### NEW EQUIPMENT ALL NEEDED AT CANNERY

Necessary to Utilize Old Methods Also to Handle Rush of Cherries This Week.

The new equipment which was placed in the Eugene cannery this year is all needed. New automatic cooking tanks were put in to handle the gallon cans and it was thought that there would be little use for the open vat system formerly in use, but it has been found necessary to employ it to supplement the automatic system. This new system avoids the necessity of handling the cans, as they travel automatically from the machine which adds the syrup, through a heating tank to the sealing machine, then through a tank of cold water, which reduces the heat so that they can be handled. Cherries are graded in size by machines and filled by machines, the stemming and filling of the cans being about the only work done without the aid of the machinery. The stemming is done by women and girls. They begin working at 6 and 6:30 in the morning and quit about 4 in the afternoon. These hours are necessary because all cherries which have been stemmed must be in the cans and cooked the same day. When a full crew is working it is often 8 o'clock or later in the evening before the canning and cooking crew completes its work.

### NEW COURSE IN LAW, IS UNIVERSITY PLAN

Dean E. W. Hope Announces Courses to Be Introduced at Institution Next Year.

A six weeks' course in law will be offered at the University of Oregon summer school next year, according to an announcement by Dean E. W. Hope. The courses will be scheduled to fill the needs not only of students preparing to practice law, but for those wishing law work as an aid to them in other professions or lines of business.

For the benefit of students expecting to enter business rather than practice law, a course in general business law will be offered at the opening of the fall term of school at the University this year. This will be given as a lecture course and will, it is expected, draw women students as well as men. Another course to be given is especially for women—one in domestic relations. Heretofore only one woman has been registered for work in the law school, Miss Helen Hamilton, daughter of Judge J. W. Hamilton, of Roseburg.

The course in Oregon practice and procedure, given last year for the first time, is to be repeated next year. It is to be extended to two hours a week throughout the school year.

### LIEUT. HAMBLE TO BE ORDNANCE OFFICER

Local Man Succeeds Lieutenant Lundgren, Who Goes to Engineers as Captain.

Lieutenant C. B. Hamble, of this city, acting adjutant of the Coast Artillery corps, has been appointed ordnance officer and will go to Portland Saturday evening to take over the custody of the ordnance. At present there is no ordnance officer. Lieutenant Leonard Lundgren, who has been acting in that capacity of the Oregon national guards and been promoted to the rank of captain and assigned to staff duty. The ordnance is practically all in the hands of the company captains and Lieutenant Hamble will take over the books, etc., of that department and receive new receipts from company commanders for the ordnance stores in their custody. Ordinance includes guns, bayonets, swords, all range equipment, etc., and also, by one of the peculiarities of federal usage, the knives, forks, spoons and some other articles of personal equipment.
