DISTRICT BOARD ONLY AN APPELLATE BODY

Has No Jurisdiction Excepting Where Appeal Is Made From a Local Board.

L. M. Travis, who with Dr. Wm. Kuykendall, C. S. Williams, Martin Svarverud and Rott, Fischer, constitute the district board for local exemptions for the Second Oregon district, stated today that numerous persons are interviewing the board regarding the exemptions, under the mistaken idea that the district board has original jurisdiction.

The district board is merely an appellate board from decisions of the local boards. The local exemption board for Lane county consists of James C. Parker, sheriff; Stacy M. Russell, county clerk, and Dr. T. W. Harris. All claimants for local exemptions must be passed by the local board, and the district board has no jurisdiction excepting where an appeal is made from a local board.

The district board has appellate jurisdiction over the following counties: Benton, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Lincoln, Linn, Lake, Lane, Polk and Klamath, but in no instance can an exemption claim be brought to the attention of the district board until after the claim has been decided by the local board, in which event an appeal can be made by either party in event of dissatisfaction with the decision of the local board.

ROUTINE ARMY LIFE FOR ARTILLERY BOYS BEGINS AT ARMORY

Regular Schedules of Calls and Drills and Policing of Buildings Are Daily Tasks of Men in Ranks.

The Eugene armory is now a veritable military camp. The first guard mount was held Wednesday morning. From that time on everything moved with military precision and under military orders. Daily drill is the principal occupation.

Both companies are nearly full strength. Reports from outlying companies are to the effect that they are also practically at full strength.

The first destination of the coast artillery has been settled as the mouth of the Columbia river, some of the companies being ordered to Fort Stevens, some to Fort Canby and some to Fort Columbia.

CATHOLIC KNIGHTS TO RAISE WAR CAMP FUND

Local Lodge Will Give \$275 to Aid in Order's Work in Social and Moral Lines.

The local council of the Knights of Columbus has undertaken to raise \$275 toward the \$1,000,000 war camp fund being raised this week by that order. An assessment of \$2 per member, which will net about \$200 of the amount and a committee consisting of Joe Franzwa, chairman, J. H. Koke and E. X. Schaefer, have the matter in charge. A campaign is being made among the Catholics of the city, and inasmuch as the benefits go alike to Catholics and protestants they will welcome gifts from people of any denomination.

The work of this order along these lines is the Catholic counterpart of the work done by the Y. M. C. A., among the men in the training camps and in the field. Several of the posts on the frontier were last year furnished with reading rooms and reading matter, recreation rooms, etc., similar to the work of the Y. M. C. A., and it is to carry on this work that this fund is being raised.

The officials of the order estimate that 40 per cent of the men in the armies will be Catholics, and while the work of the camps is alike for the benefit of all men and creeds, yet they feel that they should take up the work as an organization because of their large representation in the personnel of the army.

STATES SEEK HONOR OF BEING FIRST IN RAISING DRAFT QUOTA

(By The Associated Press)
Washington, July 25.—The race between states for the honor of being first to fill their quotas under the selective draft bill was on today in earnest. Calling up men for physical examination began this morning in several regions.

Meanwhile details of the machinery for actually calling the accepted men into service and sending them to mobilization camps are being worked out. Provost-Marshal-General Crowder has already ruled that the claim of the army attaches to any registered men as soon as the local selection board has posted him as accepted. From that time on, unless exempted, he will be subject to military law and the articles of war. Failure to appear when called will bring the military forces of the provost-marshal-general in search of the missing man and he will be tried for any violation of regulations before a court martial. This ruling was necessary in order to enforce the prompt compliance of all accepted men with army orders.

It appears probable that the accepted men, when the mobilization order for the new army is given, will be first assembled in their selection board headquarters. Their distribution among the sixteen cantonments, General Crowder said today, would be governed by two rules—first, the section of the law requiring that they be assigned, as far as practicable, to duty with troops from their own state, and secondly, the location of the nearest cantonment to reduce the transportation problem as much as possible.

No information has reached General Crowder indicating that there will be any need to summon a second draft in addition to the 687,000 men now called for, during the present year. General Crowder said today he had understood that the draft machinery would not need to be employed again during the present year, although it will be kept intact. Estimates to cover expenses of the second increment have been submitted, it was pointed out, because all these expenditures must be made in advance of a call to have equipment and quarters ready, or the funds must be actually on hand when the call is made.

With physical examinations actually in progress, the record of the draft during the Civil war becomes interesting. At that time 25.77 per cent of the men called up were rejected for physical defects. There is no reason to expect any material increase in that factor.

Exemptions for industrial or similar reasons, as well as exemptions because of dependent relatives, enter an unexplored field. Until a ratio for this is worked out in practice in several typical communities and worked up into an average figure, no definite forecast of the probable number of men who will pass through the draft machinery to obtain the 687,000 soldiers can be given.

War department employees who enter the militia establishment with the approval of their immediate chiefs will be reinstated in their civil positions when their military service ends. A previous war department regulation required employees who entered training camps to resign their civil posts is rescinded. Approval of department chiefs will be required hereafter before employees of any executive department of the government will be accepted in any army organization.

Russian Women Take Part In Krev Battle

(By The Associated Press)
Petrograd, July 25.—The Russian women's battalion raised by the twice-wounded girl officer Vera Butchkevich, was in action on the front at Krev yesterday for the first time. They are reported to have been successful although the battalion suffered some losses, the extent of which is not yet known. The Novoe Vremya correspondent at the front reports that the women behaved in an exemplary way, gaining the respect of the men soldiers.

The "command of death" is the official title of the battalion raised by Mademoiselle Butchkevich. It recently left for the front after a review by M. Kerensky. Most of the recruits are from the higher educational academies or secondary schools, with a few peasants, factory girls and servants. Some married women were accepted but none who had children. Most of them are between 18 and 25 years of age, of good physique. They wear their hair short or have their heads entirely shaved. The girls carry the cavalry carbine which is five pounds lighter than the regular army rifle. They were drilled under the instruction of male sergeants of the Kolynsky regiment.

Sailors Say American Navy Destroyed 6 Attacking Boats

Halifax, N. S., July 25.—British sailors arriving here today who claim to have been among crews of vessels in the vicinity of the transports which conveyed the first American troops to France, say they were credibly informed that German submarines made a concentrated attack and were beaten off with a loss of six U-boats, only one submarine escaping.

The sailors say they were within three miles of the transports and witnessed some very continuous fire. The men were on three former Dutch vessels which had been taken over by the British government and were on their way to Europe.
