BEETS AND BEANS ARE BEING CANNED NOW

Eugene Cannery Is Putting Up
Both Vegetables and Fruits
Present Time.

The Eugene Fruit Growers' association is working largely on vegetables this week. Beets are coming in plentifully, and about 200 bushels per day will be canned. The beets are trimmed by hand, steamed in large vats, after which they are peeled by a machine which will peel a bushel of beets in a minute. Then they are placed in the cans, heated again and sealed.

String beans are beginning to come in. It is stated that there will be many more than the cannery can take care of, so one not accustomed to seeing them in large quantities it looked as if there were enough to feed an army, with a room full of women stemming and stringing them. The beans are graded by machinery. In fact practically all fruits and vegetables are so graded.

and the dryer has shut down, and will not be operated again until the prune crop begins to come in. This is the first year any cherries were dried, the factory having this year installed a cherry pitter of sufficient capacity to handle enough to pay.

The association experimented with drying a few loganberries, making six sacks of dried berries for samples. They had expected to dry a large amount, but because of the shortage of the crop did not do so. The output of loganberry juice was also much curtailed, though they put a lot of berries in cold storage to make up later.

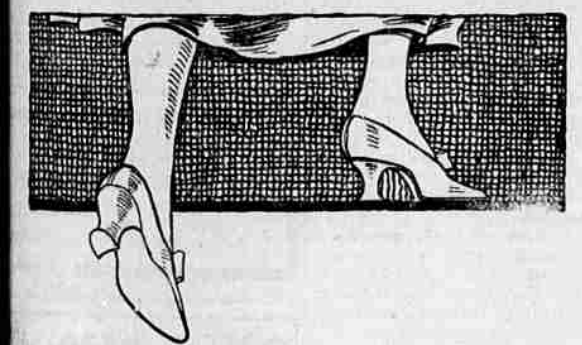
U-BOAT TO BE INTERNED

JUNCTION CITY COWS SHOW IMPROVEMENT

Report of Association For July
Evidences Higher Production;
4 Animals Eliminated.

The report of the Junction City Cow Testing association for the month of July, as furnished by Linden N. Ross, the official tester, shows improvement in herds.

The six highest herds for the second month of testing were as follows:

Wells Has Highest Cow.

The remainder of Mr. Ross' report follows:
"The highest individual cow is a grade Jersey owned by Clyde Wells, four years of age. She produced 61.1 pounds of butter fat during the 30 days at a feed cost of \$5, showing a net profit of \$27.74. In figuring this profit the butter fat was figured at 43 cents and skim milk at 50 cents per hundred. At a meeting of the directors of the association recently it was decided to allow the cows each 50 cents per hundred for skim milk produced. This will make the cows show up a little better this month than formerly.

"In comparing this report with that of last month, it is noticed that the six best herds average \$10.28 profit against \$12.40 this month, about \$3.35 of this should be credited to the skim milk, the balance to butter fat. Considering the hot weather and the shortage of feed I consider this a very good average.

High Herd Still in Lead.

"It is interesting to note that the highest herd last month is still in the month of \$10.50, while last month the same herd averaged but \$11.32. This shows the importance of good feeding and management. More such herds as this would mean much to the Willamette valley. The records were brought to light through systematic testing work and is one of the many benefits enjoyed by the members of the cow testing associations. The sooner the farmers are taught to understand the value of food feeding and management the sooner the dairy business will be on a substantial basis. Many cows are slaughtered as 'unprofitable' when it is not the fault of the cow but her owner and the improper care she has received.

Average Test 21.8 Pounds.

"The average fat production of the association this month was 21.8 pounds, milk 509.0 with an average feed cost of \$2.33. The average price received for butter fat during the month was 40 cents. There were 16 'honor cows,' meaning they produced over 40 pounds of butterfat during the 30 days. Butter fat this month is a little higher than last and due to the extreme hot weather and shortage of feed many dairymen would be forced out of business were they not to receive a better price for their products. Feeds are all advancing much more in proportion than is butterfat. It is also hoped that the people of Eugene and other neighboring towns will soon advance their prices on retail milk so as to enable the retail dairymen to receive some of the profit they so justly deserve.

The association now has 400 cows against 292 tested last month. The association can handle two more herds.

EUGENE THEATRE IS LEASED BY NEW MEN

Mr. Morrison has had several years' experience in the theatre business, having successfully conducted the Morrison Star theatre at Meaford, Ontario. The new firm has filed the assumed name of "Eugene Theatre" with the county clerk and will do business under that title.

High class feature films will be shown from time to time and first class road shows will be put on the coming season. "Come Out of the Kitchen" billed for August 6, will be the first production put on under the new management.

CLAIM CORPORATION DISSOLVED BY FRAUD

Stockholders of Wesco Seed
Company Bring Suit Against
E. E. Morrison of Springfield

That E. E. Morrison, of Springfield, fraudulently secured the dissolution of the Wesco Seed company, of that place, and that he converted the assets of the corporation to his private use, is the basis of a complaint filed in the circuit court Wednesday morning. The suit was brought by H. W. Whitacre, president of the company, and C. A. Hentz, P. S. Tarter, W. B. Cushing, J. G. Phoenix, B. A. Whitacre, Fred Luckinsinger and McCarty.

The capital stock of the corporation consists of 10,000 shares of \$1 each. Whitacre owned 4,000 shares, Morrison owned 3,000 and the rest was scattered in small lots between the other stockholders.

It is alleged in the complaint that the defendant fraudulently made and certified to a report of meetings of the stockholders of the corporation, and of the board of directors of the corporation, and resolutions alleged to have been passed dissolving such corporation, when in fact no stockholders had been notified of said meeting and no stockholders or directors were present at the alleged meetings except Morrison who was secretary.

All the shining stands in the city of Eugene will close at 8:30 p. m. on week days and 3 o'clock p. m. Sundays, also after today, Aug. 1st, no commutation shining tickets will be sold.

It is also claimed that Morrison has appropriated the assets of the corporation to his own use and has rendered no accounting to the stockholders.

The complaint asks that the dissolution of the corporation be set aside and that Morrison be compelled to make an accounting and that judgment be given against him for the amount found to be due the corporation.

Crawford and Crawford, of Portland, are attorneys for the plaintiffs.

Dugald Campbell and James E. Campbell, executors of the estate of the late A. J. McDonald, have brought suit to foreclose a mortgage against the Eugene and Great Western Land company, covering lots in Fortuna Park orchards, a subdivided tract lying in section 33, Township 18 range 3 west, situated southwest of Goshen. The amount asked in judgment is \$4406.35 and interest and \$200 attorney fees.
