ROSEBURG ADOPTS EUGENE'S METHODS

Douglas County Metropolis To Repair Streets After Plan Adopted Here.

Mayor Napoleon Rice of Roseburg believes that Eugene officials have found a very efficient plan of street repairs and that city is going to copy the Eugene plan, according to the Roseburg Review which says in a recent issue:

"Mayor Napoleon Rice, who returned last evening from Eugene, where he spent the last few days, said that he

found the crops there very satisfactory. Mayor Rice spent some time visiting at his ranch there, where he attended to making arrangements for this season's crops. While visiting in Eugene, Mayor Rice was pleasantly entertained and said that he found the people of that city very kind and courteous to Roseburg.

"Mayor Rice was greatly interested in inspecting the street department there and the different methods used by Eugene in repairing the streets. He said that the Eugene department very generously offered to lend to this city several necessary tools for street work that cannot be obtained at the present time. A. M. Oeland, who is in charge of the street work, was also a visitor in Eugene at that time, and spent a day conferring with the street superintendent there and inspecting various parts of the work.

"Mayor Rice said this morning that the local street department will start tomorrow in the work of repairing the streets and the methods used in Eugene would be put into practice here. It is intended to complete the repairing of the streets before the beginning of the rainy season here. It will probably take several weeks to finish this work, as there are many places in need of improvement and repair."

WILSON OPPOSED TO LARGE FOOD BOARD

Chief Executive Will Seek To Have Law Provide for Single Administrator.

(By The Associated Press) Washington, July 23.—President Wilson probably will bring his personal influence to bear on senate and house conferees on the food bill to accept the house provision for a single food administrator instead of the board of three as voted by the senate. The president may take a hand in some of the other conflicting sections.

President Wilson is understood to prefer the senate prohibition section forbidding manufacture of distilled liquors but allowing the manufacture of beer and wine. The house put in a "bone dry" section. The president has heretofore opposed a congressional committee to investigate the conduct of the war and there is no reason to believe he will favor such an amendment to the bill.

WILL LECTURE UPON FOOD CONSERVATION

Miss Winnifred Kerr Will Complete Course of Talks On Economy This Week.

Miss Winnifred Kerr, of the Portland public schools, delivering a series of lectures on food economy in connection with the summer school of the University of Oregon, along lines suggested by Herbert C. Hoover, national food director, left last night for Portland, to deliver a series of lectures at the Portland center of the summer school, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. She will return to Eugene Thursday to deliver the last three lectures of the course here.

The outline for the course, which was to have been supplied by Mr. Hoover, failed to arrive, although letters were received at the University stating that it would be mailed in time for use in connection with the lectures on the dates announced. Miss Kerr has prepared a

course of her own which she believes to be along lines similar to that which Mr. Hoover might be expected to send.

Miss Kerr last week lectured on the fundamentals of an adequate diet, preparation of meats and meat substitutes and the feeding of children.
