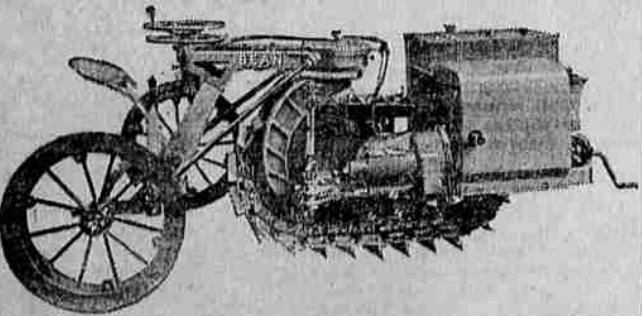

WOOLEN MILL MAY NOT ACCEPT ORDER

U. S. Quartermaster Asks About
Blankets, But Mill Is Running
to Capacity.

A telegram received at the Eugene Woolen mill this morning from the United States Quartermaster at San Francisco, asks what delivery could be promised between now and April on army blankets. It is not known whether the mill can make terms or not, since the plant has been running to capacity for the past year.

At present, 10-ounce olive drab Melton cloth is being turned out at the rate of 3,000 yards per month. The government contract calls for 25,000 yards, so the plant will probably be working on this material for about eight months. This is in addition to the regular run of flannels, blankets, mackinaw materials, mens' suits, and so on, which are being manufactured as usual. It was stated at the office that the plant could sell its products twice over, if it had the capacity to turn out that much more goods.

The mill building has just been repainted, and will now be re-roofed with new shingles which are to be treated with a fire-proof paint. Eighty employees are kept busy at the plant.

LANE COUNTY COWS IN GOOD CONDITION

Only Five Cows Out of 200
Show Reaction in Tuberculin
Test in Herds Examined.

The reactions in the tests for tuberculosis made on 200 cows in the vicinity of Eugene, have been now taken place and Dr. Gardiner, who made the tests announces through N. S. Robb, county agricultural agent, that only five cows showed reaction. This is a very small percentage and shows that the dairymen have been very careful to keep their herds under sanitary conditions. The work of testing cows is done by the state free of charge by the veterinarian. Some of these herds had been tested two years ago and others had never been tested.

MOTOR CAR DEALERS WILL VISIT EUGENE

Portland Association to Come
to City Tuesday, August 21,
on Tour of Oregon.

CORVALLIS EXPERT LOOKING OVER STATE

Hector McPherson Visits Eugene While Making Survey of
Crops and Markets.

That the spring wheat crop of Oregon will be from 50 to 60 per cent of last year's yield is the opinion of Hector McPherson, economy expert of the Oregon Agricultural college, of Corvallis. Mr. McPherson was in Eugene Thursday while making a survey of the crops of the state.

He was also looking over market conditions, to see what portions of the state had a surplus of any particular commodity and where it can best be shipped to advantage. He was also seeking canning facilities for certain articles which are being raised in some localities in greater quantities than can be handled by their local canneries.

He stated that Eugene was fortunate in having a cannery that is able to handle all that is being produced.

WILL TRY NEW ROAD MAKING APPARATUS

County Court Will Give Trial to
Machine for Making End
Hauls of Dirt in Construction

The county court has decided to give a tryout to a new machine manufactured by the Holt Manufacturing company, the people who built the caterpillar tractor which is giving such good satisfaction. The machine is what is known as a leveler and is to be used in making end hauls of dirt in making cuts and fills in road work. It will be shipped to the county court and they are to pay the freight and give the machine 15 days' trial. If they are not satisfied with the work done, or for any other reason decide that it is unwise to buy it they simply turn it over to the company.

The machine has been extensively used in California in leveling land for irrigation, and is said to be very efficient at this work. While it has been used very little in the west in road work it is said to be no experiment in the east. It will be drawn by the caterpillar tractor.

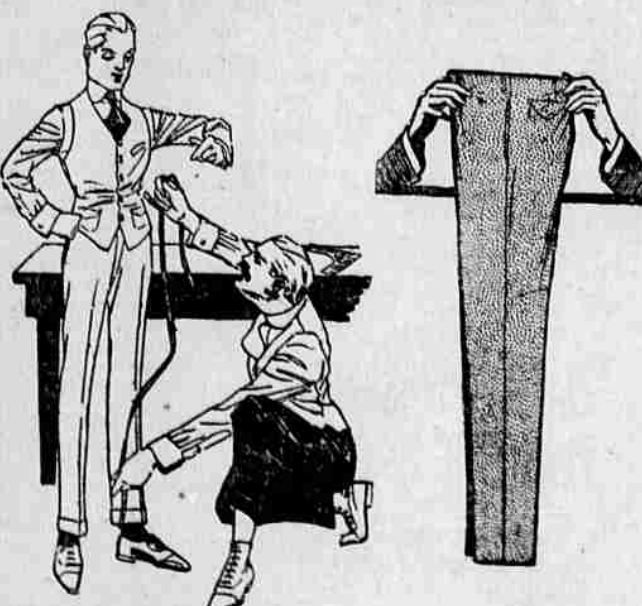
