WILLIAM EBBERT PIONEER OF LANE, DIES AT AGE OF 85

Last of Three Brothers Who Crossed Plains to Oregon in 1852. Removed to Gilliam County 30 Years Ago.

William Ebbert, aged 85, the last of three brothers who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1852 and settled in Lane county, died at his home in Walla Walla, Wash., yesterday, according to word received by relatives in Springfield. Mr. Ebbert continued to reside in this county until about 30 years ago, when he moved to Gilliam county, Oregon, and later to Walla Walla. He was a brother of the late J. A. Ebbert, wealthy resident of Springfield. George Ebbert, the third brother, died in Monmouth four years ago.

They were members of a large family of brothers and sisters of whom, Mrs. Harriett Morris, of Stockport, Iowa, mother of Miss Margaret Morris, of Springfield, and Mrs. Ingba Keck, of Colorado, survive. Harrison Ebbert, another brother who came west in the eighties, died at his home in Portland recently.

John W. Ebbert is survived by three daughters and five sons: Mrs. J. S. Powers and Mrs. John Wenzel, of Springfield; Miss Lillian Ebbert, of Walla Walla; James Ebbert, of Portland; Z. A. Ebbert and I. W. Ebbert, of Portland; M. D. Ebbert, of Newberg, and LeRoy Ebbert, of Walla Walla.

The body will be brought to Lane county for burial. Funeral services will be held in Eugene at 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, at the Gordon & Veatch chapel.

NEW PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL TO QUIT

Arley C. Hamilton Tenders Resignation, to Become Head of Schools in La Grande.

If W. R. Rutherford, city superintendent of schools here, should be elected to the position of third assistant superintendent of schools in Portland as has been suggested and accepted that position, the Eugene schools will find it necessary to obtain both a superintendent of schools and principal for the high school before the opening of school next fall. Arley C. Hamilton, of Pendleton, recently elected principal of the Eugene high school, has tendered the superintendency of the public schools at La Grande, where he was formerly principal in the high school.

Mr. Hamilton had moved to Eugene from Pendleton, at the time he received notice of his election to the La Grande position.

FIGHTING RESUMED OUTSIDE OF PEKING

Mediation Refused by General Chang Hsun and Republican Forces Prepare Attack.

London, July 13.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Tien Tsin says that fighting again began outside of Peking yesterday.

Tien Tsin, July 13.—Republican headquarters say that owing to General Chang Hsun's refusal to mediate, they intend to attack the Forbidden city at the first opportunity. Heretofore they have been reluctant to do so owing to the proximity of Chang Hsun's residence to the legation quarter. Chang Hsun has artillery and republicans fear that in the event of their entering Peking Chang Hsun will fire into the legations.

Wang Tah Sieh, the new foreign minister, could not altogether manage the long distance telephone facilities, and at this point their scheme for news censorship broke down. News of the deportation went forward through the Associated Press to the newspapers of the country and the facts were being printed from coast to coast at a time when the mine officials, by blocking thousands of additional words of telegraphic news, felt that they had concealed the situation.

Morris T. Cook, general superintendent of the Western Union company in the territory affected, hurried to his office early today upon being informed of the censorship on the wires of his company.

"Nobody but the army can censor our service," he said. "I will begin an investigation at once. I wish to establish the facts at the earliest possible moment in order that we may proceed."

INVESTIGATION UNDER WAY.

(By The Associated Press)
San Francisco, July 13.—Alleged tampering with service of the Western Union Telegraph company by Robert Rao, general auditor of the Copper Queen mines and smelter at Douglas, Ariz., and H. H. Stout, known as "Captain" Stout, superintendent of the smelter, will be probed to the limit, Western Union officials here announced today. A report that the army had imposed the censorship proved wholly untrue.

Rao and Stout, according to the Douglas manager of the telegraph company, held up yesterday for many hours despatches filed at Bisbee and Douglas, describing the deportation of more than 1000 I. W. W.'s from Bisbee. Reports forwarded to the Western Union officials in New York were that army authorities had imposed this censorship. These reports, it was said today, resulted from the fact that "Captain" Stout wears a khaki uniform and was mistaken for an army officer. They succeeded in gaining Western Union operators and gained control of a brokerage leased wire, but

ARMY ON MOVE.

(By The Associated Press)
Columbus, N. M., July 13.—The army of I. W. W. departed from Bisbee yesterday, and whose special train of cattle cars and box cars was sidetracked at Hermans, N. M., late last night, left Hermans during the forenoon today and is strung for a mile or more along the railroad track, walking east in this direction, according to reports received here.

Relying on this information, Columbus citizens turned out heavily armed to repel any "invasion." The situation of the deported persons was described as desperate. Hermans, a railroad station surrounded by a few houses, had no supplies for feeding the I. W. W., numbering nearly 1,200, and they are said to be suffering from lack of food. It was feared a situation difficult to control might arise if they swarmed into town here.

EL PASO TO RESIST.

(By The Associated Press)
El Paso, July 13.—Acting on advice from Columbus that the trainload of I. W. W. persons deported from the Warren district of Arizona, left Hermans, N. M., this morning to walk to El Paso, city officials made prompt preparations to deal with the situation. It was planned to feed those in need of assistance as they came in and to arrest them on vagrancy charges if deemed advisable. In the absence of positive information it was believed some of the deported persons might be walking over the branch railroad line from Hermans to Deming in the hope of getting food.

DEPORTED MEN AT HERMANAS

(By The Associated Press)
El Paso, Texas, July 13.—Practically all of the 1,100 alleged members of the Industrial Workers of the World and their sympathizers deported from Bisbee, Ariz., yesterday, still were at Hermans, N. M., early today, according to officials of the El Paso and Southwestern railroad general office here.

Hermans consists of a railway station and three or four houses. It is 20 miles west of Columbus, N. M. The train of freight cars and cattle cars carrying the men returned to Hermans when officers at Columbus, N. M., refused to permit the prisoners to be unloaded.

Railroad officials said the water supply at Hermans was adequate for the deported men.

It was understood they were provisioned at Bisbee with enough food to last until they reached Columbus.

Future movements of the men have not been determined upon, according to railway men. It was certain they said, that the men would not come east in the direction of El Paso.

As far as known no attempt has been made to carry out the announced plan of the deported men's leaders to seize the first train bound for Arizona, board it and return to Bisbee. Railroad officials said no trains had been interfered with today.

JAMES HAMMOND HELPING UNCLE SAM

Actor, Native Son of Lane County, Does His Bit in Connecticut Recruiting Work.

James Gilmore Hammond, actor, native son of Lane county, brother of one of the late U. S. Senators, is doing his bit for Uncle Sam in New London, Conn., where he has been taking a part in recruiting rallies which have resulted in many enlistments in the army.

According to copies of the New London Daily Globe received by his mother, Mrs. F. A. Rankin, the paper states that the actor, finished a fervent plea to "red-blooded, whole-souled young men of New London" to enlist in the army at the noon-day rally in front of the municipal building today. Get Knowlton of Glenwood park stepped forward and signed a moment to Morris Taffier, also of New London, stepped out of the crowd in response to Mr. Hammond's beckoning finger and enrolled himself for Uncle Sam.

"The recruiting rally this noon was for the most stirring and most effective thus far. Judge Edward B. Nicholson Bridgeport and Mr. Hammond were speakers and they drove home to the crowd of about 300 gathered in front of the municipal building the seriousness of the present crisis so logically and so practically that recruiting received an immediate stimulus that continued all afternoon."

The paper devotes about two columns of space to the meeting, quoting Mr. Hammond's speech and telling of recruiting activities.

Mr. Hammond closed the appeal as follows: "Come on, men, America is in a fix. She's calling you and you ought to answer. There's a recruiting sergeant over there at that tent with pencil and book and he will be awful glad to add your name."

Other editions of the paper tell of several similar meetings in which Mr. Hammond took part, arousing enthusiasm to a high pitch.
