COUNTY BOARD BUYS CROSS ROAD SIGNS

Nearly 100 Black Metal Plates
With Aluminum Letters Will
Guide Travelers on their Way

The county board on Saturday bought
nearly 100 signs to mark the crossings
and junctions of the county roads in ac-
cordance with the mandates of the last
legislature.

The signs will be black metal with
raised aluminum letters. They are being
manufactured to order and will be
mounted on cedar posts. The base of
each post, where it enters the ground
will be treated with creosote or a simi-
lar preparation. The portion of the post
above the ground will be painted white.

There will be a sign at every impor-
tant road junction. The last legislature
also ordered railroad warning signs
erected on county highways at some dis-
tance from all railway crossings. The
county court expects to order these
signs as soon as possible after the pub-
lic service commission meets in this
county Tuesday.

Car to Run From Baine,
Wash., to Tie Juana, Mexico.

Secretary George Quayle, of the cham-
ber of commerce, has received a letter
from the Pacific Coast Defense league,
at Seattle, Wash., stating that the league's
"pace maker" car will leave
Blaine, Wash., on the Canadian line, on
Wednesday, Aug. 8, for Tin Juana, Mex.,
with a message from Mayor Todd of
Vancouver, B. C., to Governor Cantow,
of Southern California, with the inten-
tion of making a record which will stand
for a while. "The object of the trip is
to establish mileage and running time,"
says the letter, "from border to border,

military road on the Pacific coast. The
