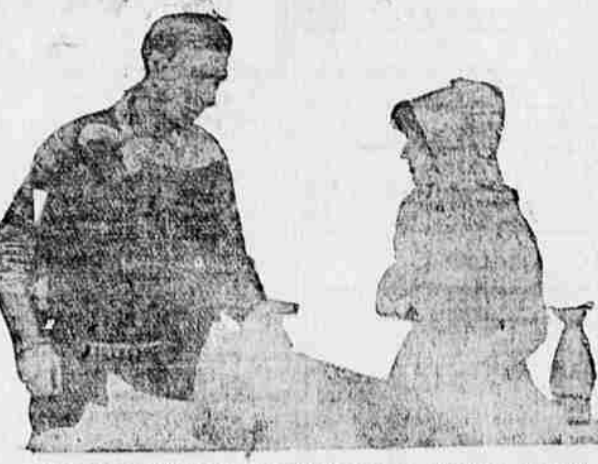
Simpson to Go to Annapolis—
