The first session was that of Tuesday afternoon which was marked by the beginning of a protracted and at times heated discussion of the fate of Albany College. After several sessions devoted to the discussion of the past, present and future of the school, resolutions were passed calling upon the trustees and the residents of Linn county to meet the impairment of the endowment funds and the pressing debts of the college within one year or close the school.

Between the sessions devoted to business the members of the synod enjoyed the lectures and sermons by Dr. Henry Church King, Dr. Foreman of Lahore, India; Major W. S. Gilbert, captain of the Coast Artillery Corps, and others.

Interest tomorrow evening centers around the great sacred concert to be given at the First Methodist Episcopal church at 8 o'clock. The concert will be put on by the combined choirs of the First Methodist Episcopal church and the First Christian church. The congregations of the Central Presbyterians, as well as the two churches whose choirs participate, will unite in the evening service. The program will be both patriotic and sacred and Colonel Hammond has accepted an invitation to have the Coast Artillery boys special guests at the service.

There will be a collection taken at the evening service for the benefit of the Coast artillery mess fund. Come fully prepared.

Cherry and Pear Slubs Are Becoming Very Active

Manager J. O. Holt, of the Eugene Fruit and Produce association states that he was in the country Thursday and noticed that the pear and cherry slub was doing considerable damage. Where they are allowed to eat the foliage, the development of the buds for next year's crop is arrested, and the crop damaged. He suggests arsenate of lead spray as good, but stated that it would be well to secure instructions from the fruit inspector or county agriculturist as to the strength of solution.
