GERMAN CONFIDENT U-BOATS WILL WIN

Von Ludendorff Says Submarines Have Fulfilled Task by Reducing Enemy's Munition Supply.

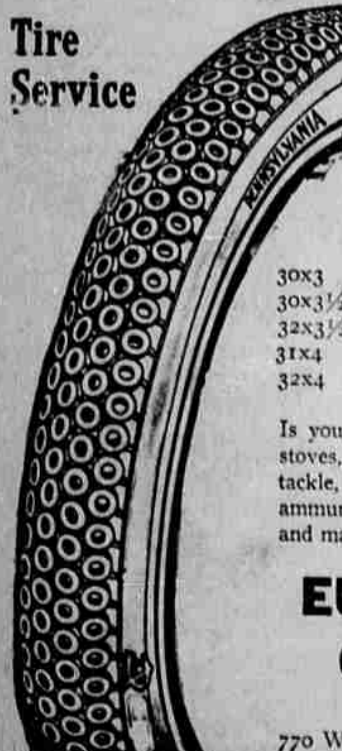
Amsterdam, July 21.—General von Ludendorff, the German quartermaster-general, in discussing the military situation for the benefit of the members of the reichstag, according to a semi-official telegram received from Berlin, said: "In starting the submarine warfare, the supreme army command was guided by a desire to hit the enemy's war industry, especially the production of ammunition. Through the submarine warfare our armies in the west were greatly re-

lieved, and the enemy's production of ammunition having decreased, thus our U-boats fulfilled their task.

"The supreme army command expects the submarine warfare to break England's ability to prepare for war by lessening her tonnage. Fulfillment of this will come despite America and with it the end of the world war and peace which is desired by the supreme army command."

FEDERAL OFFICERS TO COPE WITH I. W. W. AT KLAMATH FALLS

Authorities Arrive On Scene of Disturbances to Ascertain if It Is Advisable to Send Troops Into District.

(By The Associated Press.) San Francisco, July 21.—Government officials left here last night to investigate reported activities of I. W. W. at

Dorris, on the California-Oregon border and at Klamath Falls, Or., on telegraphic orders from the department of justice in Washington.

The federal party included Assistant United States Attorney Charles A. Orin, chief deputy United States Marshal George B. Burnham, and deputy Marshal Thomas B. Mulhall. They have full power to act and will decide as to the advisability of sending troops to quell alleged attempts to destroy crops and livestock, to hamper transportation, and to damage the waterworks at Klamath Falls. The attorney-general stated he had received information to this effect and appeals for aid from district attorneys in that vicinity. Mr. Orin will co-operate with United States Attorney C. L. Reames at Portland. Fifty arrests have been made in Dorris as an outgrowth of the trouble, according to federal authorities.

DENOUNCES SEIZURE OF GERMAN VESSELS

Action of British Is Declared "Brutal Assault on Defenseless Merchantmen."

(By The Associated Press.) Copenhagen, July 21.—The British seizure of German ships was denounced as a "brutal assault on defenseless merchantmen" and a "profligate act" by Dr. Krieger, director of the judicial department of the German foreign office, in replying to a question in the reichstag. Dr. Krieger added that Germany had urged Holland to demand an apology for this unheard of violation in Dutch waters and a precise assurance that it would not recur. Dr. Krieger said Germany was entitled to and would expect immediate restoration of the captured ships and compensation for the cargoes of those sunk, also for the wounded seamen and their dependents. Holland, he said, had already expressed regret at the occurrence and declared it would demand the fullest satisfaction. The reichstag has adjourned until September 23.

WIFE OF CAPTAIN M. B. HUNTLEY, FEARING INSANITY, ENDS LIFE

Body Found in Garrett by Husband Who Returns From Armory After Making Preparation to Enter Service.

Mrs. M. B. Huntley, wife of Captain Huntley, of the Third company, Coast Artillery, Oregon national guard, committed suicide by hanging herself to a rafter in the garret of the Huntley residence yesterday. Her body was found at about 6 o'clock last night, but life had apparently been extinct for several hours. Captain Huntley, who probably holds the record for continuous service in the Oregon national guard, has been busily engaged preparing his organization for the call into the federal service July 25.

Yesterday morning Mrs. Huntley suggested that he go to his mother's, at Springfield, where their daughters were spending the day, and take dinner, which he did.

Doors Locked at Noon. After returning to Eugene, Captain Huntley went to his home and found the door locked, and thought perhaps his wife had gone to visit with some friends. An investigation, started last night, when he found his wife still apparently absent, resulted in the discovery of her body.

Mrs. Huntley is survived by her husband and two daughters, Myrtle and Esther, aged 14 and 20, respectively. She had been in ill health for several years.

Fearing Loss of Mind. Captain Huntley said that lately his wife had told him a number of times that she feared she was losing her mind. She was in bad health and had never completely recovered from a surgical operation which she underwent last winter.

Captain Huntley said that while she grieved over his contemplated departure for the war, all arrangements for her support and for her comfort had been made. They had sold their residence, which is in the outskirts of the city, and arrangements had been made to rent a house closer in for her and the daughters. All the family affairs were adjusted to meet any adversity and Captain Huntley said he had arranged everything for his wife's happiness while he was away.

Mrs. Huntley was aged 41 years and was born in Nebraska, but had lived a greater part of her life in this county. They were married 23 years ago at Springfield, living in Eugene since. The funeral will be held at the Branstetter & McLaughlin chapel at 10 o'clock Monday and interment will be in Laurel Hill cemetery.

SEATTLE THREATENED BY CITY-WIDE STRIKE

Building Trades Council Adopts Resolution Pledging Support for Traction Workers.

Seattle, July 21.—The Seattle Building Trades council, composed of 32 unions with 5,000 members, last night adopted the following resolution: "That the secretary send to all unions affiliated with the building trades council a communication notifying them to be ready to answer to a call for a general strike in the building industry until such time as the Puget Sound Traction, Light and Power company grants the rights of its employees to organize."

The effect of such a strike would be to halt construction work in practically every industrial plant in the city.

The council also adopted a resolution condemning the detaining of policemen to ride as guards on street cars. Two of the 13 policemen discharged yesterday for refusing to ride with strikebreakers belong to unions in the building trades.

RIDER OF BICYCLE IS SERIOUSLY INJURED

Fred R. Reams Run Down by Motorist. Chance For Recovery Uncertain, Doctor States

Fred R. Reams, a farmer, aged 47, picked up unconscious from the roadside on the River road last night, is a patient in the Mercy hospital, seriously and perhaps fatally hurt as the result of being struck by a motor car while riding a bicycle from Eugene to his home, six miles from the city.

Reams' head and face were badly cut and three of his ribs were broken. Dr. F. E. Selover, the attending physician, stated that his recovery was uncertain. Mr. Reams is married and has three children.

J. H. Edwards, of 1093 West Sixth street, an eye-witness to the accident, stated that he was riding on a load of hay at the time and saw Reams coming from the opposite direction. Edwards was accompanied by Mr. Hillstead, who was walking in the road ahead of the hay wagon. The automobile came from behind, circling around the load of hay, narrowly missing Hillstead and striking Reams.

Mr. Edwards stated that the driver of the car and a woman who accompanied him, apparently his wife, stopped and sought to assist the injured man, calling for a doctor and remaining on the ground possibly 10 minutes. No one obtained the number of the car or the name of the driver, so far as he knew, he stated.
