WHEAT IS UNSETTLED IN CHICAGO MARKET

Close of Trading 1 Cent Net
Higher With \$2.18 Bid For September.

(By The Associated Press)
Chicago, Aug. 1.—Rains in Kansas, where drought has been a great drawback to the crop outlook, led today to a sharp break in the value of corn. Opening prices, which ranged from 5-8 to 1-1-2 lower with December at \$1.16 3-8 to \$1.16 7-8 and May at \$1.15 to \$1.15 1-2, were followed by a material additional drop.

The close was nervous 1 5-8 to 2 5-8c net lower at \$1.15 3-4 to \$1.15 7-8 December and \$1.13 7-8 to \$1.14 May. Wheat showed steadiness, influenced by opinions that although the spring crop yield was likely to be 40,000,000 bushels less than was predicted a month ago, the shortage had been fully offset by an enlarged harvest of winter wheat. After opening at \$2.18 bid for September, an overnight advance of 1c, the market later reacted at \$2.17.

There was no business except in the September delivery which in the later dealings showed a disposition to harden. The close was unsettled 1c net higher at \$2.18 bid September.

Oats declined with corn. Weakness developed in provisions as a result of the downward swing of the corn market.

COUNTY'S TRACTOR IS UNLOADED EASILY

Big Machine Moves Across Foot
Wide Chasm Without The Least Trouble.

It is little wonder that some of the African and Indian troops in Europe thought the armored "Tanks" were "fire-spitting devils." Lane county's new tractor is probably a miniature of some of the big tractors except for the "tank" and cannon. Many Enemy War Prisoners Escape From Russian Soil

Petrograd, July 31.—The notable growth in the number of enemy war prisoners escaping from Russia since the revolution is engaging the attention of the military authorities. According to published data from the beginning of the war until March a total of 5,350 escapes have been registered, whereas during March 735 managed to get away. In April 2,523 and in May more than 3,000 escaped.
