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FARM LEADER MARIS VISITS LANE COUNTY

Comes From Klamath County; Reports Citizens Thoroughly Aroused to Stop Depredations

Paul V. Maris, of Corvallis, state leader of County Agriculturists, was in Eugene Wednesday. Mr. Maris had just returned from Klamath Falls, having been there at the time the Martin Brothers flour mill burned there a few days ago. He states that the citizens there are thoroughly aroused and propose to make it lively for trouble makers. The W. W. had been patrolling all public roads leading to places where men were employed, trying to induce them to stop work, he stated.

Mr. Maris said that the crops in Klamath county are suffering very badly for rain and that unless there is a very sudden change the crop will be very light.

In Jackson county, he found prospects much better. Most of the spring grain there is out of the way of drought and the fruit crop will be heavy. The peach crop is the biggest ever known, and apples and pears will be at least better than an average, present conditions indicate.

When he was last in eastern Oregon crop prospects were good, but according to the later reports the small grain crops are being badly damaged by dry weather and hot winds.

ELECTRICAL STORMS DANGER TO FORESTS

Frequent Disturbances Reported Near Willamette and McKenzie Summits In Cascades.

Frequent electrical storms are reported near the McKenzie and Willamette summits in the Cascade national forests, but none have resulted in starting forest fires notwithstanding the unusually dry state of the timber, according to official of the Cascade forest.

Reports received at the office of the Cascade forest, from the Deschutes forest, east of the summit of the Cascades, are to the effect that 40 fires have been started within that reservation by lightning, but all have been brought immediately under control.

Veterans of Indian War Elect Officers at Portland

Portland, Or., July 18.—Over a score of gray-haired veterans who fought against the Indians of the Cayuse, Yakima and Rogue River tribes between 1847 and 1850 met here today at the 32nd annual encampment of the Indian War Veterans' association of Oregon. Few of the veterans were under 80 years of age. Edward Ross, Portland, was re-elected grand commander and Mrs. T. Benedict, Portland, was chosen assistant secretary, the first woman ever elected to office in the organization.

Destroys Zeppelin and Submarine Single Handed

Hamilton, Ont., July 18.—Description single handed first of a German submarine and then of a Zeppelin by Lieutenant Basil D. Hobbs of the Royal Flying corps is described in advices received today by his relatives. His exploits, which have won him a letter of congratulation from Admiral Jellicoe, and recommendation for the Victoria Cross, were accomplished from a seaplane.
He swooped down over the U-boat and dropped bombs on it until it sank. A few days later he attacked the airship and sent it crashing to earth in flames, causing the death of its entire crew.

MAY USE TROOPS.

Olympia, Wash., July 18.—Secretary of War Baker telegraphed to Governor Lister today saying that if the lumber strikes threaten to interfere with army posts shipments the governor is authorized to use troops to protect the plants and workmen. Governor Lister had already made arrangements for protection of plants by troops where necessary.

BEAN CROP IS STILL IN FAIR CONDITION

County Agriculturist Robb Advises to Continue Cultivation of Field Beans.

The bean crop of Lane county is still in fair condition, in spite of the dry weather, stated N. S. Robb, county agriculturist, Wednesday. Mr. Robb has been making several drives around the county and reports that practically all bean fields where cultivation has been kept up and where they are free from weeds are in fair condition and should produce a good crop. He states that some are stopping cultivation for fear of knocking off blossoms, but that is a mistake. The loss of blossoms by knocking off a few blossoms will not compare with that which will result from the dry weather unless a fine mulch is kept on the field by frequent cultivation.

The fields which are in poor condition are either those in which the seed bed was not in good condition when the crop was planted, or in which later cultivation has been neglected. Owing to the dry weather the vines are not as large as the average year, but they can therefore be cultivated much later without knocking off blossoms, and the yield increased thereby.

Mr. Robb also reports the second crop of clover light, and that corn is suffering where the seed bed was not properly prepared.

Mayo Accepts Position as Fire Guard in Forest

H. M. Mayo will leave Eugene tomorrow for the top of Prairie Mountain in the Siuslaw national forest, where he will spend the summer, as a fire guard in the forest service. The station has telephone connection with other sections of the forest.

WOULD QUIET TITLE TO LARGE LAND TRACT

John A. McCutcheon Would Bar Belle S. Munroe of Claim to Lane County Land.

A suit was commenced in the circuit court Tuesday to quiet title to a tract of land consisting of 481.02 acres in township 17 south, range 6 west. The suit was brought by John A. McCutcheon against Bell S. Munroe Tiffany, and F. E. Tiffany, her husband. The defendant, Bell S. Munroe Tiffany, is a descendant of Lucy A. Munroe, a former owner of the land, and it is sought that any claim through such inheritance may be set aside. A. E. Wheeler is attorney for the plaintiff in the case.

David Auld and H. C. Auld, doing business as the Mohawk Lumber company, on Tuesday asked a receiver for certain stock, etc., owned by George Melvin Miller, and stock owned by him jointly with C. O. Devere, Wm. Stephenson and C. W. Young, to secure the payment of a judgment for \$250.00 and costs heretofore secured against Miller, Chas. A. Hardy is attorney for plaintiff.

H. E. Slattery brought suit against Helen Stubbfield in circuit court Tuesday on a note for \$450 given to Wm. H. Martin on which the sum of \$38 had been paid, that amount having been all that was realized on the foreclosure of a mortgage given to secure the note. An attachment was filed in the case against the S. E. 1/4 of section 20, township 19 south, of range 5 west, in Lane county.

DIRECTIONS GIVEN FOR FIGHTING PEST

Cucumber Beetle Makes Its Appearance, Attacking Bean Fields and Cucumber Vines.

The twelve-spotted cucumber beetle is beginning to work again in bean fields, according to reports received at the office of County Agriculturist N. S. Robb. This is the second brood this year. The beetles will be active for several days, attacking the vines of the bean and the cucumber. Their ravages extend to the leaves and tender parts of the plants. They are not effectively poisoned, but may be repelled by spraying with Bordeaux mixture of the following strength: Copper sulphate one pound; lime one pound; water 12 1/2 gallons.

Dissolve the sulphate in two gallons of water; slack the lime and dilute to two gallons, then add 8 1/2 gallons of water. Spray plants thoroughly, getting it on the under side of the leaves. Leave a few plants or rows unsprayed. The beetles will collect on these trap plants and then may be destroyed.

The new generation of potato flea beetle is also appearing. It destroys the foliage of the potato and causes considerable damage. It can be controlled by using the same spray as the above, or by using an arsenate of lead spray, as follows: Arsenate of lead, 3 pounds; water 50 gallons; cane syrup 2 1/2 quarts; the solution should be sprayed on with particular attention to getting it on the under side of the leaves.

TO BRING BODY TO EUGENE FOR BURIAL

Remains of James R. Brown to Be Placed in Hope Abby Mausoleum.

The body of James R. Brown, who died at Salem yesterday will be brought to Eugene tomorrow for interment in Hope Abby mausoleum. It will arrive on the Oregon Electric train, at 12:25 p. m., and be taken directly to the cemetery, where William Mott Case will conduct services.

Mr. Brown was 65 years of age and a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and the Modern Woodmen. He spent the greater part of his life in Wyoming and Nebraska, coming to Oregon a few years ago. He is survived by his wife, and five sons and daughters: Mrs. Henry Scherwing, Eugene; Mrs. Lee W. Henry, Plain View, Neb.; Mrs. Walter Johnson, Woodburn, Or.; Mrs. D. W. Johns, Sheridan, Wyo.; Mrs. O. E. McAdams, Portland; George H. James R. Jr., and Harry Brown, of Sheridan, Wyo., Otto Brown, of Portland, and Dewey Brown, of Salem.

WASHINGTON TO HAVE 16 MILITIA COMPANIES

Organizations to Take Place of National Guard Planned by Adjutant-General.

(By The Associated Press)
Seattle, July 18.—Adjutant-General Maurice Thompson today authorized the organization of 16 infantry militia companies, to be known as the Washington state guard, to take the place of the present state troops when the latter are drafted into the federal army August 3.

The new state militia organization will be of a strength equal to United States army standards for infantry organizations in peace. The troops will not be subject to federal draft and will not constitute a part of the present national guard which is recognized by the government. The new troops will be exclusively state troops and will be subject to the laws and regulations of the state of Washington.

The Washington state guard will consist of peace strength companies in the following cities: Seattle and Spokane, two companies each, with one company at Tacoma, Everett, Centralia, Raymond, Ellensburg, Colfax, Bellingham, Snohomish, Aberdeen, North Yakima, Wenatchee and Walla Walla.

The railroads of the United States have met every emergency since the declaration of war, according to Daniel Willard, chairman of the Committee on Transportation of the Council of National Defense. The railroads have to their credit, through co-operation with the War Board, the following achievements:—

The 638 companies operating in forty-eight states and controlling 263,000 miles of road have been practically nationalized and are working as one system.

They have made all transfer of troops on schedule, without interfering with civil traffic, to the entire satisfaction of the War Department.

They are handling at the same time, without congestion, more than 3,000,000,000 more ton miles a month than a year ago, or an increase of sixteen per cent.

They have successfully handled the added traffic thrown on them by the withdrawal on account of the war of many lake and seacoast vessels.

In spite of this increased business they have decreased the general car shortage one-third since May 1.

They have increased the practical supply of cars by 779,000 through heavier loading, quicker repairs, quicker handling, by pooling shipments at lake and seaports, thus releasing cars immediately and by utilizing box cars that formerly were sent to the coast empty.

They have given preference to coal shipments, particularly for the government and its allies.

Twenty-nine per cent more bituminous coal was handled in April this year than in the same month of 1916.
Second preference has been given to ore shipments, which also have increased enormously.

The grain situation also has been greatly improved. There is no grain being held at any point because of a car shortage.

Arrangements are being perfected so that the entire deciduous fruit crop also will be handled satisfactorily. To further these efforts are being made to empty cars where needed by transferring empty cars from one section to another regardless of ownership.

All passenger trains not absolutely necessary are being removed from service. In short the railroads are meeting the needs of the government, at least promptly and effectively as if they were under government authority.

HERBERT LEIGH GETS VERDICT OF \$1,000

Jury Says Coast Mines Company Should Pay \$1000 for Discovery of Ledge.

The case of Herbert Leigh vs. the West Coast Mines company went to the jury at 11:35 Wednesday morning and at 2 o'clock they returned with a verdict for \$1,000. Leigh asked \$5,000 for the discovery of a gold ledge on the property of the defendants and for which they agreed to pay \$5,000 as taken from the profits of the gold mined from the ledge.

The court at once proceeded to empanel a jury in the case of the Montana Coal and Iron company vs. Omas Hoskins, et al. The suit is brought to enforce repayment of money paid out by the defendants as assignees of certain mining stocks, in payment of attorney fees in a previous case brought by defendant against plaintiff and which was settled by plaintiff buying defendant's stock.

O. H. Foster and C. A. Hardy are attorneys for the plaintiff and Williams and Bean are for the defense.
