is a glorious privilege that the American army has in uniting with the gallant soldiers and loyal people of France in celebrating with them on their national holiday our own devotion to the same high ideals."

Engineer at University Will Locate in Pendleton

Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Crabtree left Friday for Pendleton, Or., where they will reside. Mr. Crabtree recently resigned his position as engineer at the University of Oregon on account of ill health and will go on a farm.

Mr. Crabtree came here August 1, 1912, to accept the position from which he has just resigned. Prior to that time he was with the Booth-Kelly Lumber company for seven years, where he was considered an expert in his line. His services at the University have been satisfactory, and it is understood that he was allowed to resign with much regret.

HOLLWEG WILL RETAIN POST AS KAISER'S AIDE

Chancellor Will Accept Resolution by Majority Parties in Reichstag Setting Forth German War Aims.

PRUSSIAN FRANCHISE TO BE PUT IN EFFECT

Emperor William Issues Decree Calling for Reform to Take Effect Before Coming Elections. Austria Makes Appeal.

Copenhagen, July 13.—The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger says a communication from the Austro-Hungarian government has been received in Berlin declaring that Dr. Bethmann-Hollweg's continuance in office as chancellor is of importance and his retirement possibly a fatal mistake. The telegram was obviously despatched before the decision on the Prussian franchise was taken, which is generally interpreted in Berlin as a sign that Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg would remain.

The executive committee of the Catholic center of the reichstag on the other hand believes Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg unwelcome to conduct peace negotiations and says he should be replaced before an ultimate peace conference, considering the fact that the declaration of war occurred under his administration.

The party organ Germania asserts that von Bethmann-Hollweg will accept a resolution on war aims of the majority parties in the reichstag tomorrow. This resolution will re-state that the chancellor's announcement at the outbreak of the war that Germany was undertaking a defensive war and declare that the majority of the reichstag now favors peace based on a mutual understanding and lasting reconciliation of nations.

As long as the enemy governments refuse this, the German people and reichstag, the resolution will say, are united in a determination to fight on until the rights of Germany and its allies are assured.

KAISER ISSUES DECREE

Berlin, Wednesday, July 11, via London, July 13.—Emperor William has directed the following decree to the president of the state ministry:

"Upon the report of my state ministry, made to me in obedience to my decree of April 7 of the current year, I herewith decide to order a supplement to the same, that the draft of the bill dealing with the alteration of the electoral law for the house of deputies, which is to be submitted to the diet of the monarchy for decision, is to be drawn up on the basis of equal franchise. The bill is to be submitted in any case early enough that the next elections may take place according to the new franchise. I charge you to make all necessary arrangements for this purpose."

PROMPT ACTION BY CONGRESS URGED BY PRESIDENT WILSON

Legislation Along Lines of Original House Food Control Bill Only Compromise Suggested by Chief Executive.

Washington, July 13.—In a letter to Senator Martin, democratic floor leader, President Wilson today gave his views on food control legislation, advocating action along the line of the original house bill for government control of foodstuffs and fuel only. He opposed the proposed substitute bill of Senator Gore and emphasized his desire for prompt action by congress.

"The president took the position that extension of government control of steel, iron, cotton, copper, wool, leather, aluminum and other products is unnecessary.

Regarding the prohibition it was also learned that the president is not in accord with the purposes of Senator Smoot's amendment proposing that the government buy all stocks of distilled beverages in bond. This provision probably will go to conference and in view of the president's opposition regarding it, indications were that it would be eliminated by the conferees or a modification made.

CANTEENS ESTABLISHED

Paris, July 13.—The American Red Cross yesterday began establishing canteens, restaurants and dispensaries at railway stations where the American troops will pass going to and from the front. The canteens will supply coffee, bread and sandwiches.
