LEAKING BATTERIES

Perhaps in filling your battery you notice that one of the cells seems continually to be without water or that it takes an abnormal amount of water in comparison with the other two.

In such a case as this you should have your battery examined for a leaking jar. A leak in a jar may well be compared to a blowout in the tire. It is just as disastrous to the battery and unless it is fixed immediately will end in the ruin of the whole battery.

"Yes," you will say, "but how does it come about that the jars are cracked?" Generally speaking this condition comes about only through rough handling of the battery or exceedingly rough riding. Some batteries, of course, are made with cheap jars, but the majority of battery manufacturers are careful in this respect. They know too well the trouble that attends a cracked or broken jar. The Willard Storage Battery Company for instance requires each rubber jar to stand a 3000 lb. tensile strength test and a 24,000 volt electricity test which immediately shows up any imperfection. Such tests make cracked jars almost impossible under ordinary circumstances, says Mr. Anderson, the local Willard man.

The one way to guard against this condition is to see to it that the battery is firmly clamped down and to remember when you are riding over exceedingly rough roads that the battery is suffering as acutely as the rest of the car, in other words to drive carefully.

CAN NOT USE EMBLEM IN ANY ADVERTISING

Laws of Oregon Are Very Strict As To The Use of The National Flag Commercially.

Anyone using the American flag with any advertising printed, painted or otherwise attached thereto is liable to a fine of not less than \$20.00 and not more than \$100.00. Mrs. Susan Hill patriotic instructor in the local Women's Relief Corps wishes to call the attention to the following section (1901, page 286) of Lord's Oregon Laws:

"Section 2691. United States Flag. Desecration of, Prohibited.—Any person who in any manner, for exhibition of display, shall place or cause to be placed any words, or figures, or numbers, or marks, or inscriptions, or pictures, or design, or device, or symbol, or token, or notice, or drawing, or any advertisement, of any nature whatever, upon any flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, or shall expose or cause to be exposed to public view any such flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, upon which shall be printed, painted, or otherwise placed, or to which shall be attached, appended, affixed, or annexed, any words, or figures, or numbers, or marks, or inscriptions, or pictures or designs, or device, or symbol, or token, or notice, or drawing or any advertisement, of any nature or kind whatever, or who shall expose to public view, or shall manufacture, or sell, or expose for sale, or have in possession for sale, or for use, any article, or thing, or substance, being an article for merchandise, or a receptacle of merchandise, upon which shall have been printed, painted, or attached, or otherwise placed, a representation of any such flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, to advertise, or call attention to, or to decorate, or to ornament, or to mark, or to distinguish the article or thing, on which so placed, or shall publicly mutilate, trample upon, or publicly deface, or defile, or defile, or cast contempt, either by words or act, upon any such flag, standard, color, or ensign of the United States, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and subject to a fine of not less than twenty dollars (\$20.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00)."

GEORGE WATSON TO SERVE TEN MONTHS

George Watson, formerly of Eugene, who has been in the county jail at Portland for several months on a charge of selling liquor without a federal license, was convicted in the federal court Friday and after conviction was sentenced to ten months in the county jail there. The government produced nine witnesses who had purchased a mixture of alcohol and water of Watson at his barn outside the city limits of Eugene. He had previously served sentence for bootlegging. Justice Jesse G. Wells and Sheriff J. C. Parker of Eugene were among the witnesses.

Brother of R. B. Scroggs Gets Commission In Army

R. B. Scroggs, of Eugene, has received word that his brother, F. E. Scroggs has been commissioned as second lieutenant in the United States Army. Lieutenant Scroggs is now stationed at Fort, New Mexico, and has been serving in the army as a private and noncommissioned officer for the past four years.

OLD COFFEE MILL TO AID IN FOOD ECONOMY

Housewife Can Grind Her Own Grain to Greater or Less Extent, Says Expert.

Another use for the old coffee mill was suggested by Miss Winifred Kerr today in the last of her lectures on the economy of food, at the University of Oregon. "You can grind your own grain, to a greater or less extent, at home," she told the women assembled in room 1 of the University library building.

"A coffee mill costs about \$4. Un-ground cereals cost about half what the ground products cost, and they contain, of course, more food value," Miss Kerr pointed out. "Or the milling company will grind up the cereals for you at 25 cents a hundred. Cracked wheat, which you can make at home, in this way, is really one of the best of the breakfast foods. Corn can be ground in the same way."

"In the case of corn there is this advantage—when you grind your own you leave in the germ. This germ is taken out by the flour manufacturers, for the very reason which makes it valuable as food—because it contains a lot of fat. This fat, if allowed to remain in the meal, causes it in time to become rancid. Furthermore, it is used in the manufacture of rubber substitutes and other valuable by-products. Now, in the case of the home-grinding—the quantity ground can be small enough to be consumed before it grows rancid, and the food value of this grain is thereby greatly enhanced."

Miss Kerr passed around among her hearers several varieties of war bread, which was much enjoyed. Among the varieties handed around were rye, cooked, rye, cooked oatmeal, corn and potato breads. General directions were given also for the preparation of buckwheat and barley and ways of using cereals in other ways, as in muffins, hotcakes, cookies and pastry were described.

A final word of advice was given about the cooking of cereals. "Cook them a long time—in a fireless cooker, if possible, but, anyway, cook them a long time. This improves the flavor and makes the cereals more digestible. It isn't even necessary to finish cooking them the same day you start."

Miss Kerr will go to Portland tomorrow to give the last three lectures of her course there, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. On Thursday she will lecture before a woman's club in Salem, returning late in the week to Eugene, where she will spend the summer.

Boiling Points Real Test of Gasoline

"To start easily, accelerate quickly and smoothly, and have plenty of dependable power with economical mileage, you must use a gasoline having its boiling points in a continuous, unbroken, gradually rising series," said E. B. Goodpasture, the local automobile man.

"Boiling points are what determine good gasoline, not gravity. And it is well to bear in mind that mixtures or blends cannot have the proper continuous chain of boiling points. There are so many connecting fractions in the chain that no mixture could be made to contain even approximately the correct number or character of links. Straight-distilled refinery gasoline is the only motor-fuel containing the correct chain of boiling points."

though bombs are thrown with a straight arm swing quite different from the elbow motion of the baseball pitcher.

Word was received from headquarters today that the expeditionary force field bakery will be in operation within the next few days, supplying the soldiers with "home made" American bread. They have been living thus far on the regulation French war bread.

Representatives of the Salvation Army arrived at headquarters today and will soon make arrangements to hold meetings in the various billeting areas.

The headquarters staff has received from the French government meteorological data of the department in which the American troops are training and also for the part of the line in which the troops may eventually be employed. These figures show January is the coldest month of the year, with a mean temperature of 33 degrees Fahrenheit, a maximum of 6 and a minimum of five above zero.

July Hottest Month.

July is the hottest month with an average maximum of 80 degrees and an average minimum of 45, the days being very warm and the nights quite cool. November, December, January, February and March are all cold months with much rain and quite a little snow, so that preparations already are being made to protect the men as far as possible from winter hardships. The dampness causes the cold to be felt keenly, a temperature of freezing on this side being as uncomfortable and dispiriting as zero in most American latitudes.

The hard work of troops in training has made the officers more keenly anxious than ever to provide wholesome amusements for them in their moments of leisure. They now have band concerts given by both their own and French bands and it is hoped soon to have moving picture outfits available for every battalion. The suggestion has been made that war pictures such as the English film of the Somme battle and later pictures from that front should be shown to the men repeatedly, giving them an accurate idea of what actual fighting conditions are like.

It is now being planned to take both officers and soldiers to the French front in detachments from time to time so that they may see and study life in the trenches before they are actually called upon to take their places there.
